From Our Rabbi:

Shavuot is a unique holiday. Falling around the time of graduations and end of the year celebrations, Shavuot rarely receives the attention it deserves. This year, we will celebrate Shavuot on the morning of Sunday, May 20th.

The Torah carefully describes many of our most sacred holidays. It includes the dates on which we celebrate them. For example, Rosh Hashanah takes place on the first of the month of Tishrei, while Sukkot is on the 15th. We begin celebrating Passover on the 15th of Nisan. Shavuot, however is an exception. Rather than giving Shavuot its own official day, the Torah tells us to count 49 days from Passover's second evening. On the fiftieth day, we celebrate Shavuot.



The rabbis puzzle over the connection between these two seemingly incongruous holidays. While Passover and Shavuot share similarities (they are both originally harvest holidays), they have a fair number of differences as well.

The late comedian Alan King aptly summarized Passover in one pithy line: "They tried to kill us; we won; lets eat!" On Passover we recall the suffering and oppression we endured under Pharaoh's rule. We celebrate our resilience, God's miracles and Moses' leadership in helping us march towards freedom. We do a fair amount of eating as well, with Passover tables overflowing with matzo, gefilte fish, eggs, kugel and other Passover delights.

Shavuot, in contrast, is not about overcoming evil plots or oppressive forces. It is about receiving the Torah from God. On Shavuot, thousands of years ago, the Jewish people gathered around Mount Sinai and received the Ten Commandments. Each year on Shavuot, we gather in temple to reaffirm our commitment to Jewish learning, community and values.

The rabbis speak about the spiritual ascent these two holidays represent. The Israelites' liberation from Egypt was not an ending point, but a beginning. For fifty days, the Israelites marched in the desert, grappling with the concept of Jewish identity, before God responded with words of Torah. The rabbis teach that on Passover, the Israelites began their courtship with God. Shavuot was their wedding day and the Torah their ketubah.

Each year, their pairing of Passover and Shavuot enables us to consider our own Jewish identities. On Passover, we define ourselves by our ability to overcome oppression which has plagued us in every age. On Shavuot, we define ourselves not by what we have been through but rather who we aspire to become. On Passover, we celebrate physical liberation; on Shavuot, we celebrate spiritual connection and commitment.

This year, we will celebrate Shavuot as a community on Sunday, May 20th, beginning at 10am. Temple Or Elohim is proud to offer a family-friendly service full of music, poetr, and Torah. Afterwards, we will enjoy traditional dairy foods. Stay tuned for more exciting additions in works. I hope to see you there!


From my family to yours may nothing bad happen to our loved ones and may we as a temple blossom and thrive as our lives progress.

Religious School:

Dear Parents!

As we begin to prepare for our end of the year, I would like to reflect on a very special service that our 7th grade class led to commemorate a very dark period in our history, the Holocaust. Our young students studied and learned about the horrific destruction of six million Jews during World War II. They also learned about the courageous acts of many good people who risked their lives to save a Jew.



On April 12, 2018, our children read prayers and various readings pertaining to the Holocaust. Six Yahrzeit candles were lit, each candle representing the victims, communities, partisans, rescuers, liberators and the children. Music was heard in the ghettos and concentration camps. Cantor David Katz sang The Last Butterfly, a poem written by Pavel Friedman, who perished in Auschwitz at 23 years old. He brought tears to many when he sang Ani Ma'amin - I BELIEVE. Cantor completed our heartfelt service with Hatikvah, Israel's National Anthem. Cantor Katz's beautiful voice brought soothing comfort to all who sat in our holy sanctuary.

Following our emotional and sensitive service, we were honored to hear from our special guest and Holocaust Survivor Sol Ginsburg. Mr. Ginsburg shared his story of courage, strength and his motivation to survive. Mr. Ginsburg was born in Vilna, Poland in 1937. He and his family was deported to a Siberian village. He ended up in a Displaced Person's Camp before immigrating to Brooklyn. He shared the many details of starvation, losing family members and years later the loss of his beloved brother, Dov Ginsburg, an Israeli Hero who died saving lives in the Israeli army. Sol Ginzburg is an inspiration and his story of survival will continue to be passed down from generation to generation. Please be sure to google this exceptional man's story, so we may all continue to share his memoirs. May WE Never Forget. May WE continue to go from strength to strength. The stories of Holocaust survivors must be passed down from generation to generation. It is up to all of us to ensure that this horrific period is never forgotten or dismissed.

On May 11, 2018, our terrific 7th graders will be honored in a "Moving Up" service. They will lead our congregation in worship. They have completed years of Jewish education and it is our hope they will continue to learn in our Hebrew High School Program. On the same evening, we will pay tribute to our Clergy, Teachers and Staff for their ongoing dedication to our children. Please come and celebrate with all of us!

Baskets on the Bimah Program:




A great way to honor a simcha is by sponsoring a basket on the bimah. Proceeds go to assist local needy families.

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Torak Notes:

April 29 - May 5 Emor (Leviticus 21:1-24:23)

The Torah portion Emor begins with guidelines regarding the sacrificial offerings and the holiness of the priests themselves. Chapter 23 is concerned primarily with the dates, traditions and foods we eat on Festival holidays as well as Shabbat. After a brief discussion about a portable sanctuary called the Tabernacle, the Torah discusses a man who blasphemed against God, and the severe punishment that ensued. We are forced to ask why saying God's name in vain was seen as such an egregious error that it cost this young man his life and what "eye for an eye" really means.

May 6 - May12 Behar-Bechukotai (Leviticus 25:1-27:34)

The Torah portion discusses the Jewish concept of letting the land lay fallow. Every seven years, it instructs us to give the land a rest. During this year, we do not sow the land or prune the vineyard, but we may eat anything the land naturally produces. Every fifty years, there is a jubilee year on which the land again lays fallow. In addition, land is returned to its original owners and slaves are freed. God instructs the Israelites to keep Shabbat, take care of the sanctuary and to refrain from making idols. God promises blessings to the Israelites in exchange or them following God's law. The Torah then discusses funds, gifts and dues given to the Sanctuary. With this portion we end the book of Leviticus and declare *Chazak Chazak V'nitchazek*, "Strength, strength and may we strengthen one another."

May 13 - May19 Bamidbar (Numbers 1:1-4:20)

This first portion in the book of Numbers includes a census of all Israelite men over the age of twenty. The Torah specifically does not include the Levites in the census. Some scholars explain that the census was done to determined how many ablebodied men could go to war. Having other priestly obligations, the Levites could not be included in this number. The Torah describes the Levites' duties and responsibilities. It later goes into detail about specific priestly groups, such as the Kohathites and the priestly (Cohen) class, including Aaron and his sons.

May 20 - May 26 Naso (Numbers 4:21-7:89)

Parashat Naso is concerned with purity and impurity. God speaks to Moses about people who are ritually unclean, people who are repentant and women suspected of committing adultery. The portion discusses Nazarites, who are people who take a vow devoting themselves to God's service. This vow also forbids them from cutting their hair or drinking any alcohol. God tells Moses how to teach Aaron and his sons the Priestly benediction. To this day, the benediction is said by parents over their children each Friday night, at baby naming, brises, weddings, Holy Days, and other special occasions. Finally the portion consecrates the Sanctuary. The chieftains bring gifts and Moses and God speak within the Tent of Meeting.

May 27- June 2 Beha'alotecha (Numbers 8:1-12:16)

God instructs Moses about the menorah for the Tent of Meeting (Unlike the Hanukkiah, this Menorah has 7 lights). The Torah portion explains that the Levites are to act as assistants under the priests, Aaron and his sons. Anyone who was unable to celebrate Passover in the month of Nisan is invited to observe a "second Passover." As the Israelites wander through the desert, they feel God's presence over the Tabernacle. When the cloud lifts from over the Tabernacle, they move with it, in effort to follow God's presence. The Israelites complain that there is no meat in the desert, to which God responds by giving them so much meat "it comes out of [their] nostrils." Miriam and Aaron talk about the "Cushite woman" married to Moses. In a fit of jealousy, they complain that God speaks through Moses and not through them. Miriam comes down with leprosy, Moses prays for her health and she recovers.

Tidbits from Larry Jacobs

In the year 1755, Pope Pius VI issues an edict over the Hebrews. The edict, among other things, prohibits Jews from the possession of Talmudic writings. It mandates death to Jews who pass the night outside the ghetto, prohibits Jews from selling bread or meat to Christians and forbids any Christians from entering a synagogue. This remains in effect until the arrival of Napoleon, 25 years later. Napoleon breaks down the ghetto walls. The army Marches through Europe and in effect allows Jewish life to begin.

In 1948, a ship from Yugoslavia docks at Tel Aviv. Hidden and in the ship's cargo of potatoes and onions are 500 rifles, 200 machine guns and large quantities of ammunition. Despite close scrutiny by the British, they were unloaded and delivered to the Haganah.

Warren Buffet has made investments in many companies in Israel. He said, "I am not Jewish, but Israel reminds me of the United States at its birth. The intelligence and initiative of its people are remarkable and extraordinary."

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
