A Fond Farewell to Rabbi Judy

abbi Judy will officiate her final Erev Shabbat service on Friday, June 23 and one final Torah study the following morning, capped off by the Concert Against Hate with Cantor Katz and Friends on Sunday, June 25.

Last month's Shabbat service and Kiddush to honor Rabbi Judy in advance of her pending retirement was a moving event, marked by the return of the choir and heartfelt remarks from Rabbi Emeritus Harvey Abramowitz, Cantor Katz, Deborah Tract and board of trustees president Mark Natelson.

The event was the culmination of planning that began in February with a committee led by Cary Markman, with Jeanie Corn, Laurel Fried, Jessica Gerschitz, Robin Grossman, Jeff Schwartz, Pat Tulchin and Deena Yaris.

Over 50 people contributed to a scrapbook that Robin organized and created, with shared memories of letters, poems and photos.

"I will cherish all the words and sentiments, but most of all, all of you. I really cherish the time that we that we



spent together, and I hope that through visits through Zoom in all different ways, Facebook, we continue our journey together, so thank you so much," Rabbi Judy said as Cary presented the scrapbook.

'Woman of Valor'

Besides deciding on food, décor, and other details leading up to the event, the committee spent many weeks considering gifts for Rabbi Judy. The committee selected a pair of earrings with blue topaz and diamonds, set in 14k white gold, and a custom artwork designed by a former congregant.

"His unique concepts are digitally designed using archival museum board, precision cut, personalized and hand-painted," Jeanie told Rabbi Judy as she presented it. "It says: 'a woman of valor: who can find her. She is far more precious than jewels.' And that's very true."



Summer Torah Portions



June 3, Naso - Numbers 4:21-7:89

A continued description of the duties of the Levites, laws relating to ritual uncleanliness; people with diseases were not permitted to live within camp limits, the laws of the Nazerites (those who took upon themselves obligations that were beyond those required, like not cutting their hair, not drinking any wine, avoiding contact with any dead body, etc.). It was a sacred promise made to God.

June 10, Beha'alotcha – Numbers 8:1-12:16

This portion deals with the lighting of the 7-branched menorah by

Aaron, observance of the 2nd annual Passover, the making of the two silver trumpets (shofrot), the three acts of opposition to Moses: the people's demanding meat in addition to manna, the breaking away of two of the elders of Israel and Moses' confrontation with his siblings, Aaron & Miriam.

June 17, Sh'lach, Numbers 13:1 – 15:41

The famous story of the twelve spies sent to survey the land of Canaan in preparation of its conquest is told in this portion. Joshua and Caleb, the two remaining spies, oppose the negative majority report by the other ten spies. The anger of the people and their threat to return to Egypt is the catalyst for the decision by God that this people is not ready for the challenge of freedom and that their entire generation will have to live out their lives in the desert. Their children, the next generation, will be the ones who will enter the Promised Land.

June 24, Korach - Numbers 16:1-18:32

The chapter recounts the uprising against Moses by Korach and 250 members of the tribe of Reuben. They claimed that Moses was taking too much power for himself, and they too were eligible for leadership positions. Moses was stunned; he had shared the leadership responsibility by spreading it among the 70 elders, judges, and tribal chiefs. The rebellion was put down when the earth opened and swallowed up Korach and all his followers.

July 1, Chukkat - Numbers 19:1-22:1

This portion expands on the laws of purification and provides for the removal of defilement resulting from contact with the dead. The particulars of this ordinance are considered to be the most mysterious rites in the Torah.

July 8, Pinchas, Numbers 25:10-30:1

This chapter recounts the misbehavior of many Israelites who had accepted the invitation of women of Moab and Midian and joined in their licentious rites in worship of the idol Baal-Peor. Filled with indignation, Pinchas, a Kohen, executed summary judgement on Zimri and Cozbi, the Israelites who misled so many.

July 15, Mattot/Masei- Num. 30:2-32:42 / 33:1-35:13

The first of these two chapters emphasizes the solemnity and binding character of religious vows and specifies circumstances in which vows can be annulled. The second portion details the stages of the journey of the Israelites all the way from Egypt to the Plains of Moab.

July 22, Devarim- Deut. 1:1-3:22

The name of this Fifth Book and concluding 'book' of the Torah, and its title might well be "Moses Final Discourses and Song to Israel". It is an oratory, given in noble language to the great truths that God is One, humankind is wholly His and that God is Righteousness, Faithfulness, Mercy and Love. In this chapter we find the central declaration of the Jewish people, the Shma.

July 19, Va-Etchanan- Deut. 3:23-7:11

Moses continues his review of the people's history of interactions with God, discussing the signs of God's favor to his people shown in their victories. He laments that he will be able only to view the land but would not be able to enter it and commits the future leadership of the people to Joshua, his successor.



August 5, Ekev- Deut. 7:12-11:25

The blessings inherent to those who obey the laws given in the Torah are detailed here, chief among them being prosperity, vitality, power and health. Moses includes an appeal to the Israelites to remember their history to motivate their fulfilling their fundamental duties to love God and observe His commandments.

August 12, Re'eh- Deut. 11:26-16:17

"Behold, I set before you a blessing and a curse. The blessing (comes) if you observe the commandments of the Lord, Your God. The curse (comes) if you do not obey the commandments but ignore the way you have been given and choose to worship other gods". With these challenging words, Moses reviews the Codes of Law to be observed by the people.

August 19, Shoftim- Deut. 16:18-21:9

This portion defines the legal system and the roles of the leaders; the judges, the king, the priests and the prophets - all of them officers of the Hebrew commonwealth. Provisions are to be made for an ordered civil government, justice must be free, accessible and absolutely impartial.

August 26, Ki-Tetze- Deut. 21:10-25:19

The wide-ranging laws of domestic life and human kindness are the subjects of this portion of Moses' continuing discourse, dealing with matters such as marriage to a captive of war, the rights of the first-born, dealing with discourtesy and disobedience, returning lost property and appropriateness of apparel. The sanctity of marriage, adultery and family relations are among the many topics covered in this chapter.

TORAH RESTORATION PROJECT 2023



RESTORING THE PAST

Our Torah Scrolls are made of all natural components, parchment, wood, even the thread and ink used come from kosher animals and as such are subject to natural deterioration. Just as we receive care to stay in the best of health, so must the Torah Scrolls.



ENHANCING THE PRESENT

We now embark on the Circle of Life Torah Restoration Project. We have engaged Soferet in Residence (Torah Scribe) Jill Kaplan to repair our scrolls with the goal of having five Torah Scrolls in pristine condition. We currently have one Scroll in such condition. Four more scrolls must be cleaned, re-lettered, and in some cases re-sewn and have parchment repaired to meet our goal. All this takes the Soferet's skill and time. This essential and worthwhile Mitzvah will also require our community's minimum commitment of \$25,300 in Tzedakah money to complete this project. Any excess funds will be held in reserve to keep our scrolls in good condition well into the future. This campaign is an investment in the future of our Temple and Judaism.

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
