Rabbi's Corner:

We are on our way to a wonderful 5781! Sukkot is the perfect holiday to be celebrated despite COVID-19. Being a harvest festival, Sukkot is celebrated not only in the synagogue, but outside, in the Sukkah. Our plan calls for the Sukkah to be raised just before Kol Nidre (which hasn't occurred as of this writing, but will have by your reading) and decorated just after Yom Kippur. Pizza in the Hut and the Fourth Grade Siddur Ceremony along with a Sukkot and Shabbat Service will take place on Erev Sukkot, October 2nd.



Sukkot can be celebrated at home as well. This might be the year to take on the mitzvah of building your own Sukkah. Because it is supposed to be a temporary structure, to stand only for a week, it need not be a major construction project. Www.myjewishlearning.com has an article entitled "How to Build a Sukkah" which includes directions originally printed in The Jewish Catalog, a how to manual for Jewish life which is an oldie but goodie. They are time tested, clear and easy, even for someone like me who took Talmud instead of Shop in high school.

Even if you choose not to erect a Sukkah in your yard at home, you can still celebrate this fall festival. Decorate your home for the season. Local farm stands will have gourds and dried corn, you can order mums from NOW. The mums will arrive just after Sukkot but will keep the spirit of the festival alive. Eat your meals outdoors. If you are comfortable, Sukkot is a time of USHPIZIN, inviting guests to your Sukkah or back yard to enjoy your holiday hospitality. There is even a custom of inviting people who share the names of our Patriarchs and Matriarchs, so all you Avrahams, Yitzhaks, Yaakovs, Sarahs, Rivkas, Rachels and Leahs, it is your lucky day!

Sukkot is described in the Talmud as being the most joyous of our holidays. It is accessible for us even under COVID restrictions and we are certainly deserving of the joy Sukkot can bring.



I draw inspiration for a monthly article from all sorts of sources; could be a news article, some meme from Facebook, a line from a book, etc. This time I received my inspiration from a former congregant as he was recently promoted to a new title at a digital imaging magazine. So, the inspiration, with a twist, is WHAT IF...?



Sure, we are in unprecedented times. I am pretty sure no one reading this article has had any experience with the 1918 Flu Pandemic. But, all of you reading this have experienced and continue to experience what it is like to be in the covid-19 pandemic. So, what if this pandemic never happened? So many of us would not have had the opportunity to clean out our closets, drawers, crawl spaces, basements and garages. We learned better handwashing techniques, we learned to be a masked society and we learned new words such as social distancing and zoom.

To paraphrase J.G., "what if" this pandemic never happened we never would have:

To make a donation on-line, go to the home page of our Temple's website, <u>orelohim.com</u>, scroll down to the "Donate Now" button and click on it. You will be brought to a different webpage. Fill in Account (credit card) Information. Then, fill in your Billing Information. At the end of this section there is a required field entitled "Purpose of Donation" which has a drop-down menu of 6 listings. If the donation does not fit any of the first 4 options, then click on either "Specific Purpose" or "Other". Then, underneath the "Purpose of Donation" line, there is another required field entitled "Donation Details". You should enter the particular reason for the donation, for example "High Holiday Appeal", "High Holiday Card" or "Honey From Your Heart"." Complete the transaction.


