Temple Teen Steps Up to Bring Awareness of Antisemitism

larmed by the rise in antisemitism nationwide and locally, which has reached its highest level in decades, TOEACRC teen Chase Brodsky is doing something about it. Chase, who completed her Jewish education at TOEACRC last year, culminating with her confirmation, announced an ambitious fundraising campaign earmarked for the American Jewish Community's (AJC) efforts to combat antisemitism through education and awareness programs.

Now a high school junior, Chase is VP of Jewish Programming, Social Action, and Community Service at the local <u>Summit Nesher</u> chapter of the <u>BBYO</u> (formerly known as B'nai B'rith Youth Organization). Chase addressed 75 attendees at last month's Summit Nesher Stand Up BBYO Brunch, where she announced the chapter's fundraising goal.

"We are looking to raise an unprecedented \$1,800 that will go towards educating Long Island teens about the problem of rising antisemitism and how we can stand up and speak out about it with knowledge and confidence," she said. Chase

demonstrated a poster with a montage of articles about antisemitism clipped from newspapers during the two weeks preceding the brunch.



education and awareness programs.

"I think this just shows how important this organization is and how important it is to educate everyone on this topic," she said. The AJA responded: "We are grateful the chapter has chosen AJC to raise funds for in 2023 and thank AJC Leaders for Tomorrow participant Chase Brodsky for her leadership!"

TOEACRC director of lifelong learning Deborah Tract shared a video of Chase's presentation in a <u>Facebook post</u> and said: "I commend Chase and wish her a heartfelt Mazal Tov on her advocacy and passion for lifelong Jewish Learning. Her proud parents, Dr. Neil and Kim Brodsky, are longtime members of our synagogue. They are committed to working with Chase to further expand her goals and desire to advocate and celebrate Judaism today, tomorrow and in the future."

The fundraising campaign will run through June 1. Those wishing to contribute can send their donations via Venmo to @Chase-Brodsky-1 or with a check made out to Chase Brodsky. In the memo field, write "Summit BBYO." All donors will receive receipts.

Rabbi's Corner

u B'Shvat, the Jewish Arbor Day, or New Year for the trees, the herald of Spring in Israel, occurs on February 6th this year. That Gregorian date corresponds to the 15th (tu) of the Hebrew month Shvat.

The rabbis of the Mishna teach that there are several New Years on our calendar. Think of them as fiscal years that don't always run from January to December. We are quite familiar with Rosh Hashana, our Jewish New Year, which falls on the first of Tishrei and is mentioned in the Torah.

TU B'SHAVAT CELEBRATES OUR CONNECTION TO THE LAND OF ISRAEL, ITS ECOLOGY AND ECOLOGY IN GENERAL.

A way to count the age of trees for tithing gave us the date of Tu B'Shvat. We are not obligated to tithe our produce but Tu B'shvat has become a day of commemoration anyway.

Now Tu B'Shvat celebrates our connection to the land of Israel, its ecology and ecology in general. We often think of the JNF, the Jewish National Fund at this time of year. That is the organization to which many turn, when they want to

provide a tribute or memorial and plant trees in Israel. We can credit the JNF with planting many forests throughout Israel.

Colonel Ilan Ramon, the Israeli astronaut lost in the Columbia disaster, was in orbit on Tu B'Shvat. "I call upon every Jew

in the world, to plant a tree in the land of Israel during the coming year," Ramon said from space. "I would like to see at least 13 or 14 million new trees planted in Israel," said the Israeli astronaut, whose first name, Ilan, literally means "tree". There are now memorial forests in Ramon's name.

Another ecological organization of note is the Society for the Preservation of Nature in Israel (SPNI). It is a wonderful resource for gains in preserving natural resources, environment, natural assets, and unique landscape of Israel. You can find more information about this organization at www.natureisrael.org.

When you visit Israel, I hope you have the opportunity to see the beautiful natural sights such as the springs of Ein Gedi, the birds of the Hula Valley and the gazelles of the Valley of Elah, right outside Jerusalem.

Until then, celebrate Tu B'Shvat and remember that spring is coming here too!

Cantor's Notes

he month of February offers us, as Jewish individuals and a community, a very special opportunity. This opportunity can be found in the holiday and celebration of Tu b'shevat. The holiday of Tu b'shevat falls on February 5 (evening) and February 6 (day). Tu b'shevat is celebrated on the 15th day of the month of Shevat.

What in the world is Tu b'shevat, you may be asking? Well, for starters, let's begin with the actual meaning of the holiday in a literal sense. The Hebrew word "Tu" stands for Hebrew letters tet and vav. which together have the numerical value of 9 and 6, adding up to 15.

Thus, "The 15th day of Shevat."

The English interpretation of the holiday has been referred to as "The Holiday of the Trees" or "The New Year of the Trees" or "The Jewish Arbor Day." Tu b'shevat is also noted as the date for calculating the beginning of the agricultural cycle, for the purpose of biblical tithes for the Jewish people. So, you can see from just this explanation alone, that Tu b'shevat is quite the holiday, even though you may have never heard of it!

Tu b'shevat has become a "green" holiday for Reform

Jews around the world. Many take the day to try and help the environment in any way they can. Some do this by planting a tree in Israel for themselves or a family member. Others walk to work, if possible, or take public transit on this day to reduce carbon emissions. Regardless of what you do, this year you can do something, as little as it may be, to connect yourself with the holiday, help the environment and enhance your connection to Judaism.

This holiday also reminds us of many of the benefits that trees and plants bring to us and how we could not survive without them. Gratitude, once again, becomes a predominant theme in the Jewish holiday cycle.

How lucky we are to have all that we have, including this wonderful planet, which is our responsibility to take care of and heal. I encourage you to try your best and do one small action towards celebrating Tu b'shevat. You may feel better and help our world all at the same time!

e are in the cold months of winter. January was a good month in our Religious School filled with learning, music, Torah Restoration and learning about Tu b'shevat. The Jewish holiday begins on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat. Jews all over the world celebrate trees and plants by eating a variety of fruits and planting a tree in Israel. The 24-hour celebration in Israel reminds us that spring will soon be arriving in Israel. The buds on trees are blooming and soon the trees will be filled with fruits, nuts and flowers.

I have heard from several college age students about their recent adventures in Israel through Birthright Israel. The Birthright Israel Organization gifts young adults the opportunity to visit Israel and explore their Jewish roots. This amazing opportunity strengthens their Jewish identity. Our curriculum in Religious School provides our children with a solid foundation for Jewish thought and understanding.

Today, colleges all over our country offer young adults, meaningful opportunities to study, visit and learn abroad. Over the December break, my son, a junior in college, traveled to Poland for a Jewish heritage trip. This turned into a transformative experience for 70 students. My son traveled back in time visiting places and learning about the catastrophe of the Holocaust that took the lives of many innocent people. He explored the walls of the Jewish ghettos and visited concentration death camps of Auschwitz and Treblinka.

Poland had a rich Jewish community prior to World War II. My son participated in a memorial service on the train tracks that transported Jewish people into the death camp of Auschwitz. While most ghettos were destroyed by the Nazis, my son touched the ghetto wall fragments, a reminder that the memory of the Jewish people lives on within our hearts. Cemeteries, synagogues and towns where our Jewish ancestors once walked were visited and remembered.

Our children are the future voices to combat antisemitism and Holocaust denial. My son and 69 other young people celebrated Shabbat together and concluded with Havdalah,



promising to bring honor and life to the Jewish souls that perished during the dark years in history. These young adults are proud to be Jewish. They will stand up to anyone who challenges the truth of the dreadful acts that took place.

My son studied in our Religious School and was well prepared for what he saw. Our students in 7th grade will lead our Yom HaShoah Service in April. May we all continue to learn and remain proud of who we are as Jews.

February Anniversaries



Torah Portions



February 4, Beshalach, Exodus 13:17-17:16

The story of the Exodus from Egypt reaches its climax, as the Hebrews flee. Pharaoh changes his mind about letting the people go and sends his army to retrieve them. The Hebrews come to the Sea of Reeds. Before them is a body of water too deep and too long to cross. Behind them are Egyptian soldiers. They are trapped. Suddenly, the water begins to part and the Hebrews are able

to pass through as if on dry land. The water then closes behind them so that the Egyptian army cannot follow. As the Israelites reach the other side, they joyously sing the words *Mi Chamocha* "Who is like you, O God?" God provides the Hebrews with food called Manna. When the people complain about water, Moses hits a rock with his rod and water gushes out.

February 11, Yitro, Exodus 18:1-20:23

The portion is named for Moses' father in law, Yitro (Jethro), who comes to the Israelite camp with Moses' wife Zipporah and their two sons. Yitro watches Moses working in his role as judge and convinces him to create a hierarchy of courts filled with many judges. The newly liberated Israelites walk through the desert until they arrive at Mount Sinai. They agree to God's law and prepare for God's holy instructions. On the third day of preparation, Moses begins to climb up Mt. Sinai. He receives the Ten Commandments, all of which appear in this Torah portion.

February 18, Mishpatim, Exodus 21:1-24:18

Roughly translated as "laws" or "judgements," the Torah portion *Mishpatim* contains civil and criminal laws, as well as ritual-related provisions. The Torah discusses slavery, serfdom and injury law. Laws about theft, property, idolatry, false rumors and treatment of an enemy also appear in this portion. There is particular focus on how we treat those most vulnerable in our society, which at that time included strangers, orphans and widows. Finally, the text turns to ritual matters such as Shabbat and the three festivals (Sukkot, Pesach and Shavuot). God then instructs Moses on how to approach Mount Sinai so that he can receive the Ten Commandments.

February 25, Terumah, Exodus 25:1-27:19

God asks the Israelites to "make for Me a sanctuary so I may dwell amongst them." This portion contains a blueprint for construction of this Tabernacle. It discusses some important symbols that should appear in the tabernacle, including the menorah, ark and altar. Complete with materials, dimensions and detailed instructions, this portion is any architect's delight.



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

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

There have been multiple ads in the local newspapers, websites, and Facebook.

Caterer Contract Negotiation Committee for December BOT (Neil)

As previously reported, we have come to tentative agreements with Hasson on yearly minimum payments, per-head fees and the length of the contract. We then met with Hasson to discuss other issues. Although there are other issues under discussion and more minor issues that have not been discussed, we sent a proposed contract to the Hassons on December 2. We have not yet had a response. More informatinon will be discussed in the closed session.

Ritual (Len) Report of Ritual Meeting on December 8, 2022

- 1. Torah Restoration Project Rabbi Judy shared before and after pictures received from Jill Kaplan illustrating areas of major soiling. "Copy" for the printed material is printer ready, as well as the donation levels and artwork. The total cost to date is \$4,900, and so far, we are under board approved budget of \$6,000. The fundraising project will "kick off" on January 1, 2023.
- 2. The Channukah service will take place on Friday, December 23. Nishama will perform, and families are encouraged to light their menorahs collectively at the service.
- 3. Rabbi Judy discussed revising the method for handling the:

Misheberach list - If a congregation member is added to the new list, the name will be read aloud for two weeks. The complete list will continue to be distributed with the Friday night notice. Congregants in the Sanctuary may add any names they wish.

- 1. The Rabbi will include all names silently in her prayer.
- 2. Yahrzeit list The list of people who died this year and the yahrzeits will continue to be read aloud, but in a reorganized fashion, divided into those who died this week (Shiva), the past 30 days (Shloshim), and the rest of the year (Shana) for members and parents (for whom Kaddish is said for 11 months). Kaddish is traditionally recited for 11 months ONLY for parents- we will include congregation members for 11 months even if the survivor is not the deceased's child.
- 3. Various methods of encouraging congregants to attend services were discussed.

Network of Women (Robin Grossman)

- Our next meeting is on January 23 via Zoom.
- January 29 will be our annual AED CPR certification. If you are a member of NOW you can reserve a spot on us (for the first 15 people). Once those spots are filled, each attendee will cost \$85 pp. Please see the flyer attached.
- There is still time to order your 2023 Mah Jongg Card. Please see attached flyer.
- \$10,000 was donated to the Temple to help complete the Library Renovation Project.
- The next Book Club discussion will be on January 30, and the book is The Librarian Spy by Madeline Martin. See attached flyer.
- I am putting together two new classes: one for Mah Jongg strategies and one for Canasta Strategies. We need a minimum of 8 to run the class. See the flyers on the next page.
