

Long Island Cares Shares Harry Chapin’s Dream with Students

During last month’s hunger awareness campaign, Christine Brown, the coordinator for community education at Long Island Cares—The Harry Chapin Food Bank, visited upper-grade TOEACRC students to share how they can help address the growing local hunger crisis.

The famous folk singer Harry Chapin founded Long Island Cares in 1980, just a year before his untimely death. “Harry never really got to see Long Island Cares up and running,” Christine said during her 45-minute Hunger 101 session with the students in the sanctuary. “But the main focus of his dream was of a hunger-free Long Island.”

Long Island Cares is the area’s largest Food Bank. In 2021, Long Island Cares distributed 14 million pounds of food, the equivalent of 11.5 million meals. It may come as a surprise that there are so many families in need, but that was the reason social action chair Susan Levine and director of lifelong learning Deborah Tract organized the March Hunger Awareness campaign at TOEACRC.

During the March 3 Shabbat service, Susan told congregants that the local community isn’t immune to the world’s “food insecurity” crisis. Approximately 230,000, including 68,000 children, are in need, she noted. One-third of those struggling to afford food aren’t eligible for food assistance programs. “While children are among the largest population of hungry, they have virtually no voice,” she said. “Their needs are easily dismissed and overlooked, and they must rely on others to access the feeding programs and services they need.”


Hopefully, the campaign will go beyond March, she concluded. “I hope you will continue to remember those families that need our support and continue to pick up a few cans of food each time you go to the market,” she said. Donations can be brought to the Temple or left in the container outside.



Rabbi's Corner

Everything I needed to know about Judaism I learned from the Seder- Four takeaways for Passover.

1. Freedom is never free. As we recite the plagues at our Seders, we spill a drop of wine at the mention of each plague. We remember that our freedom came at a human price. We also learn in receiving our Torah, that freedom is not a free for all, but a system of equity we must keep alive with our actions.
2. The prohibition of leaven is not only about food. While we remove all bread and leavened products from our homes and our diets during Passover, we also eat only the "bread of poverty" for the week. Passover is a time of humility, where we emulate Moses' chief quality. You will not find Moses' name in the Haggadah despite how integral he was to the Exodus. Sometimes we must not be so puffed up but be humble like Moses and the symbol of this holiday, the matza.
3. Let all who are hungry come and eat. We don't get very far in the Seder service before this statement is made. Little can be accomplished if our basic needs aren't met. Passover is about meeting basic needs, autonomy and having enough to be able to share. Today we practice this principle by inviting guests to join our Seders and by providing money or food so that those in need can celebrate.
4. Pour out your wrath upon our enemies. Though we rarely promote this portion of the Seder, there is an appropriate time to remember that we have enemies. We must be mindful that they will always exist, but through our true practice, we do not allow them victory. The arc of the universe is long, but it bends towards justice.

On Sunday, April 30th, look for a gala celebration for Israel's 75th birthday. We will put all politics aside and celebrate the culture of our homeland including music, Israeli dance, food and a Shuk (marketplace). Watch for details and join us to wish Israel a Happy Birthday!

As we know, they did not always face them with elegance or correct behavior. Remember the Golden calf! This did not mean the Hebrew people were not allowed to continue. They were, like we all are, Human. The Hebrew people faced their fears, made their mistakes, and learned from them. Thank goodness they did, because if they did not, we would not be here today.

This is the "other" meaning of Passover. It is a chance to dig in and take a real, honest look at what your fears may be. What may be holding you back in your life from becoming more of who you want to be? Try and use the example of the Hebrew people, their courage and determination, to inspire you to be courageous and strong. If you do, you will then be able to experience the other meaning of Passover - Freedom. Perhaps you will find a new personal freedom in your life.



As you sit at the seder table, give yourself a chance and a break. Don't forget the most important part of all - HAVE FUN!

Torah Portions



April 1, Tzav (Leviticus 6:1-8:36)

This portion delineates the responsibilities and rights of the priests who offer sacrifices in the temple. It explains the importance of an eternal fire upon the altar and the ways sacrifices should be treated.

April 8, Passover (Chol Ha'Moed) Exodus 33.12-34.26

This portion relates the story of the Exodus from Egypt, Pharaoh's change of heart, the Egyptian army's pursuit of the Israelites, the miraculous crossing through the Red Sea, the drowning of the Egyptian army as they too attempt to cross and the victorious Song of Thanksgiving to God.(Num. 28).

April 15, Shemini (Leviticus 9:1-11:47)

This portion is primarily concerned with the Temple sacrifices, laws for the Cohanim (the Priests) and dietary laws of the Jewish people. It contains a fascinating story of two young priests who enthusiastically offer a sacrifice to God. The Torah calls this sacrifice "strange fire," to which God responds by taking their lives. Their names were Nadav and Avihu. Their father, Aaron, struggles to mourn for the loss of his two sons while meeting the needs of the greater community. The portion concludes with an in depth discussion on kashrut, including its laws and potential reasons for them.

April 22, Tazria/Metzora – (Levit. 12:1-13:59, 14:1–15.33)

Tazria deals with laws of purification. These laws are considered to be both hygienic and 'levitical', related to religious law. This chapter deals in specific detail with purification after childbirth and the laws associated with the disease of leprosy. The health of the community was of sacred concern among the Israelites, so as to achieve spiritual well-being. Priests were given the responsibility for healing. We are taught that how we live, what we eat, how we think and act in our everyday lives is an important aspect in our religious/spiritual lives.

In Metzora, the rites and rituals of purification of a leper and the cleansing of the infected home are covered, as are other items of ritual impurity dealing with physical secretions.

April 29, Acharei-Mot (Leviticus 16:1-18:30)

Achrei-Mot deals with preparations by the High Priest for Yom Kippur. Only on Yom Kippur could the High Priest enter the Holy of Holies where the Ark of the Tablets was kept. Each Israelite was required to fast and atone on this day and to seek forgiveness from God and from each other. Also listed are the laws of prohibited marriages of close relatives, which was then common practice amongst the Egyptians and Canaanites.

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

TORAH RESTORATION PROJECT 2023



RESTORING THE PAST

Our Torah Scrolls are made of all natural components, parchment, wood, even the thread and ink used come from kosher animals and as such are subject to natural deterioration. Just as we receive care to stay in the best of health, so must the Torah Scrolls.



ENHANCING THE PRESENT

We now embark on the Circle of Life Torah Restoration Project. We have engaged Soferet in Residence (Torah Scribe) Jill Kaplan to repair our scrolls with the goal of having five Torah Scrolls in pristine condition. We currently have one Scroll in such condition. Four more scrolls must be cleaned, re-lettered, and in some cases re-sewn and have parchment repaired to meet our goal. All this takes the Soferet's skill and time. This essential and worthwhile Mitzvah will also require our community's minimum commitment of \$25,300 in Tzedakah money to complete this project. Any excess funds will be held in reserve to keep our scrolls in good condition well into the future. This campaign is an investment in the future of our Temple and Judaism.



ENSURING THE FUTURE

There are many opportunities for you to participate in this once in a lifetime Mitzvah. Soferet Jill Kaplan will be happy to entertain questions and provide opportunities for you to see her work while she is in residence. She is also meeting regularly with our Religious School students.

Special opportunities to work alongside Soferet Kaplan or observe unique repairs will be arranged as well as a thank you for your contribution to this project.

We are grateful for a dollar-for-dollar matching grant from our member, Arthur Katz, to help us reach our goal.
