Many of you who heard this prayer during Erev Shabbat services, asked for a copy and I am happy to provide it. This beautiful prayer was written by Rabbi Naomi Levy of Nashuva in Los Angeles. There is, however convoluted, a connection to us at TOEACRC. In Brooklyn, from the 1950s-1980s, there was a small bi-cultural Jewish Day School called the Bialik School. It instilled in its graduates a love of Judaism, Israel and a respect for the entire Jewish community. I was privileged to attend this school and so was Naomi Levy. She and I along with three other women, Jill Kreitman, Haviva Kushner Horvitz and Ellen Wolintz Fields, all became rabbis in the early stages of women's ordination in the Reform and Conservative movements. Shortly after Robin Rabinowitz began working at Temple, we played Jewish geography and we realized that Robin, too, is a Bialik School graduate. At this time of physical distancing, it takes very little to feel close to those far off. Please enjoy this prayer.

Rabbi's Corner:

Mi Sheberach Avoteinu Abraham, Yitzhak, V'Ya'akov, v'Imoteinu Sarah, Rivka, Leah, v'Rachel, May the God who blessed our ancestors bless us, our families and friends, with good health, healing of body and spirit, along with all others in need of these prayers. Amen.

We are trying very hard to maintain physical distance while remaining socially close. We have been live-streaming our services and have initiated classes and meetings through Zoom. I am very proud of how we have mobilized to meet our commitments and your needs under such extraordinary circumstances.

Most of all, I hope to be able to guide everyone to living a "new normal". That new normal will make us more respectful of each other, more appreciative of our friends and neighbors, more willing to help one another and more aware of our interdependence.

In the Torah, we are told that each of us stood at Sinai to receive the Torah. Each person, whether of high station or low, participated. Through this virus we have learned that we need doctors and custodians, store clerks and nurses. Each of us has a respected role to play in society. Pirkei Avot, Ethics of the Fathers asks, "who is wise, one who learns from everyone, who is honored, one who honors all people." To paraphrase for today, who is essential, all who work for the good of a community. That should be all of us.

Our seventh-grade class, led by Deborah Tract and their teachers, have been studying the Holocaust this school year. They are participating in a twinning program where each student is given the name of a child who did not survive to the age of thirteen. Here is an essay by Ariella Siegel, who will become a Bat Mitzvah with a service at Temple very soon:

As part as my bat mitzvah, I'm honoring Cilike Feig. Cilike was born in Vulcan, Romania in August 1932. Sadly, she was sent to Auschwitz in Poland. It was the biggest and most famous concentration camp. On May 24, 1944 she unfortunately died at 11 years old, meaning, she wasn't able to become a Bat Mitzvah. Because of this, I would like to honor her in my service and make sure she is remembered. Learning about the Holocaust has made me realize how important it is to be Jewish. It is our duty as Jews to carry on our traditions from generation to generation.

Mazal Tov to Ariella and all her classmates. We are so proud of you.

I also have missed the sanctuary full of your voices singing on Shabbat and your faces in the pews as certain prayers and music wash over you.

I also do not think I will ever get used to leading services in our beautiful sanctuary with not one soul in the pews. This has been a surreal and "twilight zone" type of scenario for the last few months. At the same time, I am so glad that you have been able to watch from your homes and share services with the Rabbi and I while we do our best to bring you the music and prayers.

I think I have truly learned some very important things during this pandemic. Most importantly I have learned how fragile we and life really are. The fact that at any moment we can be taken down or seriously wounded by an unknown and unseen energy is quite eye opening. It made me really focus on what is truly important in life and what really matters, as I sit inside day after day and am unable to even have human contact with those outside of my family.

I have come to understand how truly important community and our Temple is. Without it, we have nothing. When we are in need and require help from those in our community and cannot get help literally, it becomes very clear to me how important you all are.

So, in the end, this Passover and these last few months has made me more aware and grateful for all of you in our temple community.

Thank you for being there during these difficult times and thank you for being a vital and loved part of our Temple.



Torah Notes:

May 2, 2020 Acharei-Mot Leviticus 16:1-18:30 / Kedoshim Leviticus 19:1-20:27

Acharei-Mot deals with preparations by the High Priest for Yom Kippur. Only on Yom Kippur could the High Priest enter the Holy of Holies where the Ark of the Tablets was kept. Each Israelite was required to fast and atone on this day and to seek forgiveness from God and from each other. Also listed are the laws of prohibited marriages of close relatives, which was then common practice amongst the Egyptians and Canaanites.

Kedoshim contains a survey and summary of the foundations of Judaism. Israel must consider life as sacred. "You shall be holy for I your God am holy". Everything we do is to be considered in terms of how it fits into God's plan for us.

May 9, 2020 **Emor Leviticus 21:1-24:23**

A presentation of the Law of the Priests: for mourning, marriage, factors that disqualify a priest, laws of the Sabbath and Holidays, duties of the priests, keeping the sanctuary lamp burning, freshly baked challot on the table each Sabbath, other laws dealing with blasphemy, murder, assault, and punishment for crimes. Equality of treatment for all is mandated.

May 16, 2020 Behar Leviticus 25:1-26:2 / Bechukotai Leviticus 26:3-27:34

Behar defines the relationship between man and the Earth – the balance to be achieved based upon the acceptance that the Earth is the Lord's. Man is only given the privilege of using it to sustain himself, never to abuse the land. Establishment of the Sabbatical every seventh year as a rest for the soil is introduced.

Bechukotai is the last portion of the Book of Leviticus and describes Israel's voluntary contributions to the upkeep of the Sanctuary – a tradition of generosity towards the support and preservation of our houses of worship. Moses challenges Israel to choose the way of Torah as its basis for a way of life.

May 23, 2020 **Bamidbar Numbers 1:1-4:20**

Here we read a detailed report on the census taken of all the adult males of Israel, those able to do battle. Moses appoints the twelve heads of the tribes as representatives to carry out the assignment. The result of the census showed that there were 603,550 Israelite men above the age of twenty who were in fit condition and did not belong to the priesthood and were thus qualified to serve in the upcoming battles.

May 30, 2020 Second Day Shavuot Deut. 14:22–16:17

This portion includes the biblical commandment to consecrate the first-born males of the flock to God. It then turns to the commandment to observe three pilgrimage festivals — Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot, and enumerates the laws prohibiting the consumption of leavened products on Passover.



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
