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# Students Vow to Never Forget the Holocaust and To Stand Up Against Antisemitism

uring last month's Yom HaShoah service, TOEACRC's 7th graders all pledged they would never let the atrocities of the Holocaust be forgotten by their generation and those who will come

after them.

The students, and those attending or viewing the eve of Yom HaShoah service, also heard from Holocaust survivor Mireille Taub, who shared the separate stories of how she and her husband survived and the experiences they encountered.

Eva Ginsburg, an 11th grade student, and a teaching assistant at TOEACRC, thanked Mrs. Taub for sharing her family's stories, promising they would never let stories like hers be forgotten.

"Your bravery to come forward and dedicate your time to share your story ensures that the next generation, and generations after that, will learn about the Holocaust,"

Ms. Ginsburg said. "It is important to know the pain inflicted upon the Jews and others and their ability to persevere and make it through difficult times. We are grateful and fortunate to have survivors like yourself, to retell the stories and thank you again for continuing to spread awareness."

Mrs. Taub responded by thanking the students for being so welcoming and attentive. "If you see an injustice, you need to deal with it immediately," she said. "You can't let someone else do it. It is our responsibility to look out for one another."

Yom HaShoah, which is Holocaust Remembrance Day in Israel and around the world, this year took on (Continued on the Next Page)

even greater importance, given the sharp rise in antisemitism in the United States and worldwide. TOEACRC's Director of Lifelong Learning, Deborah Tract, who arranged for Mrs. Taub's attendance through the Holocaust Memorial and Tolerance Center of Nassau County in Glen Cove, shared some sobering statistics.

For example, Mrs. Tract noted that antisemitic incidents targeting synagogues and college campuses rose 36% last year, among other targets. There were 3,697 known incidents in the U.S., including

harassment, vandalism and assault.

"We should never stand silent, and we must continue to educate our youth, never allowing hate to come between us from living a fruitful Jewish life," she said. "We should not have to defend our Jewish identity. We must remain proud of who we are and continue teaching our children as

we have done tonight in this very synagogue at Temple or Elohim, A Community Reform Congregation. Our youth and our synagogue stand up to hate. We shall never forget and never allow this to happen again."

The students share that view. "Antisemitism is real," Ms. Ginsburg told Mrs. Taub. "And now Jews are experiencing it more than ever."

#### **President's Column**

his is an article that I had hoped to have written many years from now. Rabbi Judy is retiring after a 35-plus-year career. Personally, I've known her for over 20 of those years.

Once upon a time, 21 years ago before the High Holy Days, when our oldest son Ben was in second grade, Celeste said, "If you want to join a Temple, maybe you should start looking now." So off I went with Ben to services at a variety of synagogues. The first two I took him to were called "children's services," but they turned out to be the regular service children were allowed to attend. Ben quickly fell asleep both times, so I took them out of contention.

I found an ad for a children's service at CRT for Yom Kippur. I should mention that I got Ben a Superman yarmulke before Yom Kippur, that he wanted to wear. So off we went. We got to CRT and sat in the back of the sanctuary. We didn't know anyone there, and just before the service began, we heard a voice behind us say "Nice kippah" to Ben. That was our two-word introduction to Rabbi Judy. During the service, when we got to the story of Jonah and the whale, she invited all the children to sit on the Bima steps while she read them

Yes, Rabbi Judy is leaving, but her legacy will live on with us. the story. I distinctly remember thinking, "That's how it should be done; make it interesting for the children." Leaving that service with a happy son, I knew we'd be back the following year to see about joining CRT.

The following year we did join CRT and enrolled Ben in 3rd grade and Zach in kindergarten. Zach, by the way, now had a Power Rangers yarmulke. Here we are 20 years and numerous services, events, laughter, and tears later, my Rabbi and

friend is retiring and moving away. Celeste, Ben, Zach and I wish her, Mike, Micah and Leora all the happiness in the world.

Yes, Rabbi Judy is leaving, but her legacy will live on with us. When she announced her retirement, I told her that while she will be physically leaving, the impact she has had on me has been profound, and I would not be the Jew and the person I am today without her in my life. Through her, I found my spirituality, a friend and someone whose sense of humor was as weird as mine. Excluding the humor, I know many of you feel the same way.

Both our sons love her. Ben went to SUNY Stony Brook and would come home once a month for the family service just to spend time with Rabbi during the Oneg. She is also one of the few adults Zach listens to and respects. All the kids in the school at both legacy congregations are crazy about her. To this day, many former students keep in contact with her. This is so important, as their experience is the foundation they will refer to

when it comes time for them to decide on providing a Jewish education to their children. Let's face it, perpetuating our religion and culture is one of our prime missions, and Rabbi Judy excels at it.

Rabbi was in the hospital room with us when my dad passed away, somehow making a 40-minute drive to the hospital in 20 minutes. I'll never forget that.

The few times I was in a hospital, guess who visited me? I can go on and on, but the important thing is that her compassion, dedication, and personality make her an outstanding person and Rabbi.

Since the consolidation, she has been integral to the success of Temple Or Elohim, A Community Reform Congregation. I never expected anything less from her, and she has exceeded all expectations.

I realized that it's hard to see someone you love and value as a friend and teacher move on. It is hard because we care so much about her and what she has given us. But on the bright side, we can all stay in contact with her.

Instead of saying goodbye, I am choosing to say thank you to Rabbi Judy (and I don't think I can say it enough) for what she has given us. Thanks to Mike, Leora, and Micah for being friends and, among other things, taking Ben and I to see Welcome to Night Vale (you had to be there). Thank you, Rabbi Judy!!!!

#### **Torah Portions**



#### May 6, Emor- Leviticus 21:1-24:23

A presentation of the Law of the Priests: for mourning, marriage, factors that disqualify a priest, laws of the Sabbath and Holidays, duties of the priests, keeping the sanctuary lamp burning, freshly baked challot on the table each Sabbath, other laws dealing

with blasphemy, murder, assault and punishment for crimes. Equality of treatment for all is mandated.

#### May 13, Behar/Behoukotai - Leviticus 25:1-27:34

Behar defines the relationship between man and the Earth – the balance to be achieved based upon the acceptance that the Earth is the Lord's. Man is only given the privilege of using it to sustain himself, never to abuse the land. Establishment of the Sabbatical every seventh year as a rest for the soil is introduced. Bechukotai is the last portion of the Book of Leviticus and describes Israel's voluntary contributions to the upkeep of the Sanctuary – a tradition of generosity towards the support and preservation of our houses of worship. Moses challenges Israel to choose the way of Torah as its basis for a way of life.

#### May 20, Bamidbar, Numbers 1:1-4:20

Here we read a detailed report on the census taken of all the adult males of Israel, those able to do battle. Moses appoints the twelve heads of the tribes as representatives to carry out the assignment. The result of the census showed that there were 603,550 Israelite men above the age of twenty who were in fit condition and did not belong to the priesthood and were thus qualified to serve in the upcoming battles.

#### May 27, Second day of Shavuot, Deuteronomy 14:22–16:17

Moses instructed that the Israelites were to set aside every year a tenth of their harvest. They were to consume the tithes of their new grain, wine, and oil, and the firstlings of their herds and flocks, in the presence of God in the place where God would choose.

#### TORAH RESTORATION PROJECT 2023



#### RESTORING THE PAST

Our Torah Scrolls are made of all natural components, parchment, wood, even the thread and ink used come from kosher animals and as such are subject to natural deterioration. Just as we receive care to stay in the best of health, so must the Torah Scrolls.



#### ENHANCING THE PRESENT

We now embark on the Circle of Life Torah Restoration Project. We have engaged Soferet in Residence (Torah Scribe) Jill Kaplan to repair our scrolls with the goal of having five Torah Scrolls in pristine condition. We currently have one Scroll in such condition. Four more scrolls must be cleaned, re-lettered, and in some cases re-sewn and have parchment repaired to meet our goal. All this takes the Soferet's skill and time. This essential and worthwhile Mitzvah will also require our community's minimum commitment of \$25,300 in Tzedakah money to complete this project. Any excess funds will be held in reserve to keep our scrolls in good condition well into the future. This campaign is an investment in the future of our Temple and Judaism.

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
