From the Cantor:



Well, the holidays have once again swept us up and moved us into a new year. I hope everyone had a moving High Holiday experience and spent time with family and friends celebrating together. I would like to thank everyone who helped make these holidays as special as ever. From our Ritual Committee to our fabulous office staff to our custodial staff, our ticket takers at the door, our endless army of volunteers, our never ending positive inspiration and example- President Michael Wilner, Lenny Gershitz our amazing Gabbai, our remarkable Torah, Haftorah readers and those who read the blessings, our choir and Ed our organist. The list of people who make our holidays so special goes on and on! I cannot thank you all enough for your help and dedication to Temple... And of course, an extra special thanks to Rabbi Abramowitz for helping out as Emeritus co-leading with me. It was a joy to see and hear you this holiday!

The High Holidays are not actually "over." We are now supposed to incorporate their meaning in our lives. We are told by the Sages that now the real work begins. We get so inspired and focused during the holiday season. But now it is time to take the action needed to keep up the cleansing of ourselves.

Our Sages knew that life goes on after the holidays and that the tendency would be for us to fall right back into our old habits. We use the High Holidays to look at our inner selves. We then need to take regular action and keep aware of the things that creep back into our behaviors that get in the way of us being the best we can be. There are many ways to do this on a personal level and many of us have our own plans and ways that we do this.

However, we also have our great tradition to lean on. One of the easiest and effective things you can do is begin to try and make it to a Shabbat service on a Friday night. This will keep you "closer to home" in that you will be reminded of what is available to you from your Temple and the community at large. It will also allow you to connect with others and "be of service" if need be, for those in your community. By taking this small action for yourself and your family, you can greatly increase your happiness and keep yourself in touch with what you felt on the holidays.

We are also told that it is customary to try and eliminate just one defect of character that you found was glaring at you during the holidays as you reflected on yourself. Take a hard look at this character trait and do your best to come to terms with it. No judgement, just reconciliation. Let yourself experience the joy of removing something that stops you from being the best you can be.

In addition, and most importantly, we are asked that we begin to learn how to forgive ourselves. This is so very crucial to our healthy state of mind and overall happiness. There is a built-in message in our liturgy. Even with all the lists of sins and messages of not living up to the standards of our great matriarchs and patriarchs, we can still try. We are to approach their ideals by forgiving ourselves for not being as great as they were. We need to understand that if we truly are doing the best we can to develop and grow, we will be given the gift of seeing ourselves in a different light. This is one that is less harsh and more loving.

We have many opportunities to become the best we can be and the High Holidays are only the beginning. Let's keep the energy going and make it the best year ever!

Book Club: Francine Miller will run the club and choose the first book. Watch for more details.


Escape Room: This promises to be a HUGE hit with people of all ages. We are securing a date for the winter time. Look for more details in future correspondence.

Larry's Tidbits:

For the very first time ever, Mexico City, the largest city in North America, recently elected a 55 year old Jewish woman as its Mayor. Her name is Claudia Sheinbaum Pardo. She is the granddaughter of Jewish immigrants from Lithuania and Bulgaria. She is a scientist with doctorates in engineering and physics. Mexico City is home to over 50,000 Jews.

Here is a recent quote from Supreme Court Judge Ruth Bader Ginsberg – "I am a judge born, raised and proud of being a Jew. The demand for justice, for peace and for enlightenment runs through the entirety of Jewish history and Jewish tradition." She was appointed to the United States Supreme Court in 1993.

Earlier this year, Rabbi Gayle Pomerantz was promoted to Senior Rabbi at the 75 year old Temple Beth Shalom in Miami Beach, Florida. She has served at that Temple since 1994. She will be its first female Head Rabbi. She was honored by the City of Miami as "A woman to know" and was named "A Woman Of Valor" by the National Council of Jewish Women.

Our High Holidays have passed. It is a time when we are enjoined to look deeply into who we are, what we value and what we want to accomplish. It is a time of introspection from which we should emerge newly recommitted to being a better person.

A great way to honor a simcha is by sponsoring a basket on the bimah. Proceeds go to assist local needy families.



Torah Notes:

October 6, Bereshit: Gen. 1:1-6:8

The narrative of creation, including Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, the tree of knowledge of good and evil and the forbidden fruit. Cain murders Abel, thus initiating the corruption of mankind and leading to the disastrous flood in Noah's time.

October 13, Noach: Genesis 6:9 – 11:32

Mankind had become corrupt, forgetting that they were created in the image of God and failed to live decent, ethical and peaceful lives. The portion recounts the stories of Noah and the Ark, the Great Flood, God's promise, through the symbol of the rainbow, never again to deluge mankind and cause such mass destruction and the story of the Tower of Babel.

October 20, Lech Lecha: Genesis 12:17 – 17:27

The life and experiences of Abraham, Judaism's remarkable pioneer, are told here. The establishment of the faith in One God and God's covenant with Abraham that the land of Canaan shall be the land of the Hebrews. Unable to have children with his wife Sarah, Abraham takes Hagar to himself as wife and has a son, Ishmael.

October 27, Vayera: Genesis 18:1 – 22:24

Abraham & Sarah are promised a child in their old age.

God announces his intention to destroy Sodom & Gomorrah and Abraham debates with God in an effort to save the good people there. Lot is saved, but his wife is turned into a pillar of salt. The seduction of Lot, Avimelech's attempted seduction of Sarah, the birth of Isaac, the expulsion of Hagar and her son Ishmael are all recounted in this portion.

The Six Synagogues That I Visited in Europe

Here, we call them Temples. In Europe they are always called Synagogues. Some of them are hundreds of years old and restored to their original state. The following Synagogues in Amsterdam, Copenhagen, Tallin, Stockholm, Berlin and St. Petersburg are works of architectural beauty.

This past summer I had the pleasure of designing and escorting tours for 44 people to each of these Synagogues.

There is a bond that exists between Jewish people from all countries. We were so warmly welcomed by the members of these Synagogues. We were greeted with open arms into their Houses of worship.

Did you know that most of the Synagogues in Eastern Europe and Scandinavia were restored by Ronald Lauder, the son of Estee Lauder.

Amsterdam, Holland

The Portuguese Synagogue, also known as the Esnoga is a late 17th-Century Sephardic synagogue in Amsterdam that was completed in 1675. Esnoga is the word for synagogue in Ladino, the traditional Judeo- Spanish language of the Sephardic Jews.

The Portuguese Synagogue in Amsterdam is unique. It has been used as a concert hall many times and can be seen on Channel 13 when they perform the Cantor's Concert there. The Synagogue is not heated and is lit up only by the most beautiful candlelit chandeliers.

The Amsterdam Sephardic community was one of the largest and richest Jewish communities in Europe during the Dutch Golden Age. Their very large synagogue reflected this. The Synagogue was built over 300 years ago.

St. Petersburg, Russia

The Grand Choral Synagogue was built between 1880 and 1888. The architecture is of Moorish design and is still being used today. A lot of the synagogues in Europe are designed in pastel colors, mostly pinks and light blues. This Synagogue has perfect sound and is used today for prayer as well as a Concert Hall.

Berlin, Germany

Rykestrasse Synagogue, Germany's largest Synagogue was built in 1903/1904. It is in the Romanesque Revival architectural style and seats 1,200 people. It is the largest Synagogue in Germany. It was one of the few Jewish religious buildings that survived the Kristallnacht of 1938 and World War II.

Copenhagen, Denmark

There may not be many Jews living in the Danish capital today but the local community is world-famous for the exceptional protection it received from its government and their compatriots during World War II. The Synagogue was completed in 1833. There are approximately 2,500 Jews still living in Copenhagen. The architect was German. The Synagogue has been restored at a cost of \$3.7 million dollars.

The Danes celebrated the operation that ultimately saved nearly all of the Country's Jew's from the death at the hands of the Nazis. While the German Occupation forces were preparing to deport more than 7,000 Jews to death camps beginning at 10 P.M. on Oct. 1, 1943, Danes shepherded all but a few hundred to the east coast of the island of Zealand, where they boarded small boats that ferried them to neutral Sweden in hundreds of crossings over a period of a few days. The Torah Scrolls were hidden in the nearby Church and all of them were saved.

Tallinn, Estonia

Talinn Synagogue, also known as Beit Bella Synagogue was inaugurated in May 2007. Consecrated in 1885, the historical Synagogue building was destroyed during World War II. Now it has a modern design and is one of the most unusual buildings in Tallinn. It also houses a Jewish School, Jewish Community Center and a Museum. It seats 65 women in the balcony and

105 men. During the era when the synagogue was located in the Soviet Union religious life was prohibited. Now the Jewish Community is flourishing.

Stockholm, Sweden

The Great Synagogue of Stockholm was built in 1867-1870. The Synagogue seats 900 people. It is of Moorish architecture and is still used today.

In the 40 years that I've been traveling and designing tours, I have visited Synagogues in Romania, Prague, Budapest, Paris, Italy, England, Greece, Ireland and even attended the services of a Synagogue that my cousin helped to build in Hong Kong. I found a very important link, the bond of "pride" of being Jewish. Being welcomed wherever I went, whether speaking Yiddish because that was the common language we both knew, we were proud of being Jewish.

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
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
