



Thanksgiving Interfaith Service

Words of love, comfort, prayer and support rang throughout the sanctuary at Temple Or Elohim of Jericho, New York on Friday, November 23, 2018. All who attended the Interfaith Service led by Cantor David Katz experienced an awe inspiring and uplifting musical service featuring the Temple's band Nishamah, as well as three guest clergy of different faiths. Over 150 people of Jewish, Protestant, Catholic and Muslim backgrounds were led in prayer by Dr. Faroque Khan, Chair of the Islamic Center's Interfaith Institute of Long Island of Nassau County; Reverend Dwight Lee Wolter of the Congregational Church of Patchoque and Father Michael Callahan.

The evening started with Cantor Katz welcoming everyone to the Shabbat Service and explaining that the evening would be an intertwining of religions. Everyone in attendance realized how we are alike in our prayers. Once we all united in prayer it was easy to see the similarities and differences in our services. In this time of domestic terrorism and hate this couldn't have been more appropriate to show the world outside and inside how much we are alike.

Dr. Khan recited spiritual readings at the beginning of the service after reminding us of how his center was the first of many to hold a vigil just two days after the Massacre in Pittsburgh. At the Vigil, there were over 350 people speaking of "ideologies of hate and anti-Semitism that must be challenged and rooted out with a proper presentation of true teachings of our shared religious values, the ones that are children of Abraham."

Three members of the Congregational Church of Patchogue sang the Song "Grateful" about belief and goodness. After they were done singing, Cantor Katz and Michael Wilner, our Temple's President and Nishamah drummer joked when they asked if the Church singers wanted to join the Temple Or Elohim Choir.

Throughout the service the prayers of Jewish text were intertwined with prayer and hymns from the other faiths. Cantor Katz and the other clergy explained the meanings and relevance of the different texts and how they related to other religions. During one occasion, Reverend Wolter recited a Negro Sermon about the creation called "That's Good...I'm Lonely Still." Father Callahan spoke about Love and Kindness being above all.

Reverend Wolter read:

There is a statement being made even now, a month after the shooting at The Tree of Life Synagogue. We are still one, we are one people different colors, shape, sizes and religious practices, with separate lives but we all believe in one God do not try to blow us apart. We are all here for one reason only - PEACE. We are united in the fight for peace. Unity-not to hold grudges, not to withhold love as boundless as the sea, the more that is given, the more that is bountiful everywhere."

This event of religious communities gathering together must continue. We must not let this stop after just one evening. We must keep the friendship and communal feeling going. Let us work together to fight anti-racism and anti-Semitism. This is something we must strive for as a family of people whether we are white, pink or purple.

Let us all use this wonderful example of our past personalities and leaders to continue the fight for what we believe in and who we are. I wish you all a happy and healthy Hanukkah.



Dec 1 Vayeshev (Gen 37:1-40:3)

Joseph's life takes a strange and disturbing turn after he shares his prophetic dreams with his brothers. Jealous of the way in which their father favored him, Joseph's brothers heartlessly attack him, sell him into slavery and tell their father that he had been killed by a wild beast. Thus begins Joseph's life in the Land of Egypt. The Torah pivots back to Canaan, where Tamar educates Judah about how to treat a woman, through deception and sex. Back in Egypt, Joseph refuses his master's advances. He ends up in prison through no fault of his own. In prison, he begins to make a name for himself as an interpreter of dreams.

Dec 8 Miketz (Gen 41:4-44:17)

Joseph interprets Pharaoh's dreams and begins to rise to power. Eventually, he attains one of the highest offices in all of Egypt. He marries Asenath, and has two children: Ephraim and Meneshe. There is a great famine in all of the lands but Joseph is prepared. From far and wide, people to come to him for food, including his brothers, who are on the brink of starvation. Joseph recognizes them right away, though they do not recognize him. He tests them three separate times.

Dec 15 Vayigash (Gen 44:18-47:27)

Joseph sees his youngest brother Benjamin for the first time in years. After Joseph's three tests for his brothers are complete, he can hold himself back no longer. Joseph reveals his identity to them. He is delighted to find out his father is still alive and even more delighted to see him again. Joseph and Jacob meet with Pharaoh. Joseph's family prospers in Egypt.

Dec 22 Vayechi (Gen 47:28-50:26)

The book of Genesis comes to a close, as Jacob's life comes to an end. Jacob blesses his grandchildren Ephraim and Menashe. Jacob offers his deathbed blessings and imparts instructions for his burial. Despite the huge rifts between them, Joseph and his brothers are able to forgive one another and together offer Jacob the burial he deserved. Years pass and Joseph, too, comes to the end of his days. He makes a deathbed prophecy of people Israel's future.

Dec 29 Shemot (Exodus 1:1-6:1)

A new Egyptian Pharaoh rose to power who did not remember the once positive relationship between the Hebrews and the Egyptians. Seeing Hebrews as a threat, he turned them into slaves and ordered them to drown male children in the Nile River. Somehow, a Levite woman was able to keep her son alive by placing him in a basket on the Nile. Pharaoh's daughter found Moses and decided to raise him in the palace as her own. As Moses grows up, he begins to wonder about his true identity. Feeling a connection to the Hebrew people, he kills an Egyptian on their behalf. He then flees for his life to Midian, where he settles down and had children. Years later God's calls to him out of a burning bush, insisting that he return to Egypt. 




