

### Fractured Fairy Tales: The Phox, The Box & The Lox

Fractured Fairy Tales: The Phox. The Box & The Lox, is an all new Jay Ward animated short which will premiere with Universal Pictures live-action comedy Dudley Do-Right, opening nationwide on Friday, August 27. The short from Universal Cartoon Studios marks the first new animation from a Jay Ward property in 32 years.

Fractured Fairy Tales. a deliciously- brazen series of parables and fables full of witty entendres. originally aired on Jay Ward's classic Rocky & Bullwinkle cartoon series. Produced and directed by Oscar Moore (Academy Award® nominee for Redux Riding Hood), Fractured Fairy Tales. The Phox. The Box & The Lox is written by Bill Scott (the head writer of Jay Ward Productions who almost single handedly wrote all 326 Rocky & Bullwinkle episodes), executive produced by Tiflany Ward, Jay Ward's daughter, and features the vocal talents of Scott Weil, Keith Scott, Jeff Glen Bennett and June Foray (the voice of Rocky, Natasha and Nell in all 326 episodes of the cartoon series, as well as Ursula in George of the Jungle).

Universal Cartoon Studios, a division of Universal Family & Home Entertainment Production, recently completed a direct to video film titled Alvin and the Chipmunks Meet Frankenstein, which will hit stores in October. In addition, numerous direct to video films are currently in production, including Alvin and the Chipmunks Meet the Wolfman, The Land Before Time 7: Secret of Saurus Rock and Baltor Wolf Quest. The studio also has the Woody Woodpecker series in production, which airs on Fox Kids.

Next summer, Universal Pictures' and Tribeca Productions' The Adventures of Rocky and Bullwinkle, an innovative and irreverent live-action/animated comedy adventure based on Jay Ward's classic cartoon, will hit theaters. The film combines the talented De Niro as the insidious Fearless Leader, Jason Alexander as the evil Boris Badenov and Rene Russo as the seductress Natasha Fatale with a CGI-created Rocky and Bullwinkle from the wizards of Industrial Light & Magic.



In 1997, Brendan Fraser drove audiences wild as the bumbling, vine-swinging title character in George of the Jungle, the smash-hit movie based on the classic animated characters created by Jay Ward. And now, fresh off the success of this summer's blockbuster The Mummy, Fraser is back as another beloved—yet still accident-prone—Jay Ward hero in Universal Pictures' live-action comedy, Dudley Do-Right.

Set in the Canadian Rockies community of Semi-Happy Valley where nothing ever happens, *Dudley Do-Right* follows the hilarious exploits of the dedicated but hapless young

Mountie. Playing Dudley's ladylove, Nell Fenwick, is Sarah Jessica Parker (See and the Girt). Unlike the helpless victim tied to the railway tracks depicted in the cartoon, this Nell has seen the world and has settled down in Seattle, but still remains confused about her relationships with men.

The evil Snidley Whiplash, played by Alfred Molina (Boogie Nights), is more dastardly than ever. He is out to rule the world, or at least one sleepy little part of it, and devises the scam of the century; after convincing Dudley that vampires lurk in the woods, he "salts" the local streams with gold, setting off the biggest gold rush since the Klondike. Leading the charge for gold is The Prospector (Monty Python's Eric Idle), an unsuspecting oaf who is swept into the limelight by Snidley.

As thousands of millionaire wannabes storm the border, streaming into a town that has since been named Whiplash City, Dudley is fired by Nell's dad, Inspector Fenwick, Robert Prosky (Mrs. Doubtfire).

Stripped of his badge, his office and his gal, the usually sweet, naïve Dudley is ready to "kick some serious butt." He becomes a masked man on a mission, setting out on his motorcycle to defeat the villain, win the heart of the fair maiden and bring peace back to Semi-Happy Valley... Horsefully, he won't screw it up.

Universal Pictures presents a Davis Entertainment/Joseph Singer Entertainment/Todd Harris Production, Dudley Do-Right, starring Brendan Fraser and Sarah Jessica Parker. Alfred Molina, Eric Idle, Robert Prosky and Alex Rocco also star. Based on the cartoon characters developed by Jay Ward, the film is written, directed and executive produced by Hugh Wilson (The First Wives Club). The producers are John Davis, Joseph M. Singer and J. Todd Harris.

Donald E. Thorin (Ace Ventura: When Nature Calls) serves as the director of photography with Don Brochu (The Fueitive) as editor. The

production designer is Bob Ziembicki (Scream 2). Lisa Jensen (George of the Jungle) serves as the costume designer and Steve Dorff (Blast From the Past) is the composer.

# ABOUT THE PRODUCTION

Dudley Do-Right is a film for audiences of all ages. A slice of nostalgia for the baby-boomers and a rollicking ride complete with action, adventure—and lots of humor—for the kids.

For writer/director Hugh Wilson, the desire to bring the timeless character of Dudley to life began with a love for the television cartoon series that made him laugh most as a kid.

"Rocky and Bullwinkle and Dudley were so much funnier than the other stuff I was watching on Saturday mornings," says Wilson. "It was like they were working on two levels—one for the kids and one for the adults. There

was no dumbing down and there was no condescension, and I think that's why people liked them so much."

Like in the cartoon, a comical bass-toned narrator leads us through the story in a style similar to the hip, finger-in-his-ear announcer of Rowan and Martin's Langb-In. As he dramatically states the obvious, he tosses in sarcastic quips of his own to spice things up.

Fraser says he accepted the role of Do-Right, a character whom Wilson laughingly refers to as "passionately stupid,"

because he loved the script. The star who first wooed audiences with his comedic performance in George of the Jungle and solidified his stature as a bona fide star with this summer's blockbuster hit The Munnny is a natural for the part of Dudley. More than just an actor with universal appeal, his ability to play deadpan funny and yet remain charmingly sincere at the same time is a rarity.

"I was in Morocco shooting The Munumy, where it was hot and kind of rough going and I was somehow couriered a copy of Dudley Do-Right," Fraser explains. "It gave me the best laugh that I had had for a mouth and a balf. I had such a sood

experience having worked with Hugh on Blast From the Past that I definitely wanted to repeat the experience."

Fraser continues, "Hugh is a gentleman and a professional and an all-around good guy. I think that the final equation was that if Hugh Wilson was going to direct it. I wanted to be in it."

To research life as a member of the RCMP, Fraser looked no further than his own family history. His greatgrandfather, a French Canadian, was a Mountie, and old family photos proved not only inspirational, but humorous.

"He was known as the long-armed arm of the law—ir was a joke because he was actually nor very tall," Fraser explains. "He had short arms, but he would reach into the haystacks to make sure that they were stacked properly and that no one was cheating the government for stacking them improperly. And if, indeed, there was empty space in the middle of the hay, he would write a citation. He was the original Dudley Do-Right."

The talented stage actor Alfred Molina, nominated for a



Tony Award for his outstanding performance in Art, plays Dudley's arch rival, the sinister Snidley Whiplash. Twirling his randemark handlebar mustache, he lusts after the lascivious Nell while masterminding the gold-rush scam of the century.

"When you're playing cartoon characters, the great thing is that you can be completely outrageous," says Molina. "I love a bit of shtick. I belong to the red-nose-and-big-shoes school of comedy, and that's why Leo for the broad stroke."

As a cartoon character, Snidley is always tying someone to the railroad tracks. "No half-decent villain would not have

a scene like that," laughs Molina. "It's like having a love story without a kiss, you know; it just wouldn't work.

"In the film, we had this wonderful actor who played my victim," Molina continues. "He spent the whole day tied up to the track. When they brought the real train that they were going to shoot later in the afternoon, he got nervous. He really thought

we were going to go for it at one point, no expenses spared. It was like something out of an old silent movie."

Described by Dudley as "a worthy foe," Snidley Whiplash is often surprised by Dudley's initiative in a classic case of underestimating the enemy.

"Snidley and Dudley don't have many scenes together in the film," explains Molina. "Snidley spends all his time cursing and bemoaning the day he ever came across Dudley and plotting against him. We're obsessed with each other, but we actually don't meet in the film all that often."

In working opposite Molina, Fraser says, "Alfred is a tower of acting. He has a physical presence that is at the same time imposing and very delicate. He's exacting. He has a keen understanding of melodrama. His timing is impeccable and he is just hilarious in this part. I had a hard time keeping a straight face, and I'm the guy wearing the red jacker with the big hat!"

In Wilson's script, the character of Nell has made a huge shift from the helpless victim in need of rescue to a sexy woman in search of adventure, yet she remains, as in the cartoon, the object of Dudley's affection. Sarah Jessica Parker, who first charmed audiences starring as Annie in the Broadway hit musical of the same name and went on to star in such hit movies as Honeymon in Vegas and The First Wires Club, was the producers' dream choice.

"I definitely enjoyed working with Sarah Jessica," says Fraser. "I think she is crisp and funny and intelligent. She's incredibly present. She always had a book in her hand off screen, which inspired me to read," he laughs. "It was a pleasure working with her."

"Nell is pretty much on the side of whoever is winning," adds Wilson, "but in the nicest possible way."

A conniving gold-digger, the new, updated Nell is bored with Dudley's Boy Scout-like deeds and much more attracted to the dark and dangerous Snidley.

Unfortunately for Snidley, the object of Nell's desire changes quickly when Dudley fights back by getting down and dirty.

The comically-unpredictable Eric Idle, famed for his outrageous sketches as part

of the Monty Python Comedy Troupe, plays Wilson's newlycreated character of The Prospector. As the guy credited with discovering the gold in "them that hills," The Prospector enjoys such celebrity that he is invited as a guest on Livs With Revis and Kathie Lee.

"Eric Idle is brilliant," says Wilson. "Maybe Prm showing my age here, but in my generation, Monty Python, those people as far as I'm concerned are comedy icons, living legends. Eric is really funny and also a lovely man, in his own right, beyond the Pythons."

Idle says although "in real life" he is currently busy at work on a novel based on the many people and experiences he has encountered throughout his comedy career, he wanted to take on the role of The Prospector, in part, because of his respect for Hugh Wilson, as a director.

"I think he is really fabulous," says Idle. "One of my very favorite films is Rustler's Rhapsody. It's a beautiful comedy, and it's one of those comedies where everybody gives fantastic performances and nobody lets on they're in a comedy, which is the finest form of comedy, for me.

"Hugh is one of those people that if you look up and he's

smiling, you know you've got it," Idle continues, "and if he isn't, you know you should go again. It's kind of like shorthand."

"Hugh's a great guy," agrees Alex Rocco (The Godfather), who plays The Chief and "ruler" of the Indian Corn Festival tourist trade. "When Hugh directs, he guides you like a choreographer through your scenes. But you have to be good. With Hugh, you have to deliver the mail."

Rocco remembers the first night of shooting. "It's a very tricky film to play. You can fall in that trap of saying, okay, I'm playing an Indian Chief in a cartoon feature, and be very

big. Well, the first line I said, Hugh says, 'Cuc'. He says to me, 'Rocco, I want you to play more like Moe Greene in *The Godfather*.' And whew, I was glad that night was over because I found my character. That's what helps me. Most directors will just say, 'Cut, let's do another one."

Robert Prosky, of Hill Street Blues fame, stars as Inspector Fenwick— Dudley's boss and Nell's

father. Updated from the cartoon, Fenwick now speaks with a British accent (with a slight lisp) and sports a bushy mustache.

"The Inspector is Dudley's immediate superior," Prosky explains. "He gets a little exasperated with Dudley's lack of intelligence when he's called back to replace Dudley who has fouled things up so badly. But in the end, Dudley gets his man, in a 'back door' sort of way."

In running for the "back door," Dudley takes refuge from Snidley's gang at one of the area's popular tourist destinations, working incognito amidst the dancers performing in an Indian Corn Pageant.

Costumes for the film were created under the watchful eye of designer Lisa Jensen, whose main challenge in the film came from the real Royal Canadian Mounted Police and from the Disney studios, who own the rights to use the Mountie image.

"The RCMP does not allow its uniform to be used publicly because it is impersonating an officer, unless you get special permission," explains Jensen. "Originally, the answer was no, but after establishing a relationship with the RCMP in British Columbia, where the film was shot, minimal changes had to be made, including the addition of gold tabs, a change in buttons and a change to the chevron on the collar."

In the end, Dudley's RCMP uniform was actually "built" by a person who "builds" for the RCMP.

"Brendan looks like a million bucks in that Mountie uniform," says Wilson. "Through that camera, he has almost classic movie-star good looks that remind me of different periods—the '30s and '40s.

"Brendan is a wonderful actor," he continues. "He's

very quiet off-stage, but as soon as the camera is on, there's a bang, and then he goes back to the strong, silent type."

The other big challenge for Jensen were the numerous Indian costumes. She says, "We had to take these Indians that are supposed to be somewhat authentic-looking doing a dance number which is somewhat campy and then going the next week and

doing a dance that's Vegas campy but still has the same flavor of these odd Italian Indians that we've created."

In a \$15,000 costume complete with wig, Rocco is a strange mix of New York, Italian and native Indian with a dash of mobster. "He's Moe Greene in a war bonner," smiles Wilson.

In costuming Nell, Jensen says she tossed out the floorlength prairie dress for clothes with a more elegant, grownup '30s feel. Snidley Whiplash, who in the cartoon was the squat-bodied, skinny-legged man with the stovepipe hat, has become more Gothic in a frockcoat from the 1860s topped with a Dracula-type cape.

Although it proved challenging to costume over 40 redcoated officers mounting a charge against the wicked Whiplash in the films climactic finale, the far greater challenge was for the riders to maintain their mounts. Since so many horses were needed for the scene, many of those used had barely been ridden. With banners flying, the final edit captured a proud RCMP drill team charging in to battle to save the day.

Fraser, who had some experience in the saddle, honed his

equestrian skills with daily training sessions on his horse "McFly," who stars as the infamous horse aptly named "Horse."

In summing up his wild Dudley Do-Right experience, writer/director Wilson says, "It's all pretty broad. The idea here has been that more is better. In most comedies I'd say more is not better. But here, we're pretty much eating the scenery."

"As far as the comic elements, this film definitely relies on the writing," adds Fraser, "and that's a credit to Hugh Wilson and Jay Ward. There's an apt use of props and shtick, and there's nothing like a good pratfall to spice things up! We have a strong script that takes advantage of ming fun of itself and at the same time lets people have fun watching it."

"This is a comedy with major battle scenes," jokes actor Rocco. "You think you're watching Patton, and then you think you're watching John Wayne, hittin' the beach. There's a bit of everything in this movie."

# ABOUT THE CAST

BRENDAN FRASER (Dudley Do-Right) was most

recently seen in Universal's box-office smash The Mummy, directed by Stephen Sommers, as well as the critically-acclaimed Oscar\*winning Gods and Monsters opposite Sir Ian McKellan and Lynn Redgrave.

Fraser's other screen credits include: Still Breathing, for which he received the Best Actor



Award at the 1997 Seattle Film Festival; Disney's boxoffice smash George of the Jungle; Les Mayfield's Encino Man; Robert Mandel's School Ties; Michael Lehmann's Airheads; Hugh Wilson's Blass From the Past; and Michael Ritchies's The Scout. Fraser also starred in Showtime's movie adaptation of Jonathan Tolins' ensemble play The Twilight of the Golds.

He will next be seen in 20th Century Fox's Monkey Bone, directed by Henry O. Selick.

On the stage Fraser received praise for his work in John Patrick Shanley's Four Dogs and a Bone at the Geffen Playhouse for director Lawrence Kasdan.

Born in Indianapolis and raised in Europe and Canada, Fraser has been dedicated to honing his craft since the age of 12, when he began attending London theatre performances. He was educated in Toronto's Upper Canada College and received a BFA in acting from the Actor's Conservatory, Cornish College of the Arts in Seattle.

Fraser currently resides in Los Angeles with his wife, Afton, and dogs, Wylie and Lucy.

#### SARAH IESSICA PARKER (Nell Fenwick) is currently

the star of the hit comedy series Sex and the City on HBO, for which she also serves as executive consultant. Known for her ability to portray both dramatic and quirky comedic characters with intelligence and vulnerability, her feature film credits include: TII There Wast You, Mars Attackt!, Extreme Measures, If Lucy Fell,



Ed Wood, Substance of Fire, Hossi Possis, Steve Martin's LA Story and Honeymoon in Vegas opposite Nicolas Cage. She also started opposite Bette Midler, Goldie Hawn and Diane Keaton in The First Wives Club, directed by Dudley Do-Right's writer/director Hugh Wilson.

Born in Nelsonville, Ohio, Parker landed her first Broadway role at the age of 11 in The Innocents and, following that, performed in the national company of The Sound of Music with four of her seven talented siblings. She went on to star in the lead role in the musical Annie for twelve months, moving on to television to star as the brainy, awkward Patty Greene in the CBS sircom Square Pegs. After graduating from Hollywood High, Ms. Parker chose to pursue acting full-time and won regular roles in the television series A Year in the Life and Equal Justice. Among her numerous television credits are starring roles in the Sumbine Boys, In the Best Interest of the Children, Twist of Fate, The Room Upstairs and The Ryan White Stroy.

performance. The impressive production was also honored with an Outer Circle Critics Award for best ensemble.

Other theatrical performances of note include a starring role in the Off-Broadway production of Molly Sweney, for which Molina garnered a Theater World Award and a Drama Desk Award nomination for Most Outstanding Debut Performance.

# ABOUT THE FILMMAKERS

HUGH WILSON (Director/Writer/Executive Producer) has won many awards for his creative script writing and



much praise for his ability to translate his words into pictures on the screen. He recently wrote and directed Blast From the Past starring Alicia Brendan Fraser Silversrone. Christopher Walken and Sissy Spacek, and served as both writer and director of Guarding Tess. starring Nicolas Cage and Shirley MacLaine. Wilson's first movie was the lowbudget, hugely-successful

surprise Police Academy which he co-wrote and directed. He

also wrote and directed Rustler's Rhapsody.

Wilson directed the highly-successful *The First Wirse Club*, starring Goldie Hawn, Bette Midler
and Diane Keaton—a film which grossed over
\$100,000,000 worldwide.

Born and raised in Miami, Florida, Wilson graduated from the University of Florida and soon distinguished himself as the creator of the critically-acclaimed television series WKRP in Cincinnati and the Emmy-winning Frankis Place. He won the 1988 Emmy for best comedy writing and has twice been awarded the Humanitas Award for television writing.

Wilson is the father of five and lives in Virginia.

As chairman of Davis Entertainment, JOHN DAVIS (Producer) presides over the growing motion picture and television production company, which in the past ten years has produced nearly 50 movies.

Davis has set up three distinct divisions at his company—feature films, classics and television—to specifically develop and produce its numerous projects. His feature film division currently has a production deal at 20<sup>th</sup> Century Fox and, along with the other two divisions, has over 30 projects in development at various major studios, as well as at the four major television networks.

Davis produced last year's phenomenally-successful comedy *Dr. Dolittle*, starring Eddie Murphy and directed by Betty Thomas.

On the small screen, Davis recently produced for NBC the made-for-television movie The Jesse Ventura Story, based on the true story of the newly-elected governor of Minnesota's implausible rise from professional wrestler to politician. Davis also produced last year's ABC made-for-television movie Miracle at Midnight for the Wonderful World of Disney franchise, starring Sam Waterston.

Davis has produced several motion pictures in the '90s, including Out to Sua, starring the venerable comedic pair of Walter Matthau and Jack Lemmon; the blockbuster The Firm, which starred Tom Cruise and won a People's Choice Award for Best Dramatic Film; Grumpy Old Men, which was a People's Choice Award winner for Best Comedic Film; and Grumpier Old Men, whose casting of Matthau and Lemmon (and box-office success) has been influential in the production of films targeted for an older generation; Courage Under Fire, starring Denzel Washington and Meg Ryan; The Chamber, John Grisham's bestseller, starring Gene Hackman and Chris O'Donnell; Daylighr, starring Sylvester Stallone;

Waterworld, starring Kevin Costner; and Richie Rich, starring Macaulay Culkin.

His other feature film credits include: Predator, The Thing Called Love, Forress, Gamman, Storyville, Shattered, Little Monsters, The Last of the Finest, License to Drive, Three O'Clock High and The Hunted.

In the television and cable arenas, Davis recently produced Astenial, the NBC mini-series which received the highest ratings for a mini-series, made-for-television movie and feature film presentation on television during the 1996-97 season. The success of Astenial also serves as the inspiration for an upcoming NBC pilot. Davis Entertainment Television's development slate also includes Steaths, an event mini-series set up with the Fox Broadcasting Company, among several other projects.

Davis Entertainment has also produced the widelywatched made-for-television movie Volcame.
