Kick off the New Year with Shabbat Under the Stars

Summer might be over but that means the High Holy Days are coming. This year Rosh Hashanah begins at sundown on Sunday September 25. Even sooner though, is Shabbat Under the Stars, set for Sept. 16.

Shabbat Under the Stars has become a favorite among congregants. The evening will begin at 6:30 p.m. where kids can play lawn games, and we will be serving lite bites and an opportunity to mingle.

This year marks the 13th Shabbat Under the Stars, said Laurel Fried, who has chaired the committee organizing the event. "The congregation and community gather as a temple family to celebrate each other and have fun together," she told The Shofar. "We eat, laugh, play and see old and new friends."

The service will begin at 7:30 led by Rabbi Judy, Cantor David Katz accompanied by the temple's in-house band "Nishamah" adding to this festive occasion with music of the past, present and of a religious nature.

After the service there will be a special oneg. To cover the cost of the food, the cost will be \$10 for members, \$15 for non-members and \$5 for children.

It is an honor to be able to serve the congregation in any capacity and I feel privileged to do so in my current one, as Temple President. But hey, serving and running a congregation is not a one-person job. Look around, between the Board, the committees, our members, great clergy and educators and a wonderful staff; it makes me feel that there are no challenges we can't handle. Collectively we are one community and every decision we make should be guided by what's best for the congregation. Here are some things we will focus on this year:

- Rabbi Judy is retiring, and we have an active Rabbi search underway. Rabbi Judy will be a tough act to follow, and I will miss her, but rest assured we will adapt and find the best candidate to take over the Pulpit. As I write this, Laurel Fried and the search committee have had their first set of interviews with prospective candidates. As we get deeper into the process, we will invite the entire congregation to be involved in the selection.
- Looking back at the first three years of TOEACRC, we have done some great things; we combined two congregations into one and like everyone else had to deal with a pandemic. We shifted to a virtual model and didn't miss an Erev Shabbat service, and we kept the school open. We streamed every service and continue to do so today. As the pandemic evolved, we started to let people back in the building. Services, activities, and events continue to come back with both in-person and virtual options to attend. But like all things, we are still dealing with a pandemic world and will continue to monitor our response to the pandemic. As always this is subject to change.
- We received some great feedback from the Focus groups we held in the Spring. I will be discussing feedback and how we will respond to it, during the Kol Nidre service (ok, a shameless plug).

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President's Update

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Neil Brodsky has stepped down as Chair of our COVID committee and his leadership this last year has been greatly appreciated. I am pleased to announce that Laura Miller has accepted the Chair position. Please thank and congratulate them both when you get a chance. Monitoring and managing the COVID situation are critical to our well-being as a congregation and as people.

This year for the High Holy Days services there will be no physical tickets issued. We have learned over the last two years that we can manage access to the services (live or streamed) without the paper tickets. More information on this will be forthcoming.

Did someone say Torah restoration? I'm pretty sure someone did! If you ever wanted to see how a Torah is maintained or wanted to actually help restore one and write in a Torah, you will be able to get a chance starting later this year. Look for more information in the future.

Lastly, if you have any concerns, questions, or comments about any aspect of our Congregation, feel free to reach out to me so we can discuss them.

Torah Notes

September 3: Shoftim- Deut. 16:18-21

This portion defines the legal system and the roles of the leaders; the judges, the king, the priests and the prophets -- all of them officers of the Hebrew commonwealth. Provisions are to be made for an ordered civil government, justice must be free, accessible and absolutely impartial.



September 10: Ki-Tetze- Deut. 21:10-25:19

The wide-ranging laws of domestic life and human kindness are the subjects of this portion of Moses' continuing discourse, dealing with matters such as marriage to a captive of war, the rights of the first-born, dealing with discourtesy and disobedience, returning lost property and appropriateness of apparel. The sanctity of marriage, adultery and family relations are among the many topics covered in this chapter.

September 17: Ki Tavo, Deut. 26:1-29:8

Moses begins his conclusion of the legal code with describing the rituals relating to the first fruits and tithes brought as offerings to the Sanctuary. Such events are to be viewed as occasions of thanksgiving to God, whose favor of the Israelites repeatedly rescued them from the hardships of their past and raised them up to become a great nation, dwelling in comfort in their rich and fertile homeland.

September 24: Nitzavim- Deut. 22:9-30:20

Moses presents the different orders of people before him, all assembled to enter into a Covenant with God: heads of tribes, elders, officers, all the people of Israel, including children the strangers in their midst, and all the others that would take part in sacred rites and rituals. He warns them all not to harbor evil in their hearts and adds words of mercy and appealing to all to choose life and not death. (*see opening statement of Deuteronomy)

October 1: Vayelech- Deut. 31:1 – 31:30

The covenant between God and Israel is binding upon every man, woman and child, for all time - past, present and future, as if every one of us personally received the Torah at Sinai. Moses appoints Joshua to be his successor as the leader of Israel, as age has overtaken him, and death is near. He assures the people that they have no need to be afraid, for God will always be with them. Moses then completes the writing of the Torah and entrusts it to the priests and elders, instructing them to study and teach it on a regular basis to the people.



Securing Our Synagogue

In response to our growing concern for the safety for our Temple, congregants, employees and visitors, a security committee was created in January 2022, at the direction of Neil Miller.

The members of the committee are Susan Bloomberg, Laurel Fried, Les Reider, Barbara Tevora Jainchill, Roz Vermut, Sue Zichlin, Rabbi Judy Cohen Rosenberg, Rabbi Harvey Abramowitz, Deborah Tract and our newest member, Amy Adler.

The members of the committee brought to the table a variety of backgrounds that touched upon and may have been directly involved with security. And those that did not have such backgrounds had an abiding desire to make our building and our membership more secure.

We proceeded to avail ourselves of security webinars that were being held by numerous entities, including JCRC, ADL, and UJA.

We proceeded on our own to find ways that would make our sanctuary and classrooms, as well as our offices more secure in the event of an active shooter. All classrooms were numbered from both the interior side as well as the exterior side. This enables a responding police force to quickly locate, from the exterior of the building, a particular room where they have been told that there is a problem.

You may be aware that all the classrooms have small windows in the doors that lead into the main hallway. Small “shades” were created to quickly be pulled down and prevent an intruder from looking into those classrooms. My thanks to Susan Bloomberg for putting her arts and crafts skills to work.

Simplistic locking mechanisms were created to prevent the classrooms from being easily accessed by an intruder.

Les Reider, who has a background in security met with the head of Black-Tie security, which provides our buildings security guards, along with Laurel Fried, to see how we might be able to make entry by an intruder into our building more difficult.

Other members of the committee provided online research which they then distributed

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amongst all of us, to assist on how we might all work in making the building more secure.

Les conducted security meetings with our office staff as well as with the staff of AHRC. The goal is being able to raise awareness of the importance of security, such as not allowing doors to the outside of the building to be wedged open and the importance of running fire and active shooter drills (lock-down drills), including those for our Religious School.

If you have attended services, you have found cards in the pews on how to respond to an active shooter. This is another result of our committee and the excellent efforts of Robin Rabinowitz.

There are federal grants available to religious organizations to assist in making their locations more secure. These grants go up to \$150,000. The Temple started go about getting a grant application submitted last year but we ran into an amazing wall of red tape. Neil Miller then president in 2021 got us going in the right direction. But then we were hit with a time limit and were not able to proceed to get a grant request submitted. Thus, the security committee now found itself with the responsibility of getting the grant request submitted.

Throughout this whole process, everything I have stated above and now moving forward with attempting to get a grant request, Robin Rabinowitz our executive director really became the point person on all fronts. This involves getting a new code number which must accompany any application, a simplistic request. We were told they would just transfer our old code number into the new code number. That simplistic request, despite us doing everything correctly took about four months. But we were not sitting on our proverbial hands.

Every grant must be accompanied by a security evaluation. With Robin once again at point we arranged for such an evaluation by the Nassau County Police Department. It was done in early April. We then arranged for an additional security evaluation and assessment by a gentleman named Liron Filiby from JCRC. The security evaluation/assessment is very, very important in this process and the grant request should match up with problems/weaknesses that are identified in the security assessment.

We realized that it would be very helpful to have a grant writer assist us in this project. We obtained the names of a couple of grant writers and eventually hired a grant writer who actually knew Rabbi Judy and this relationship clearly helped us in the amount of his contract. We also learned that you may get a grant to pay for a grant writer. Which we applied for

successfully. Our grant was submitted on time, and we now anxiously await the results.

An example of the type of items we have requested include upgrading of outdoor lighting, upgrading interior and exterior cameras, installation of gates that would slow any intruder from driving into our parking lot without permission and window coverings.

The window coverings we have in mind are mirror-like film that covers the windows and prevents someone from the outside seeing what is happening inside. They are not perfect, but they are very valuable and highly recommended. As a combination with this mirror coating there will be a coating of a material that makes the window bullet resistant. Not bulletproof, but bullet resistant. As I hear over and over again of the shooting in Uvalde, Texas, the shooter initially fired his weapon from the outside into the classrooms. It is hoped we never have such an incident, but with the window coverings that we have requested in our grant, at least we have made the windows bullet-resistant.

It would be a wonderful thing if we are able to get this grant. But even if we do get the grant there is something equivalent to an environmental impact statement that has to be done before the money ends up in our pocket and even then, it's not in our pocket. We must proceed to do the work and submit for reimbursement.

Hopefully you are all aware there was an active shooter training program run for the congregation some months ago. We are scheduling another program with the assistance of JCRC soon. It may have already occurred by the time you read this.

On a more recent note, we have had fire alarm problems with false alarms causing the Syosset fire department to respond and rouse one of our intrepid members of our repose team to meet them at the building (most recently Amy Adler). We are in the process of replacing smoke and fire alarms. Hopefully this issue will be cleared up, soon.

The above is not the extent of the work done by the security committee. We are constantly listening and watching programs that are run by the federal and state governments as well as the Jewish organizations that I have identified above so that we may keep up to date on what is happening in the security world that might be useful for us in our congregation here in Jericho, where we want to make sure the walls do not come tumbling down.
