Connie Doyle's luck has run out.

Homeless, penniless and pregnant, Connie leaves a man who doesn't love her and a city that doesn't want her and boards the wrong train headed for the wrong city. But on this night, on these tracks, Connie's life is going to change forever.

A Cinderella comedy about mistaken identity and misdirected love, *Mrs*.

Winterbourne stars Academy Award®-winner Shirley MacLaine, Ricki Lake, Brendan

Fraser, Miguel Sandoval and Loren Dean. A TriStar Pictures presentation of an A&M

Films production, *Mrs. Winterbourne* is directed by Richard Benjamin from a screenplay by Phoef Sutton and Lisa-Maria Radano, and is based upon the novel <u>I Married a Dead</u>

Man by Cornell Woolrich. Dale Pollock, Ross Canter and Oren Koules are the producers. Patrick Palmer is the executive producer. Music is by Patrick Doyle.

"I always like stories that have to do with fate -- you make a left turn instead of a right turn and your life changes forever," comments director Richard Benjamin. "I am drawn to the serendipity of those situations."

Ricki Lake adds: "Connie finds herself in a set of circumstances in which she has to pretend to be somebody she's clearly not. She meets the man of her dreams, and the

family of her dreams, but the dilemma is that to keep them she has to keep lying to them about who and what she is."

"Mrs. Winterbourne is a story of destiny," comments MacLaine. "It was meant to be that this woman would end up with this family, with this wealth. She's homeless, she's alone and destitute in the world, but she ends up with an extraordinarily comfortable life."

At the beginning of the tale, Connie Doyle is a Jersey girl moving to New York
City to find her fortune. "She's a runaway from New Jersey, but in New York, she's
homeless and very vulnerable, qualities which are naturally attractive to Steve," explains
Loren Dean, who plays con man Steve DeCunzo. "Steve meets Connie at a diner, picks
up on her, and lets her move in with him, never expecting for her to get pregnant. So,
when it happens, he naturally denies that he's the father."

Alone and destitute, Connie seeks refuge in Grand Central station and mistakenly boards a passenger train instead of a subway car. "She's a little disoriented and mistakenly ends up on a train headed for Boston," says producer Dale Pollock. "That's where she meets the other pregnant woman on the train, Patricia Winterbourne (played by Susan Haskell), who is on her way to meet her wealthy in-laws for the first time."

The wheel of fortune turns and the train derails, killing both Patricia and her husband Hugh (Brendan Fraser). Connie wakes up eight days later with a newborn son and a new identity. "The next thing she knows she's being bundled up to the Winterbourne Mansion in Marblehead, Massachusetts where her 'new family' is waiting for her," says Pollock, "and, try as she might to explain who she really is, no one is willing to listen."

The surviving grandson and daughter-in-law immediately become the focus of Grace Winterbourne's (Shirley MacLaine) life, easing the pain from the loss of her son. "Connie's an imposter who is posing as Patricia and Grace doesn't know it, but she grows to love Connie so much that it doesn't matter," MacLaine notes. "Grace has two sons. Hugh, the son she did like, has died, and then there's Bill, the one she doesn't like very much. She has never had a daughter, but always wanted one in her life, and this girl fulfills that dream."

For Connie, winning over the surviving twin, Bill, proves more daunting. "Bill, the son of a conservative banker, has been given the unenviable task of running the family business," says Brendan Fraser, who plays both brothers. "His twin brother, Hugh, who's been the playboy that Bill never really was, has been away from the family for more than a few years and has left all the responsibility on Bill's shoulders.

Consequently, Bill has spent too much time thinking about how miserable he is with his life until he meets Connie, and then everything gets turned on its heels. She represents everything that he wants but would never expect to get."

Everyone in the household notices the effect Connie has on Bill. "Grace sees the son she doesn't particularly like come to life because of Connie," notes MacLaine. "That's enough for her to decide that she must have this girl in her life forever, and of course, Connie has a son which Grace believes is her own grandson, and she won't let go of that for the world."

"Grace is a wonderful, spunky woman with major chutzpa," adds Lake. "She has never had a daughter and has had her share of tragedies, so Connie and her baby are a

chance for her to feel hope in spite of Hugh's death. Wanting to love Connie blinds her in a way, but it also helps her to cope with her great loss."

Miguel Sandoval portrays the Cuban-born butler, Paco. In addition to his duties as Grace's faithful companion, Paco assumes the role of matchmaker. "He was the one who taught the boys to dance," Fraser says. "And he pushes Bill and Connie together to literally tango their way into each other's hearts. And it works. They're a mismatched couple but they bring out the best in each other."

"Despite the fact that she's trying to be honest at the same time that she's perpetuating a fraud, Connie ends up having her dream," MacLaine says. "The deeper in she gets, the more she can't leave, the more caught up in her own emotional attachments she becomes. And yet, in the end, she still manages to create her own eloquent destiny."

Connie is at the happiest moment of her life on the eve of her wedding to Bill.

"Everything is going as well as it could possibly go," says Pollock. "Bill has proposed,
the wedding invitations have gone out, the cake has been chosen ... and then Steve
reappears. He literally cuts in on her and Bill dancing and threatens to bring everything
down in ruins."

The intrusion of her old life threatens to destroy Connie's new-found and hard-won happiness, but she's not willing to let it go without a fight. "Connie's a survivor," says Benjamin. "With everything that's been dealt her, she still brings something to the Winterbournes that they haven't had -- a real, pure heart. That's what makes the two worlds go together."

ABOUT THE PRODUCTION

The book I Married a Dead Man first caught the interest of producer Dale Pollock in 1987 and he snapped it up. "I saw it as a great mistaken identity story, as well as a wonderful mother-daughter story," says Pollock. "But not the traditional kind. What I love about this story is that it's not the traditional kind of anything." The original had a melodramatic, film noir quality to it.

Pollock spent three years developing the script with writer Lisa-Maria Radano and, in 1991, took the project to TriStar Pictures. Pollock felt that the book had great comedic and romantic potential. "It was immediately apparent to me that to make this work for a contemporary audience we had to get away from melodrama and do it as a romantic comedy." Phoef Sutton, a writer who has won several Emmies for the long-running hit *Cheers*, joined the team and intensified the comic spin to the story.

Pollock then turned to accomplished director Richard Benjamin, who joined the creative team in the summer of 1994. Benjamin began as a stage and screen actor with acclaimed performances in such films as *Goodbye Columbus*, *Catch 22* and *The Sunshine Boys*. His directorial debut was in 1982 with the wildly successful *My Favorite Year*, a film that brought Peter O'Toole an Oscar® nomination as Best Actor.

"Richard Benjamin is a director who can do a very specific kind of sophisticated comedy, and do it very well. Those directors are extremely rare," says Pollock.

"Benjamin created a textural look that neatly dovetails with every development of the story, from the grunge of New York to the rich opulence of the Winterbourne estate."

The next critical phase for the filmmakers was casting. "This is a very contemporary comedy, so casting was critical to the plausibility of the story," says Pollock. "We started out with Ricki Lake as Connie Doyle. She brings so much of herself to her performance that in a way she is the Ricki Lake everyone knows but in another way, she clearly establishes the character."

For Ricki Lake, the chance to play Connie not only returned her to her first love - acting - but catapulted her to a starring role. Perhaps best known now for her talk show, The Ricki Lake Show, which has taken the television world by storm, Lake began her career as an actor making her debut in John Waters's cult film Hairspray. She has since appeared in a number of Waters's films, including Cry Baby and Serial Mom. She also appeared regularly as Holly Pelagrino in the critically-acclaimed television series China Beach.

Returning to acting after gaining success as a talk show host was a challenge Lake relished. "Five years before I had a talk show I was acting and I wanted to do a part that the audience would root for," she says. "Hairspray was like that for me. It was my first role, a girl who everybody related to and wanted to win. This script really appealed to me. I love the fact that all of Connie's dreams come true and she turns into a princess. It's just like Cinderella and it was a lot of fun to be a part of."

With Lake in place, the search was on for the key role of Grace Winterbourne.

Grace is a mother in search of a daughter and Connie is a daughter in search of a mother.

Their on-screen relationship was crucial to the success of the film. "Shirley MacLaine asked all the right questions and prodded in the right ways and as a result the character of Grace became much more complex and dynamic," says Pollock. "We needed someone

who could be both rich and yet not unrealistic in her wealth. We also needed someone who could play the comedy along with the drama of a woman who has a serious illness, and in Shirley MacLaine we found the perfect actress to achieve that."

Adds Benjamin: "We offered her this part and she said yes. It was a dream come true. Shirley MacLaine is an international star who's done some of the best movies in American cinema."

"She's the ultimate professional," says Lake. "We did a scene where I, as Connie, look into her eyes and tell her that I'm here because of her. It was easy to do. I immediately got teary-eyed because I worship this woman. I've been so nervous and she's been so supportive."

"I liked the role of Grace from the beginning," says MacLaine with a wry smile.

"I liked it because I could wear beautiful clothes for a change and not be a character actress twenty years older than my real age."

"Shirley made the character her own," notes Pollock. "She made Grace vital, extremely contemporary, someone who you believe is living in the mid-1990s even though she's living in this grand house in this grand existence on a grand scale. She's still a real, intimate person."

Lake mirrors the sentiment. "I was nervous because you hear stories about people and you have these expectations," she says. "But Shirley immediately put me at ease.

I've learned so much from her. So, it's easy to play my character who falls in love with this family because I truly love Shirley. I think she's wonderful."

Brendan Fraser came into the cast in the pivotal role of Bill Winterbourne (he also plays Hugh, the twin brother who is killed) only days before rehearsals were scheduled to

begin. Fraser, who has had successful roles in *Encino Man, School Ties* and *With Honors* is a friend of Lake's and was suggested by her. "We needed a romantic leading man who could be fresh and different, good looking, sexy, and yet also have a flair for comedy, which is very hard to find," remembers Pollock. "We were very lucky we found Brendan Fraser who, I think, shows a whole new side of himself in this movie."

"Brendon is just amazing," says MacLaine. "He can be very straight, dramatic, high and mighty; he can be bumbling like Jack Lemmon and he can also be simple. It's really sort of disturbing how easily he can go from one to the next."

"I feel very fortunate to have Shirley, Ricki and Brendan in these roles," says

Benjamin. "They were my first choices for these parts and you don't always get your

first choice."

Principal photography began on May 27, 1995, with two weeks of interior shooting at the Parkwood Estates in Oshawa, Ontario. The production then moved to Eaton Hall in King City, Ontario where the exterior scenes of the Winterbourne Estate were shot. Additional locations include Boston and New York City.

Stage, screen and television star as well as best selling author, SHIRLEY

MACLAINE (Grace Winterbourne) won the 1983 Best Actress Oscar® for her

performance in the hit film Terms of Endearment, and has also been nominated for best

actress Academy Awards® for her roles in Some Came Running, The Apartment, Irma La

Douce and The Turning Point. The multi-talented actress has starred in more than 40

films, including The Trouble With Harry (her film debut), Can-Can, Madame Sousatzka,

Sweet Charity, Being There, Steel Magnolias, Postcards from the Edge, Used People and

Guarding Tess. The actress also won two Golden Globe Awards for her performances in

Terms of Endearment and Madame Sousatzka. MacLaine will reprise her Terms of

Endearment character Aurora Greenaway in the upcoming film Evening Star.

The prolific actress has also starred in several musical-variety television specials, garnering five Emmy Award nominations and winning one for *Gypsy In My Soul*. She has also broken house records for her live, one-woman stage show, *Shirley MacLaine on Broadway*. Most recently she starred in CBS's *West Side Waltz* with Liza Minelli.

As a best selling author MacLaine has written numerous books including the autobiographical Don't Fall Off the Mountain and Out On a Limb, which became a television mini-series that she starred in and co-wrote. Other MacLaine non-fiction titles include Dancing In The Light, It's All in the Playing. Going Within: A Guide for Inner Transformation. Dance While You Can, as well as her recently published, My Lucky Stars, a reminiscence of her 40 years in Hollywood. The actress also produced and co-

directed the Oscar® nominated *The Other Half of the Sky: A China Memoir* following her participation as a leader in the first women's delegation to China in 1973.

She regularly tours performing in her one-woman show to sold out audiences in the United States, Japan, Australia and England as well as headlining with Frank Sinatra in live concerts throughout the United States.

The Virginia-born MacLaine danced in numerous Broadway musicals before becoming a star at age nineteen in the Broadway play *Pajama Game*, in which she replaced lead actress Carol Haney who broke her ankle. Hollywood producer Hal Wallis saw the young MacLaine and immediately signed her to her first movie contract.

RICKI LAKE (Connie Doyle), host of *The Ricki Lake Show*, the fastest growing talk show in television history, made her film acting debut in John Waters's hit film *Hairspray*. She went on to appear in a number of Waters's films, including *Cry Baby* and *Serial Mom*. She also appeared regularly as "Holly Pelagrino" in the critically-acclaimed television series *China Beach*.

Lake's additional film credits include Working Girl, Cookie, Inside Monkey

Zetterland, Where the Day Takes You and Last Exit to Brooklyn. Her television credits include the CBS movie-of-the-week Baby Cakes.

A native of Westchester, New York, Lake began studying singing at the age of nine and attended the Professional Children's School in New York City. While a student at Ithaca College, Lake auditioned for, and landed, the starring role in *Hairspray*.

Following the success of *Hairspray*, Lake moved to Los Angeles where she lived and worked until moving back to New York in 1993 to host *The Ricki Lake Show*.

BRENDAN FRASER (Bill and Hugh Winterbourne) made his feature film debut as a prehistoric caveman in the hit *Encino Man*. He went on to star in *School Ties*, the acclaimed 1950s-era drama about a Jewish student facing anti-Semitism at a New England prep school.

Following these two roles, Fraser starred opposite Joe Pesci in the drama in the drama *With Honors*, played a rock star in the comedy *Airheads*; and opposite Albert Brooks in *The Scout*. His other film credits include Percy Adlon's *Younger and Younger*; Philip Ridley's *The Passion of Darkly Noon*; and Steven Soderbergh's *Professional Man* for Showtime's *Fallen Angels* series.

Benjamin's additional feature film credits include Made in America, Mermaids,
Racing with the Moon, The Money Pit, Little Nikita, City Heat My Stepmother Is An
Alien, Milk Money and Downtown.

As an actor, Benjamin made an auspicious debut opposite Ali MacGraw in 1969's Goodbye, Columbus.
