


Committed to Combatting Antisemitism

Congregant Ivan Dolowich Honored by Simon Wiesenthal Center for Heros

ongratulations to longtime congregant and Board of Trustees member Ivan Dolowich, who received the "Heros of Tolerance Award" for his ongoing contributions and work against antisemitism with the Simon Wiesenthal Center, one of the largest international Jewish human rights organizations in the United States.

Ivan was honored for his activities to combat antisemitism during a ceremony held on Aug. 21 at Yankee Stadium. Kaufman Dolowich, the law firm where Ivan is a co-managing partner, noted in a press release that besides his support for the Simon Wiesenthal Center, Ivan also aids many local Jewish organizations.

"I am truly humbled to receive this honor," Ivan said. "Standing next to a holocaust survivor who received the same award, I feel my contributions are nothing in comparison to those who have endured the unspeakable for their faith, but I am all the more motivated to do all that I can to support the work of the Center and the fight against antisemitism and bigotry of all kinds."



Besides his work with the Simon Wiesenthal Center, Ivan is a board member of the Holocaust Memorial & Tolerance Center (HMTC), a member of its Golf Outing Committee and its Auditorium Committee as it works to build a new museum auditorium. In addition, Dolowich provides pro bono legal counsel for HMTC and advises on the logistics of its various operations. Dolowich is a member of Kaufman Dolowich's Diversity & Inclusion Committee.

hag Sameach and Happy New Year to All! By now I hope you all know that I will be the sole spiritual leader for our temple this year while we continue our search for a new Rabbi. Our search committee has already begun the process again, and I am confident we will find a wonderful Rabbi for our temple for next year.

You may be thinking, "Oh my, is Cantor actually going to attempt to lead the entire High Holiday service cycle alone?!" The answer is an emphatic NO! Our search committee began last May to search for a Rabbi for our holiday season and I couldn't be more pleased and excited at who we were able to find and engage for this holiday season.

Rabbi Elliot Skiddell will be joining me on the Bima this year as we usher in another Holiday season. Rabbi Skiddell is a wonderful person and a highly respected Rabbi. He graduated from the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College. As a pulpit Rabbi he was the Rabbi of Reconstructionist Congregation Beth Emeth and led the congregation through the creation of a partnership with Central Synagogue of Nassau County that progressed from cohabitation to cooperation, collaboration and finally, consolidation as Central Synagogue-Beth Emeth. In 2020, he retired from the pulpit of Central Synagogue-Beth Emeth and was honored with the title of Rabbi Emeritus. Since October 2021, he has served as Interim Director of Rabbinic Placement and Employment for Reconstructing Judaism and the Reconstructionist Rabbinical Association.

All of us are extremely excited to have Rabbi Skiddell as our rabbi for the holidays and I am especially grateful for his colleagueship and being able to partner with him and lead our congregation throughout the High Holidays this year. Additionally, Rabbi Skiddell will also be leading a study session the evening of Slichot on September 9, at 8:00 pm. We will then go into Slichot services right after that session.



Personally, this time of the year is always such an exciting and beautiful time for me, as we begin to prepare for our High Holiday season.

As a people, we are so lucky to be able to have such a unique tradition, that encourages us and allows us to renew ourselves each year, at the deepest spiritual levels. The Sages of the past knew that we would be the same people thousands of years later from when they created our holiday liturgy. We still have the same desires, hopes, fears and dreams as a Jewish people.

So, they created the High Holidays to enable us to help ourselves each year with the process of prayer and Tshuvah.

The prayers and traditions that we say and do on the High Holidays are a remarkable expression of our own inner desire to become more than who we are, and to be the person and people that we know we are capable of being. Before participating in services this year with your family, take a moment to slow down and ask yourself, "What is my intention this Holiday season and what do I want out of the holidays?" By doing this, you will begin the process of Tshuvah, turning inward and initiating the change in yourself that will allow you to transform.

Our Sages and Rabbis believed that it is each person's individual responsibility to find the courage and strength to engage in prayer and reflection of this magnitude that the Holidays ask of us. As a people, we owe it not only to ourselves but to our community as well.

This process is not easy to do, and it shouldn't be easy. We have to dig deep inside ourselves and commit to becoming better people. We have to try and move closer to the idea of what we know we can be, but at the same time understand we are human, just like those who came before us. We do the best we can. This is truly what the High Holiday's ask of us. I will leave you with a wonderful description of the process of Tshuvah by the great Hasidic Rabbi Nachman of Breslov. He explained how the Shofar is the perfect symbol for the High Holidays.



"When the sound comes out, it is a beautiful, full, and rich, new sound..."

The Shofar is very small in the front where you create the sound, and then becomes larger at the end where the sound comes out. It takes a tremendous amount of effort to make a shofar sound because it has such a small opening.

It is almost as if the sound is being forced into a space it does not fit, producing a very uncomfortable feeling, but eventually it makes it through. Then, at the end when the sound comes out, it is a beautiful, full, and rich, new sound.

Such is the same with us and our inward journey as we attempt to do Tshuvah.

We begin the holidays literally feeling as though it is just too uncomfortable to look inside ourselves and see what is there, as if we are being squeezed into a small and incredibly uncomfortable space. Then as we go through the prayers and the services, we begin to make it through, feeling less squeezed and more open as we release our self-

criticism and begin to open up, loving ourselves more. Finally, we come out of the other end, a new and beautiful person.

It is my wish that this may happen to each one of you this holiday season, that our temple can provide such an experience for you, and that you feel as if you have been transformed and are ready for the new year ahead.

I wish you and your families a Good Yontif and a Happy New Year.

September Torah Portions



September 2, Ki Tavo: Deut. 26 – 29:8

The portion describes the end of Moses' review of the law and a brief summary of their history from the time of Abraham's wanderings from country to country, his descendant's slavery in Egypt, God's redemption of his enslaved people, and his bringing them to the Promised Land. The laws of tithing and the written codification of the laws are all specified.

September 9, Nitzavim / Vayeilech: Deut. 29:9 -31:30

The people of Israel are all assembled before Moses and ready to enter a covenant with God. He warns everyone against nourishing evil in their hearts, hoping to escape in the general righteousness of the throng. He describes how sinful individuals will be punished, but adds words of mercy, proclaiming the choice of life over death. The covenant between God and Israel is binding upon every man, woman and child, for all time - past, present and future, as if every one of us personally received the Torah at Sinai. Moses appoints Joshua to be his successor as the leader of Israel, as age has overtaken him and death is near. He assures the people that they have no need to be afraid, for God will always be with them. Moses then completes the writing of the Torah and entrusts it to the priests and elders, instructing them to study and teach it on a regular basis to the people.

Rosh Hashanah:

God remembers Sarah and gives her and Abraham a son, who is named Isaac (Yitzchak,) meaning "will laugh." Abraham is then one hundred years old and Sarah ninety. Isaac is circumcised at the age of eight days.

Hagar and Ishmael are banished from Abraham's home and wander in the desert. God hears the cry of the dying lad and saves his life by showing his mother a well. The Philistine king, Abimelech, makes a treaty with Abraham at Be'er Sheba. God commands Abraham to sacrifice his son on Mount Moriah (the Temple Mount) in Jerusalem. Isaac is bound and placed on the altar, and Abraham raises the knife to slaughter his son. A voice from heaven calls to stop him, saying that it was a test. A ram, caught in the undergrowth by its horns, is offered in Isaac' place.

September 23, Ha'azinu: Deut. 32:1 - 32:52

Moses ends his service of a lifetime dedicated to God and the people Israel with a hymn of joy on the banks of the Jordan, in view of the Promised Land.

September 30, Sukkot, Leviticus: 22:26-31

This portion describes the Biblical sacrifices commanded in order to observe Sukkot.

RESTORING THE PAST

Our Torah Scrolls are made of all natural components, parchment, wood, even the thread and ink used come from kosher animals and as such are subject to natural deterioration. Just as we receive care to stay in the best of health, so must the Torah Scrolls.



ENHANCING THE PRESENT

We now embark on the Circle of Life Torah Restoration Project. We have engaged Soferet in Residence (Torah Scribe) Jill Kaplan to repair our scrolls with the goal of having five Torah Scrolls in pristine condition. We currently have one Scroll in such condition. Four more scrolls must be cleaned, re-lettered, and in some cases re-sewn and have parchment repaired to meet our goal. All this takes the Soferet's skill and time. This essential and worthwhile Mitzvah will also require our community's minimum commitment of \$25,300 in Tzedakah money to complete this project. Any excess funds will be held in reserve to keep our scrolls in good condition well into the future. This campaign is an investment in the future of our Temple and Judaism.

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
