The Fire <u>After</u> Shabbat

At sunset on Fridays, we mark the beginning of a day of rest and spiritual enrichment known as Shabbat. Why rest? Well, after a week's worth of working, going to school, running errands and participating in various activities it is a time when we can set aside our weekday concerns and devote ourselves to higher pursuits such as relaxing, eating and talking with one another. Havdalah marks the end of Shabbat and takes place after sunset on Saturdays.

Cantor Katz, Deborah Tract and Familyhood's Co-Chairs Steve Finkelstein and Jodi Breslin decided to bring this lesser known tradition into the homes of our congregants. Our Temple's exclusive "Havdalah in Your Home" program joins together two to four Or Elohim families in one of their homes on a Saturday evening, which allows for a personal and comfortable setting. Cantor Katz explains the meaning behind Havdalah in that "it was created to prolong the Shabbat essence, which is so special you don't want it to end. For psychological and practical reasons, it is healthy to slow down once every seven days." The Havdalah service, which is only about 10 minutes long, consists of prayers of thanks and gratitude and is a multisensory experience.

Our Temple's first "Havdalah in Your Home" was celebrated on December 1, 2018. For many families, including Jodi Goodman who attended this service with her son Sam, this was an opportunity to learn about the distinction of the departing holy day of Shabbat and the ordinary weekdays that are coming up. "It was very intimate and special," said Jodi Goodman, and a "great way to have families meet!" Mrs. Tract continued to explain the three symbols of the Havdalah set: Wine (or grape juice) to represent the joy and sweetness of Shabbat; spices to comfort us for the loss of Shabbat from the week prior and to carry the sweet spice of Shabbat into the new week; and a braided candle lit with fire to symbolize the end of Shabbat and the beginning of the six days of work. Temple member Adina Ginsburg joined us with her son and daughter. "We loved celebrating Havdalah in the home! It is a wonderful way to mark the end of Shabbat in a cozy setting with friends and family," said Adina. "Our family enjoyed lighting the beautiful candle, smelling the sweet spices, and sharing what we look forward to in the week ahead." The children who participate in "Havdalah in Your Home" receive their own Havdalah set so they can continue this tradition.

We are planning on having many more "Havdalah in the Home" gatherings. If you are interested in attending or hosting one in the future, please contact the Temple's office, Jodi, Steve or Deborah.

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Happy New year!

Each January 1st do you find yourself saying, "Wow, another year has already passed, where is the time going?" I know I do. It seems that each year goes quicker and it gets more and more challenging to "find the time" to do everything we need to do. Why is this so? Aren't we still doing all the same things we have done before? Have our lives really gone "faster?"

Truth be told, time is simply time. We all know that it cannot go faster or slower. It is US and our approach toward our lives that is the culprit. As we get older it seems that we tend to see the days differently. Most scholars of the human condition attribute this to our becoming more aware of the fact that we are getting older and there is less time left for us. Not in a morbid way but in the sense that we realize what is more important in life as we get older.

So what can we do this year to feel less like time is controlling us and feel more like we are getting the most out of our lives? One of the easiest and simplest ways to find more balance in our lives and time for yourself is to rest one day of the week. Shabbat! I believe that our sages created the day of Shabbat as a rest day not only because it says in the Torah that God rested but because they knew that all of us, even thousands of years later, would still be the same humans. That we would need to slow down once a week, to take a rest and recharge ourselves.

I can hear you now, "yeah right, so easy for Cantor to say, when he is not a Swim or Lacrosse Taxi, a Dance Mom or Baseball coach or the one who does all the shopping, cleaning and shlepping!" Believe me, I understand. It is not an easy life to lead and we all want to make sure everything is covered and our families are taken care of. But what about YOU! The most important part of the equation. Caring for one's self is the most important thing we can do. And we need some rest to be able to do it.

So how about this, for the new year, perhaps try and make a commitment to spending more time taking care of yourself. Make your health and peace of mind the most important "issue" you have to deal with. Start by taking some time to rest a little more. If you cannot make it the exact day of Shabbat, then make your own little Shabbat. Give yourself 20 minutes more in the morning to have a cup of tea and relax slightly before you go out into the world. Do a short "stillness" meditation for ten minutes before hitting the LIE! Hang out with your kids just before they go to sleep for 10 minutes more - just hug them or talk. Try to become more aware of HOW you are going through your life and what you are doing in each moment. It is rarely "what" we are doing but more "how" we are doing it.

This is the way of the Kabbalistic tradition as well. The Kabbalistic tradition believes that the entire universe is being created moment by moment, that every single moment is new and there is no such thing as "same stuff, different day." We have far more control of our lives and our peace of mind than we think. We must slow down and be in life as it happens.

My wish for you in this new year is that you find more time for YOU. That you become healthier, stronger and more rested than you ever have before simply because you choose to make yourself the most important piece of the puzzle.

After all, isn't it one of the simplest yet profound statements from the great Rabbi Hillel, from our very own tradition, that asks us to consider:

"If I am not for myself then who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? And if not NOW, when?"

Larry's Tidbits:

In the year 1187, Sultan Saladin captured Jerusalem from the Christian Crusaders. Although the Europeans had barred Jews from living in the city, Sultan Saladin allowed the Jews to return. Sultan Saladin was of Kurdish decent. He was a great patron of the arts and learning. His personal physician, Rabbi Moses Maimon or Maimonides, was a Sephardic Jew from Toledo, Spain who continues to be renowned for his work in Jewish law and ethics.

In 1917, British intelligence learned about a meeting that was to occur in Berlin where Germans and Turks planned to offer the Jews of Europe a German sponsored Jewish national home in Palestine. This stimulated the British to finalize and issue what became known in history as the Balfour Declaration.

According to data published by the Jewish Agency the world Jewish population totals some 14.7 million: 6.6 million Jews live in Israel, 8.1 million live outside of Israel (including the 5.7 million who live in the United States). This figure has hardly changed since last year.

Did you know that a Brooklyn based product design company is selling an action figure of Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsberg. For \$20, this miniature version of the Jewish jurist is complete with her signature collar, wire rimmed glasses and hardwood gavel. She recently celebrated her 25th anniversary on the court. She was appointed by Bill Clinton in 1993.

Torak Notes:

January 4, Vaera (Exodus 6:2-9:35)

God asks Moses and his brother Aaron to deliver the Hebrews from Egyptian bondage. After many years of slavery, the Hebrews aren't sure what to make of that promise. Moses and Aaron perform a miracle with a snake and tell Pharaoh to let their people go. Again and again, Moses makes this plea. Each time Pharaoh fails to uphold his end of the bargain. This portion includes the first seven plagues.

January 11, Bo (Exodus 10:1-13:16)

The final three plagues rain down on Egypt, including locusts and darkness. Before the final plague, God instructs Aaron and Moses about the Passover festival. God tells the people what to do to avoid being affected by the final and most gruesome plague yet: the death of the firstborn. After this plague, Pharaoh finally allows the Hebrews to leave Egypt. God repeats the commandments about Passover.

January 18, Beshalach (Exodus 13:17-17:16)

The story of the Exodus from Egypt reaches its climax, as the Hebrews flee. Pharaoh changes his mind about letting the people go and sends his army to retrieve them. The Hebrews come to the Sea of Reeds. Before them is a body of water too deep and too long to cross. Behind them are Egyptian soldiers. They are trapped. Suddenly, the water begins to part and the Hebrews are able to pass through as if on dry land. The water then closes behind them so that the Egyptian army cannot follow. As the Israelites reach the other side, they joyously sing the words *Mi Chamocha* "Who is like you, O God?" God provides the Hebrews with food called Manna. When the people complain about water, Moses hits a rock with his rod and water gushes out.

January 25, Yitro (Exodus 18:1-20:23)

The portion is named for Moses' father in law, Yitro (Jethro), who comes to the Israelite camp with Moses' wife Zipporah and their two sons. Yitro watches Moses working in his role as judge and convinces him to create a hierarchy of courts filled with many judges. The newly liberated Israelites walk through the desert until they arrive at Mount Sinai. They agree to God's law and prepare for God's holy instructions. On the third day of preparation, Moses begins to climb up Mt. Sinai. He receives the Ten Commandments, all of which appear in this Torah portion.

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
