Yom Kippur Speeches Revelations & New Traditions (Chiddush - חידוש)

Anne Edelman's YOM KIPPUR SPEECH

My journey began on a Tuesday afternoon, in the middle of March 2020, when a close friend called to advise me that her husband had tested positive for Covid-19. Since our husbands had been together a few nights before, she thought I should know. My husband, who always thinks he has contracted whatever illness is the most prevalent at the time, immediately got himself tested.

HE TESTED POSITIVE FOR COVID 19.

THAT WAS ONLY THE BEGINNING.

The following day, as I lay in my darkened bedroom with the most excruciating migraine I had ever experienced, attempting to keep out the blinding light that was seemingly coming from within my own head, my husband drove himself to the emergency room, as he was having difficulty breathing. Although he was discharged the following day, my husband soon returned to the hospital, where he remained for the next THREE weeks, on various levels of oxygen.

In the meantime, my sons and I all tested positive for the Corona Virus and went into quarantine at home.

Everything occurred so quickly, without giving us time to prepare ourselves. It soon became glaringly apparent that we would not have enough food and supplies for any extended period of time.

Anyone who has ever lived with two teenage boys knows that an excessive amount of food is required for them and an excessive amount of alcohol is required for mom, in order for any quarantine to proceed smoothly.

However, after several attempts to order food online, we came to the frightening realization that neither would be delivered for weeks, as the population was, likewise, in lockdown and online panic shopping. I was officially in panic mode, since we could not leave our home to purchase supplies, being infected with the virus.

Lynn Schaefer Bekerman's Speech

I was invited to share how COVID has affected my religious or spiritual life. I honestly wasn't sure what to say, because on the one hand, I'm not sure my experience has been that different from others' here. Everyone here knows life is changed, at least for now. One of the biggest ways COVID has affected it has been the ability to get together with people and to literally be with other Jews, in Jewish places and for Jewish occasions. My last live Temple service was Hanukkah last year. Since March, I have participated in a Zoom seder, attended the very-scaled-down bar mitzvah of my nephew (also simulcast via Zoom), and sadly a Zoom funeral and a Zoom shiva. We celebrated Rosh Hashanah outside, at an Italian restaurant. It has been difficult not being able to be with loved ones – or hug them, if we are with them – to celebrate simchas or offer comfort during sad times. The one routine that has remained constant has been my weekly lighting of Shabbat candles (well, except for that night we had carbon monoxide from the generator after Isaias and had to stay at a hotel). When I can't light the candles, I feel like I've missed out on something, something beautiful and which sustains my Judaism.

I am sure we share many of those same experiences. On the other hand, I work at Nassau University Medical Center. Like others who work in healthcare, I have a somewhat different perspective of COVID. While I don't work directly on the COVID floors, I'll spare you some of the things I still know and saw. I will say that what I heard was traumatizing enough. Hearing "Code Blue" and "Anesthesia Stat" <u>all day long</u> on the overhead speaker back in March and April would bring me to tears by the end of the day. They even had an additional person making the overhead pages, so it was constant. Of course, you knew who these pages were for. I would initially try to whisper a Mi Sheberach when I'd hear this, but even this quickly became too much.

The High Holy Days at our Temple came off beautifully. Rabbi Judy and Cantor David found a way to adapt the services to the "new normal", while providing words of wisdom and spirit-soaring songs. I thank everyone else who participated in the services - Torah readers, aliyahs, ark openers, our appeal speakers Jim Math, Ira Warshawsky and Marc Wiener, and Lynn Bekerman and Anne Edelman for sharing their moving COVID-19 stories at the Yom Kippur Afternoon service. I further thank the multitude of volunteers who worked tirelessly behind the scenes to make the services happen, both in person and by streaming.

Enjoy the last of the fall foliage and have a wonderful Thanksgiving no matter how you'll celebrate.



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Torak Notes:

November 7 - Vayeira (Genesis 18:1-22:24)

Abraham welcomes three visitors into his tent. They announce that Sarah will soon have a son, at the age of 90. Abraham argues with God about the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah, though ultimately the cities are destroyed. Isaac is born, circumcised, and weaned. Sarah sends away Hagar and her son Ishmael, and an angel saves them. God tests Abraham by asking him to sacrifice Isaac on Mount Moriah.

November 14 - Chayei Sarah (Genesis 23:1-25:18)

Although this Torah portion means "the life of Sarah," it begins with her death. Abraham purchases the cave of Machpelah in which to bury her. Abraham sends a servant to find a wife for Isaac. He finds Rebecca, who shows the servant great kindness in offering to draw water for his camels at the well. Isaac and Rebecca get married. Abraham remarries. At the age of 175, he dies, and is buried alongside Sarah, by Isaac and Ishmael.

November 21 - Toldot (Genesis 25:19-28:9)

Rebecca has twins named Esau and Jacob. Being the eldest son, Esau is to receive the birthright and blessing of the firstborn from his father. Esau gives Jacob his birthright in exchange for some stew. When Isaac is on his deathbed, Rebecca and Jacob deceive Isaac so that Jacob will receive the blessing of the firstborn. Esau threatens to kill Jacob, and Jacob flees to Haran.

November 28 - Vayeitzei (Genesis 28:10-32:3)

Jacob dreams about angels going up and down a ladder, and receives a blessing from God. Jacob goes to Laban's home, where he works for seven years in order to marry his daughter, Rachel. Laban tricks Jacob into marrying Leah instead. Jacob is forced to commit himself to seven more years of work in exchange for marrying Rachel. Leah, Rachel, and maidservants Bilhah and Zilpah give birth to a total of 12 children (11 sons and 1 daughter). Jacob and his family leave Laban's home in search of their own.



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
