The Start of Our High Holy Days 5781-5782

The Jewish High Holy Days officially start with the observance of Selichot, celebrated this year on August 28, 2021. This is a time when we are encouraged to reflect on the past year, do some soul-searching and determine what changes we want to make in the new year that's rapidly approaching. Immediately preceding our Selichot Service, we change the Torah covers to white covers representing purity and the wish that our sins will be made as white as snow (Isaiah 1:18).

At TOE,ACRC, there is one Torah that remains in its red covers throughout the year. This is a Torah found unclaimed during the Holocaust. It is our hope that someone from its home Temple will someday recognize it, claim it and take it home.

President's Message:

Back in the Saddle Again

They say the High Holy Days are never on time - they are always early or late. This year they are earlier than I can ever remember, as Erev Rosh Hashanah is on Labor Day night. No matter, we will be ready and raring to go. The High Holy Day services will be far closer to the pre-pandemic normal, such as our return to having two morning services on both the first day of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur morning. The plan is for our Torah readers to actually be able to read from the Torah from the traditional place on the bema this year!

Since we cannot ignore the world outside our Temple walls, there will be some safety measures and concessions due to the persistence of COVID-19. At the time of this writing in early August, the Delta variant is surging and we are requiring masks in the building in accordance with the new recommendations from the CDC. By the time you read this, decisions on all of the particulars will have been made, but there is one sure-fire prediction I can make even now: we will deal with whatever may come, with the goal of ensuring that as many people as possible can SAFELY attend services in person this year. We accomplished that goal last year and we will do so again. Of course, all High Holiday services can be viewed on our stream, with Erev Rosh Hashanah, Rosh Hashanah Day 1, Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur morning services password-protected and the other services streamed to the general public.

My confidence is reflected in our High Holy Day theme this year, "Going the Extra Mile" or "Lifneem mishurat hadeen". Everyone went the extra mile in 5781 to keep our building open and to keep our members connected to the Temple and each other, both in the Temple itself and remotely. Our clergy, Ms. Tract, our Board of Trustees, our COVID-19 task force, our teachers, our office staff, our custodians, NOW, Men's Club and all of our Temple member volunteers have my deepest appreciation for the extraordinary efforts they undertook last year. Such efforts ensured in-person options for all services and religious school classes, enabled our different committees to carry on the business of the Temple and led to new ways for members to bond with each other.

Through the herculean efforts of so many people, we have set ourselves up for success in the future. Their continuing dedication leaves me with no doubt that we will overcome whatever challenges that may come our way this year and thrive.

An early L'Shana Tova to you all and I hope to see you in the Temple this month.

Welcome back to another enriching year at Temple Or Elohim, A Community Reform Congregation. I hope summer 2021 brought you all relaxation, fun and enjoyment. Your Temple Family is recharged and ready to welcome you back.



In just a few short weeks following the High Holidays, we will open our 2021/22 school year. Classes begin on October 4, 5, and 7th. If you have not already registered your child please do so as soon as possible.

Our COVID Safety Taskforce continues to watch the situation and monitor the guidelines from our local health department and CDC. We are optimistic about our upcoming year of learning and teaching.

On September 20, 2021, we will celebrate the festive holiday of Sukkot. Torak Notes:

September 4: Nitzavim- Deut. 22:9-30:20

Moses presents the different orders of people before him, all assembled to enter into a Covenant with God: heads of tribes, elders, officers, all the people of Israel, including children, the strangers in their midst and all the others that would take part in sacred rites and rituals. He warns them all not to harbor evil in their hearts and adds words of mercy. He appeals to all to choose life and not death.

September 11: Vayelech - Deut. 31:1 - 31:30

The covenant between God and Israel is binding upon every man, woman and child, for all time - past, present and future, as if every one of us personally received the Torah at Sinai. Moses appoints Joshua to be his successor as the leader of Israel, as age has overtaken him and death is near. He assures the people that they have no need to be afraid, for God will always be with them. Moses then completes the writing of the Torah and entrusts it to the priests and elders, instructing them to study and teach it on a regular basis to the people.

September 18: Ha'azinu: Deut. 32:1 – 32:52

Moses ends his service of a lifetime dedicated to God and the people Israel with a hymn of joy on the banks of the Jordan, in view of the Promised Land.

September 25- Chol Hamoed Sukkot: Exodus 33:12-34:26 & Num. 29:23-29:31

The unfortunate golden calf experience created an estrangement between God and Israel. Moses pleads for God's forgiveness and God responds favorably, forgiving Israel for their sin. He renews His covenant with them, promises special blessings if they lead a sacred way of life and observe the Sabbath and Holidays. A holy convocation is called for on the 15th day of the 7th month, a Tabernacle of peace and hospitality, the final harvest festival and then preparation for winter.




