#### President's Message:

#### A Memorable August Night

March is shaping up as a great "get back to the Temple" month, with Comedy-Beatles Night coming up shortly on Saturday, March 5<sup>th</sup> and the two-year delayed Purim Shpiel "Friday Night Fever" right around the corner at Shabbat services on March 18<sup>th</sup>. As we come out of our winter and COVID shells, I cannot think of a better time to laugh and enjoy the company of your fellow Temple members.



This is the first column I have written since our beloved Rabbi Judy announced in January that she would be retiring at the end of her contract on June 30, 2023. We of course wish her all the happiness in the world. We at least get to enjoy having her as our spiritual leader for another 16 months, including one last set of High Holy Day services this fall.

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I will never forget the first time I saw Rabbi Judy lead a Shabbat service. In the summer of 2018, after "first contact" when the subject of consolidation was first broached, we agreed that members of the TOE Executive Committee should quietly attend Shabbat Services at CRT in small groups of 2 or 3. So, on a hot sultry Friday night in August of 2018, I went to CRT along with another Executive Committee member as the first "visitors". The central air conditioning was broken, so services were moved to a classroom with a semi-functioning window unit. I start sweating again when I think about it.

These were hardly ideal conditions for any Rabbi to shine. But shine Rabbi Judy did. She had to be hot and uncomfortable but she calmly led us through the service as though the temperature was as lovely as a Spring night. She was remarkable under the most difficult of conditions and I knew I would be proud if she were to become my Rabbi. Of course, over the next several months, a million things had to fall in place for that to occur. They did and she became our Rabbi, the very first Rabbi of TOEACRC.

I learned a lot about Rabbi Judy that August night. I learned a lot more about her afterwards. She was there for me during two weeks of hospital stays due to the bad case of COVID I suffered through in March of 2020. She was there for Laura and me and our families when my mother and Laura's father passed away within two weeks of each other in September of 2020. Since I became President of our Temple in July 2020, she has been a delight to work with in every way. After that melancholy day arrives on June 30, 2023, she will be sorely missed but always present with us – hopefully in person as often as possible, but always in our hearts.

#### Rabbi's Corner:

Imagine being an expectant mother or father, and late in the second trimester of this most wanted pregnancy you learn that the fetus you so much want to meet, is "incompatible with life" and will not survive. While lobbying in Albany (before COVID) I met a young couple who told their story. They received this horrendous news and quickly had to make decisions. Some medically sound decisions were illegal to obtain locally and so they found themselves

Some medically sound decisions were illegal to obtain locally and so they found themselves on a plane to Colorado over Mother's Day weekend to terminate this pregnancy to save the woman's health and future fertility as well as prevent suffering in the event the pregnancy resulted in a brief life. Perhaps the only reason this couple could speak to legislators in Albany about the enormity of their story was that subsequently, they did have a child who was playing happily at the table while they spoke. This is only one of many stories I have heard regarding access to this most crucial medical decision. Not every story includes abortion, though all include grappling with that possibility. Usually I am privy to these stories in the course of providing guidance to women and men who want to know what Judaism has to say about our reproductive lives.

January 28-29 was deemed Repro Shabbat by National Council of Jewish Women to coincide with Parshat Mishpatim, Exodus 21:1-24:18. Exodus 21:22 includes the legal provision that if two men are fighting and one inadvertently hits a pregnant woman causing a miscarriage, the penalty paid is one for damages similar to that of gouging out an eye or knocking out a tooth. The miscarriage is not considered a capital crime.

Jewish law distinguishes between actual life and potential life. Until a fetus is born it remains a potential life and the actual life of the mother takes precedence. It is the mother that Halacha protects in any instance where harm might come to the woman due to the fetus. Several places in the Talmud describe incidences where a laboring woman should be saved if the choice must be made between her life and delivering the fetus, so much so that the distasteful description is given of delivering each limb individually to spare the woman.

Sometimes the Talmud and subsequent halachic rulings deem a fetus to be a rodef, a nefarious pursuer, who must be killed to maintain its mother's health, physical or mental. As late as 1967, Rabbi Eliezer Waldenberg allowed for "abortion without hesitation" for the mother's health.

Today, we might also consider First Amendment issues when discussing reproductive rights. The Jewish position, which differs from other religious perspectives, is not as well known, even by Jews. Should abortion become illegal, Jews would be unable to obtain procedures allowed or even encouraged by Judaism. This would infringe on the free exercise of our faith, another slippery slope in the potential marginalization of Jews in the United States.

I am proud that Judaism recognizes women's bodily autonomy and will not force anyone to put themselves in harm's way. Certainly, we all want every pregnancy to result in a healthy and happy birth, but reality from Biblical times to the present, tells us that isn't always the case. When necessary, a scenario only the pregnant person can define, I stand ready to advise and support with all the information Judaism has to offer. I also will continue to assure that our American legal system will be able to provide these very Jewish options.

This year our shpiel will be "Friday Night Fever" written by our very own Barry Pelofsky and Neil Miller. It is a shpiel made up of the great music from the Bee Gees! Here you will find all your favorite Bee Gees music and players singing about Queen Esther and the gang. You are also more than welcome to participate in this year's shpiel. You don't have to have any acting or performance experience, just show up with a loud "BOO" for Haman and a desire to have a great time and enjoy yourself.

When you attend the Purim service, make sure to have your children dress up in costume. You can too! Purim is such a great time to laugh and enjoy yourself. We all know that in this day-and-age, we can use more laughter and fun in our lives!

This month we are focusing on the holiday of perseverance, strength and faith. The story of Purim represents courage and a fight to defend the Jewish people. Esther and her Uncle Mordechai created a bond with King Ahasuerus, "educating" him on Haman's evil plot to kill the Jews, consequently saving both of their lives and the Jewish people's lives. Today Anti-Semitism is on the rise. It is a global problem.

As a child I remember coming home from the second day of Rosh Hashanah services and finding a spraypainted swastika on our driveway. Today, the same symbol of hate is sprayed on buildings, parks, schools and various public settings.

Holocaust education is more than ever a significant fragment for today's school's curriculum. Together, we must educate our children to combat human hatred. Our seventh graders learn about the Holocaust and participate in many discussions regarding stories from our Jewish history, such as Purim and recent current events.

Most recently a tragic event took place at Congregation Beth Israel, a Reform Synagogue in Colleyville, Texas, where the Rabbi and three congregants were taken hostage. Thankfully they all survived. This horrific crime was another instance of scapegoating Jews. People from all faiths throughout the world offered support and prayers for the targeted community. However, more work needs to be done to combat hatred and ignorance. It is more imperative than ever that we continue to educate our children so they can be the wise voices of our future. We must stand together against Anti-Semitism.

On April 27, 2022, our seventh graders will once again lead a service commemorating Yom HaShoah. We will hear from a survivor retelling his or her story of the Holocaust. Our students will share their own sentiments on the subject. I look forward to seeing all of you either on zoom or in person.

#### Torah Notes:

#### March 5, 2022: Pekudei Exodus 38:21–40:38

An accounting is made of the gold, silver and copper donated by the people for the making of the Mishkan. Betzalel, Aholiav and their assistants make the eight priestly garments – the apron, breastplate, cloak, crown, hat, tunic, sash and breeches – according to the specifications communicated to Moses in the Parshah of Tetzaveh. The Mishkan is completed and all its components are brought to Moses, who erects it and anoints it with the holy anointing oil, and initiates Aaron and his four sons into the priesthood. A cloud appears over the Mishkan, signifying the Divine Presence that has come to dwell within it.

#### March 12, 2022: Vayikra Leviticus 1:1-5:26

This first Torah portion from the book of Leviticus focuses around the sacred offerings at the Sanctuary. It describes animal and meal sacrifices the people offer on the altar. These include an ascending offering, a meal offering, a peace offering, a sin offering and a guilt offering.

#### March 19, 2022: Tzav Leviticus 6:1-8:36

This week's Torah portion delineates the responsibilities and rights of the priests who offer sacrifices in the temple. It explains the importance of an eternal fire upon the altar and the ways sacrifices should be treated.

#### March 26, 2022: Shemini Leviticus 9:1-11:47

This portion is primarily concerned with the Temple sacrifices, laws for the Coheinim (the Priests) and dietary laws of the Jewish people. It contains a fascinating story of two young priests who enthusiastically offer a sacrifice to God . The Torah calls this sacrifice "strange fire," to which God responds by taking their lives. Their names were Nadav and Avihu. Their father, Aaron, struggles to mourn for the loss of his two sons while meeting the needs of the greater community. The portion concludes with an in-depth discussion on kashrut, including its laws and potential reasons for them.

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
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
