The perfect time to check them out will be on Saturday morning, April 3. That is our Passover Yizkor service, at which we will be dedicating the new memorial boards. Please join us. As always, the seating in the sanctuary will be properly socially distanced.

Equally as gratifying is seeing how so many people and branches of the temple are going above and beyond to get us all through the pandemic. Whether it's the Wednesday night yoga classes that commenced this past month, the Rabbi's "Open Chats", the Cantor's meditation sessions, the fun programs Deborah has done at the religious school or NOW's book club discussions (just to name a few), we have been able to hold and engage our membership more than anyone would have thought possible when our world was shaken almost exactly one year ago. #### Rabbi's Corner:

On the Hebrew calendar, we have been through the entire Jewish year under Covid-19 restrictions, having just celebrated our second remote Purim. March marks a full secular calendar year of the same. By the end of March, we will celebrate another zoom Passover Seder on Sunday, March 28<sup>th</sup>. Once again, I invite you virtually to join my family Seder. Set your table and share your rituals with everyone.



Each year I prepare a traditional Seder plate and beginning with an orange for LGBT+ inclusion (it was really never about women) I also put together a seder plate of contemporary symbols. I use olives to symbolize our desire for peace, a banana for the safety of refugees, a tomato for the need for innovation and this year, I will add a symbol of our common battle against Coronavirus. The easy symbol would be a mask, but I like to keep the parallel with the traditional seder plate by using a symbolic food. Perhaps I will place a bit of chicken broth to represent healing on this second plate. I want to remain hopeful and incorporate the progress we have made in the past year, but still recognize the lengths we have to go as well as how much we've lost. Broth with no kneidlach portrays what I want to express.

As you have seen elsewhere in the Shofar, our consolidation continues. I am so grateful to all who worked to "Make a home for CRT at TOE", especially Michael Wilner, for completing the huge project to get the CRT memorial plaques hung in our Sanctuary. They are beautiful and fit in the Sanctuary perfectly. While I hope everyone feels comfortable already, these ever-present memorial boards signify a true homecoming for legacy CRT families. We will dedicate the plaques at the Passover service with Yizkor on Saturday, April 3<sup>rd</sup> at 10 am.

From my home to yours, Mike, Micah and Leora join me in wishing you a joyous and sweet Passover.


#### Please read this notice before writing a check to Rabbi's or Cantor's Discretionary Fund!

#### Cantor's Message:

Last month we celebrated Purim. The holiday where we vow to never forget the tyrannical people in our history who would stop at nothing to eliminate us as a people.





The question remains however, how do we make sure we keep this reminder present without walking around being full of anxiety and fear, while still living a fulfilling and happy life.

The answer is not straight forward and simple but it is possible to not be overwhelmed.

One of the best ways to enjoy life without worrying is to contribute to your community, especially the Temple. This means giving of yourself in the best way you know how, whether it is on the PTA or coaching our kids' sports teams or helping out at Temple. In some way, contributing without asking for anything in return is the best way we can feel better deep inside ourselves and not just on the level of knowing we did something good. By giving freely we feel a much deeper connection to the spiritual side of ourselves.

We wish all of our congregants a joyous Passover. Remember to enjoy every day that provides us with beautiful weather...get outside and enjoy the gift.



#### Torak Notes:

March 6: Ki Tisa (Exodus 30:11-34:35)

This Torah portion begins discussing the creation of the Sanctuary. Israelites are asked to contribute a half shekel of silver to create it. God places "wise hearted" artisans Betzalel and Oholiav in charge of the Sanctuary's construction. The Torah portion then switches abruptly to Moses, who did not return from Mt. Sinai quick enough for the anxious Israelites. They create a golden calf and begin to worship it. Upon seeing the Israelites dancing to an idol, a distressed Moses breaks the tablets containing the Ten Commandments. After begging for God's forgiveness Moses receives the Ten Commandments once more.

March 13: Vayakhail-Pekudei (Exodus 35:1-40:38)

This chapter tells of the plans and details concerning the building of Israel's first house of worship. This all takes place in the Wilderness of Sinai as the people progress on their long march to the Promised Land. A voluntary contribution campaign system is set up by Moses and the people give generously, funds about which much speculation became centered.

An accounting is made of the gold, silver and copper donated by the people for the making of the Mishkan. Betzalel, Aholiav and their assistants make the eight priestly garments – the apron, breastplate, cloak, crown, hat, tunic, sash and breeches – according to the specifications communicated to Moses in the Parshah of Tetzaveh. The Mishkan is completed and all its components are brought to Moses, who erects it and anoints it with the holy anointing oil, and initiates Aaron and his four sons into the priesthood. A cloud appears over the Mishkan, signifying the Divine Presence that has come to dwell within it.

March 20: Vayikra (Leviticus 1:1-5:26)

This first Torah portion from the book of Leviticus focuses around the sacred offerings at the Sanctuary. It describes animal and meal sacrifices the people offer on the altar. These include an ascending offering a meal offering, a peace offering, a sin offering and a guilt offering.

March 27: Tzav (Leviticus 6:1-8:36)

This week's Torah portion delineates the responsibilities and rights of the priests who offer sacrifices in the temple. It explains the importance of an eternal fire upon the altar and the ways sacrifices should be treated.

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
