

Rabbi's Corner:

In a time of increasing antisemitism, we need the celebration of Hanukkah! We need it because the joy this holiday brings combats not only the winter blues, but the horrible messages about our religion that we see and hear regularly. Hanukkah (from evening on Nov. 28-Dec. 6) celebrates the victory of the weak over the mighty and the few over the many. The Jewish people are no longer weak, but we are still a minority. Yet we will use our voices, loudly and proudly, to speak up for ourselves. At Hanukkah time, we focus less on the physical threat presented by the Assyrian Greek enemy, but on the spiritual threat they were to our lives. The desecration of the Temple in Jerusalem is the chief example. Even as we have acculturated in every land in which we have lived, we have not completely assimilated. We speak the language of our present locale, practice many of the mores, but we still maintain our unique Jewish identity. The ability to integrate and be proudly Jewish is what we celebrate at Hanukkah. May the lights of the Chanukkiah (menorah) burn brightly in our homes and in our hearts.



Join us on Zoom to light Hanukkah candles each night of Hanukkah at 7:00 pm except on Monday, Nov. 29 when we will gather in person, at 6:00 pm outdoors, with our Religious School students leading us in the blessings and on Friday Dec. 3 at 7:30 pm for our Hanukkah service, in person and streamed from our Sanctuary. Have your Hanukkah menorah and 7 candles ready for this service.

I look forward to spreading the light of this joyous season. May our light and the light of God (Or Elohim) illumine the world and bring us the enlightening message that we Jews not only survive, but thrive!

There is a great famine in all of the lands, but Joseph is prepared. From far and wide, people come to him for food, including his brothers, who are on the brink of starvation. Joseph recognizes them right away, though they do not recognize him. He tests them three separate times.

December 11: Vayigash Genesis 44:18-47:27

Joseph sees his youngest brother Benjamin for the first time in years. After Joseph's three tests for his brothers are complete, he can hold himself back no longer. Joseph reveals his identity to them. He is delighted to find out his father is still alive, and even more delighted to see him again. Joseph and Jacob meet with Pharaoh. Joseph's family prosper in Egypt.

December 18: Vayechi Genesis 47:28-50:26

The book of Genesis comes to a close, as Jacob's life comes to an end. Jacob blesses his grandchildren Ephraim and Menashe. Jacob offers his deathbed blessings and imparts instructions for his burial. Despite the huge rifts between them, Joseph and his brothers are able to forgive one another, and together offer Jacob the burial he deserved. Years pass, and Joseph, too, comes to the end of his days. He makes a deathbed prophecy of people Israel's future.

December 25: Shemot Exodus 1:1-6:1

A new Egyptian Pharaoh rose to power who did not remember the once positive relationship between the Hebrews and the Egyptians. Seeing Hebrews as a threat, he turned them into slaves and ordered them to drown male children in the Nile River. Somehow, a Levite woman was able to keep her son alive by placing him in a basket on the Nile. Pharaoh's daughter found Moses and decided to raise him in the palace as her own. As Moses grows up, he begins to wonder about his true identity. Feeling a connection to the Hebrew people, he kills an Egyptian on their behalf. He then flees for his life to Midian, where he settles down and has children. Years later God calls to him out of a burning bush, insisting that he return to Egypt. After a substantial protest, he agrees.






