As we become further removed from the beginnings of a tradition, we must view it through the lens of the world of today and not be slaves to the past.

As we enter 5781 and the second year of our consolidation of 2 tradition-rich legacy temples, we must continue to develop New Traditions based upon what works best for all of us. What works best for TOE,ACRC for any particular practice may be the TOE way, the CRT way, some combination of the two, or a completely new way. We have had to innovate and improvise during these last 6 months to constantly bring the Temple into our homes. In some ways, we are better for it. Despite being compelled to do so many things by streaming and zoom, we have been able to identify, retain and find new ways to accentuate what is most important to us - the connections to our Temple and each other.

With the start of a New Year, let us resolve to keep innovating and keep finding New Traditions. Who knows? The new tradition of 5781 may be the tried and true tradition 50 or 100 years from now.

President's Message:

I hope that everyone managed to enjoy the summer despite the limitations on activities caused by COVID-19. Our Temple spent the summer meeting the challenges caused by these limitations and the Board and I will work tirelessly to adapt our Temple to whatever the "new normal" turns out to be.

With the invaluable assistance of our COVID-19 Task Force and the protocols it developed, we have carefully and safely opened our Temple to in-person events, while continuing to hold other events virtually. We are one of the few temples where congregants in limited numbers can safely attend Friday night services, while other members stream the services from home. Rabbi Judy, Cantor David and Ed have done yeoman's work to make



our services meaningful both to those in attendance and those at home. Our esteemed Director of Education, Deborah Tract ran several events at the Temple this summer for children of all ages. N.O.W. (formerly known as Sisterhood) and the Men's Club did the same. There have also been a multitude of streamed and zoomed events, such as the Cantor's amazing concert and Rabbi Judy's Torah studies and Lunch N Learn sessions and Round Table Rap discussions.

Our High Holidays' theme will be "New Traditions" (Chiddush חידוש). We cannot be slaves to the past, but must adapt themt to the here and now. We must explore the best way for TOE,ACRC to do things. In some instances, they might be the TOE way. In others they might be the CRT way. Perhaps they will be some combination of what the two legacy temples did. Or, they might be a completely new way of doing them. The goal is to do them in a way that works best for us. The silver lining of the COVID cloud is that we have already been forced to think of new ways to do things and we have thrived.

As you have seen from various communications you received, we are planning High Holiday Services that will look and feel different. In line with "New Traditions", I urge you to embrace the differences and enjoy each and every service. As of the writing of this article, the plan is to permit attendance in the sanctuary and ballroom for each service up to a maximum of 110. The physical layout of the bima will be different. Some people with honors will be in Temple doing them from different spots in the sanctuary than you are used to seeing. The Rabbi and Cantor will be announcing names of those with honors who have chosen to stay safe at home. The services will be shorter and there will be only one, not two, service on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur mornings.

While we continue to strive to keep our Temple as accessible as possible, we urge anyone who is in a high-risk category or is otherwise feeling unwell to consider the safety of others and please stay home, even if you are scheduled to attend a particular service. Every service will be streamed but the services for Rosh Hashanah eve, Rosh Hashanah first day morning, Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur morning will be password protected, with each service having its own different password. BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR AN E-MAIL WITH THE PASSWORDS SHORTLY BEFORE EACH OF THESE PARTICULAR SERVICES.

We will get through this pandemic by continuing to do what we have done since it began: staying connected to the Temple and each other. Above all, please stay safe.



Rabbi's Corner:

When I received the memo to submit this article, the subject was, "It's Shofar time". I thought, of course it is since it is a few weeks before Rosh Hashanah. I was thinking of the actual Shofar, not our newsletter.





This year, I urge you to take these preparations to heart, as the High Holiday Services will be different than any before.

As you have heard, all services will be live streamed and while we will be holding in person services, they will be limited in time and in number of participants. That is one way to keep everyone safe. Our Safety Committee is diligently pursuing further effective methods of keeping us all healthy and free of COVID-19.

Everyone attending services in person or viewing the live stream will be treated to the best worship experience we can provide. By being in our beautiful Sanctuary, we are preserving the dignity and majesty of these holidays. We are mindful that praying together with masks on or in front of a small screen is not what we are used to and are therefore keeping our services to about 75 minutes each. There will be less repetition of prayers and more focus on the core themes of God's rule, the birthday of the world, repentance and forgiveness. Content remains the same, presentation will be according to safety guidelines.

I want you to make your decision about attendance during the holidays based on the best medical advice you have. You are all precious to me and to our Temple family. I want your celebration to be meaningful whether in Temple or at home.

In the days leading up to Rosh Hashanah, look to the Psalms, particularly Psalm 27. You may choose to recite it or meditate upon a phrase from this passage. I am fond of verse 4, "One thing I ask of the Eternal, only that do I seek: to live in the house of Adonai all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Eternal, to frequent God's temple." Contemplate gazing upon God's beauty in our world. How can we make God's beauty apparent to others?

You may also want to prepare your home, particularly if you will be watching services from your couch or office. Make the location of your screen a makom tefilla, a place of prayer. Clear away work or leisure time distractions. Get some holiday flowers, as we do for the sanctuary. Find a Mizrach or a Shiviti, artwork that can be displayed on the eastern wall to help focus your prayer. Mizrach means east, the direction towards Jerusalem, Shiviti comes from the Psalm 16:8 "Shiviti Adonai I'negdi tamid" meaning I have placed the Eternal before me always.

May these Days of Awe be especially meaningful to you and your family. Despite the differences from previous years, may this holiday season be especially sweet. Mike, Micah and Leora join me in wishing you a Shanah Tovah U'Metukah, a good and very sweet New Year!

September 5, 2020 Ki Tavo: Deut. 26 – 29:8

The portion describes the end of Moses' review of the law and a brief summary from the time of Abraham's wanderings from country to country, his descendants' slavery in Egypt, God's redemption of his enslaved people and his bringing them to the Promised Land. The laws of tithing and the written codification of the laws are all specified.

September 12, 2020 Nitzavim-VaYelech. Deut. 29:9 –30:20

The people of Israel are all assembled before Moses and ready to enter a covenant with God. He warns everyone against nourishing evil in their hearts, hoping to escape in the general righteousness of the throng. He describes how sinful individuals will be punished, but adds words of mercy, proclaiming the choice of life over death.

September 26, 2020 **Ha'azinu: Deut. 32:1 – 32:52**

Moses ends his service of a lifetime dedicated to God and the people Israel with a hymn of joy on the banks of the Jordan, in view of the Promised Land.

Personally, I have never been a selfish person but...Selfishly, I want to travel again with Stew (and Jeanette). Selfishly, I want to see Stew walk his daughter down the aisle at her wedding. Selfishly, I want to have Stew sit at our holiday table as he has done for the past 15 years. 


