Our 2019/20 school year has begun. By the time you read this, Rosh Hashanah has passed. The sound of the shofar is still ringing in our hearts, a keepsake of our own reflection of the prior year and our individualized vision for the year ahead.



As I prepare for the coming year, I strive to continue to bring together a vibrant community of learned children that continue to demonstrate respect, kindness and acceptance towards others.

Our sacred place of learning is safe, happy and a synagogue that children want to be at. Our school opening has been wonderful! We have many new children that were eagerly greeted by our new, wonderful spiritual leader, Rabbi Judy Cohen-Rosenberg and our students. Here, at the Temple Or Elohim, A Community Reform Congregation, we pride ourselves in dedicated clergy and faculty committed to meeting all the needs of each student helping them in their Jewish journey of learning, as well as socially.

Shofar Spotlight Interview: Arthur Katz

When Arthur Katz isn't running his business, Knockout Pest, he is an active contributor to various aspects of the Long Island Jewish community. He is well-known for contributing not just funds but his time to many causes he feels passionate about, which include helping all of those in need and teaching the ideals of tolerance. As a longtime member of Temple Or Elohim, Arthur is a past-president and has participated in numerous committees.

Arthur and his wife of 45-years, Barbara, have two daughters, sons-in-laws and four grandchildren. The Shofar sat down with Arthur to reflect on his many years at Temple Or Elohim and some of the activities in the Jewish community that he's involved with and explained why they're so important to him.

When did you join Temple Or Elohim?

We've been members of Temple Or Elohim since my oldest daughter started religious school, which was approximately 30 years ago. I grew up in a conservative synagogue – Temple Beth Sholom in Roslyn -- and my wife's family belonged to Hollis Hills Jewish Center in Queens.

If you both came from conservative synagogues, what made you decide to join a reform congregation?

Because my wife's family wasn't as observant as mine and she hadn't gone to a religious school, so she felt more comfortable with a reform synagogue.

How did you feel about joining a reform synagogue at the time?

Hesitant, and the hesitancy has continued throughout my life. While many members are committed to Judaism, many other families join reform and conservative synagogues just for the purpose of having their children become Bar or Bat Mitzvah and then they leave. Obviously, everyone has freedom of choice and everyone observes Judaism in their own way. However, as a personal preference, I like being part of a congregation where people are more committed to the ideals of Judaism. In addition to that, I have the added joy and burden, of being a Zionist. So, I prefer being around Jews who share those values.

Have you found that here?

While my expectations were realized, there are those who are more committed than others, I have developed friendships with those who do share my values. It doesn't mean that I don't like the other people, I respect them.

At the time you first joined, what did you discover about the Reform Jewish worship experience that surprised you or was different than you were accustomed to when you grew up in a conservative congregation?

One thing that I enjoy a lot is that a reform synagogue has more music, which I found meaningful because music

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can help you connect with your prayers. In conservative synagogues, there is music but it's all vocal. If you walk into a synagogue anywhere in the world there are certain tropes that are constant. When you sing the Shema, Adon Olom, or many of our other prayers wherever you go, no matter what language people speak, they sing the same tropes and you feel welcome wherever you go. At our synagogue, we were very lucky to have Cantor Marvin Antosofsky, who was here for more than a generation. He was a musician and he was a wonderful singer. Many people didn't know early on that he had always yearned to be a Rabbi. When given the opportunity to become a congregational Rabbi, he grabbed it. He excelled at it. Universally, he is loved by everybody that meets him. I never met anybody who could possibly say something in a negative way about him. He is warm and caring. The children love him. Cantor Katz continues to embrace these qualities.

So, you see similarities between the two of them?

Yes, Cantor David Katz follows that same mold. He's wonderful, caring, musical and inspiring. He's acted as a rabbi here as well. Both cantors have done that, and he stepped up to the plate. I've heard many of his sermons and he's just wonderful and inspiring. So, in the cantorial area, this temple has totally excelled. In the rabbinical area, for the majority of my time here we had Rabbi Harvey Abramowitz, with whom I shared many of our Jewish values. We would go to Jewish events in the community. He is a big supporter of the Nassau County police, our military and the Israeli military. He actually served in the Israeli military as a youngster. He shares his strong values and his sermons were very inspiring. Perhaps not all the congregants felt as strongly towards Zionism and Israel as he did. He led trips to Israel for the congregation. I believe that he is a wonderful leader. I look forward to working with Rabbi Judy, getting to know her and learning more. Hopefully, she'll fill the big shoes that were left before her.

Having known her for 27 years as our rabbi at CRT, I think don't think that will be an issue.

Yes. I think it's a great marriage between the two synagogues. This example of the combining of synagogues is not something that's unique to us. There is a great demographic change going on throughout the United States. But more specifically on Long Island. There are many conservative and reform congregations that are merging. There are a lot of reasons why this could be happening, but it is happening. I think it was a very bold step that both synagogues took to recognize the demographic changes and stepped up to the plate and said, "we're going to make it" and it's a great way of doing it.

Besides your family simchas and lifecycle events, and the fact that you served as president of the temple, what other important milestones stand out in your mind?

One of our longest serving members, Toby Suroff, who's been a great congregant and advocate for the temple, embarked upon at least two major renovations of the synagogue. We're sitting here in the lobby of the temple outside the sanctuary. We see the stained-glass walls and the stars on the wall with the donor opportunities. It was all Toby. She made that happen. Toby was the force behind the renovation, which included the stained-glass windows. They're beautiful windows and they just didn't happen by accident. There's an Israeli artist that designed them. Depending upon the time of day, they look different. You have to come in the morning, you have to come in the evening and you have to come in the afternoon to see the sun move from east to west. You must see how the sun shines into the sanctuary and makes it so beautiful. We credit her for that entire effort. It really gives the temple a character that is unique to us.

Over the summer, you were recognized for your work with the Holocaust memorial center. Congratulations. What inspired you to devote so much of your time and energy to that effort?

It is the outgrowth of the multiple charities I have contributed to, including Catholic Charities, Family and Children's
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Services, the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Suffolk, as well as dozens of other charities. I made a personal choice to try to support those Jewish organizations that are on Long Island where not only I can support them financially but also given my time. Over the years, I've been involved with the UJA Federation campaign. They do God's work every day from cradle to grave for every age group. People don't realize that all of the Jewish community centers including the Mid Island Y and the Sid Jacobson JCC would not be here without UJA Federation. The UJA Federation continues to provide support to them and many other efforts in the community for those in need. The UJA Federation has done great work domestically and internationally for years. I was the Long Island Chairman for a few years. I continue to be very active in many of their committees including Government Relations, the Long Island Cabinet Steering Committee and others. As an outgrowth to that, there was a need to create a Long Island branch of the Jewish Community Relations Council, which is a very large organization in Manhattan but had no presence on Long Island. The JCRC works with inter-community and inter-religious groups including the Christians and the Catholics as well as separate individual communities like Chinese and Koreans. We're there to develop relationships. To make it very simple, our goal is to make sure everybody plays nicely in the sandbox. When you meet with people, you have meals with them. Should an issue come up that's important, we don't have to go figure out with whom to speak. We already have friends. We are a melting pot in each of these Long Island communities. The JCRC sees its job is to help everyone get to know each other better. When people know each other and understand each other there's less of a possibility of discrimination and anti-feelings for anybody.

That leads us to the work of the Holocaust Museum where I've been on the board for a few years. The Holocaust Museum initially was established as a place to educate the public about the Holocaust. It became very clear that the lessons that we've learned about the Holocaust can be easily translated into today's world. The Holocaust Center has become an educational center about intolerance. The museum runs educational programs to learn about bullying and tolerance of people that don't look or sound like you. These educational programs are provided to over 10,000 students yearly.

The Nassau and the Suffolk County Police Departments have a similar program for their cadets. All Nassau County and Suffolk County police officer candidates go to an educational program the Holocaust Center. They learn about the Holocaust. Many who have attended the program didn't have a clue that 2 million children were killed in the Holocaust. There is still a need to make sure people understand the lessons from the Holocaust and ensure they don't forget them. The program also includes learning about different ethnic groups that we have on Long Island, our differences and how we should get along together. So, the work of the Holocaust Center is monumental in helping people get along together in Nassau and Suffolk Counties.

Long Island Jewish World just published an article about your collaboration with the Chabad Rabbis to provide Kosher mezuzahs on Long Island. For those who haven't seen last month's article, can you explain what you've been doing and why you got involved in that?

I obtained funding for the 54 Chabad Rabbis on Long Island to run advertisements in local newspapers and social media for people to become aware of this project. The project is that we are supplying the parchment for mezuzahs. Many people don't understand that there is a kosher parchment that goes inside a mezuzah. It's actually that paper that has the Shema prayer written on it that's important. A scribe has to hand write the Shema, for the parchment to be kosher. The average cost of this kosher parchment is \$30. In addition, you have the cost of the box that houses it. We want to make sure that that's not an impediment for anyone who wants to put up a mezuzah. We funded the purchase of all the parchments and the mezuzah cases, although if someone wishes they can have their own.

Torah Notes:

October 5 - **Vayelech: Deut. 31:1 – 31:30**

The covenant between God and Israel is binding upon every man, woman and child, for all time - past, present and future, as if every one of us personally received the Torah at Sinai. Moses appoints Joshua to be his successor as the leader of Israel, as age has overtaken him and death is near. He assures the people that they have no need to be afraid, for God will always be with them. Moses then completes the writing of the Torah and entrusts it to the priests and elders, instructing them to study and teach it on a regular basis to the people.

October 12 - **Ha'azinu: Deut. 32:1 – 32:52**

Moses ends his service of a lifetime dedicated to God and the people Israel with a hymn of joy on the banks of the Jordan, in view of the Promised Land.

October 19 - **Sukkot, Exodus 33:12-34:26 & Num. 29:23-29:31**

The unfortunate golden calf experience created an estrangement between God and Israel. Moses pleads for God's forgiveness and God responds favorably, forgiving Israel for their sin. He renews His covenant with them, promises special blessings if they lead a sacred way of life and observe the Sabbath and Holidays. A holy convocation is called for on the 15th day of the 7th month, a Tabernacle of peace and hospitality, the final harvest festival and then preparation for winter.

October 26 - **Bereshit Gen. 1:1-6:8**

The narrative of creation, including Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, the tree of knowledge of good and evil and the forbidden fruit. Cain murders Abel, thus initiating the corruption of mankind and leading to the disastrous flood in Noah's time.
