Good day, and thank you for reaching out.

To reiterate, USGLC's core concern is this:

The United States is losing global leadership because our economic, diplomatic, and development tools are fragmented, reactive, and disconnected from domestic outcomes.

This fragmentation results in:

- Higher conflict costs
- Weaker allies
- Economic instability at home
- Reduced credibility abroad

How My Research Addresses This Challenge

My research does something most policy efforts do not:

It connects historical economic harm → present instability → measurable financial accountability → future prevention.

In doing so, it reframes U.S. global leadership away from reliance on charity and defense spending alone, toward structured economic repair and prevention—precisely where current U.S. policy is weakest.

Step-by-Step: The Solution My Research Provides

1. Identifying the Missing Variable: Unresolved Economic Harm

Most U.S. international policy assumes:

- Aid stabilizes regions
- Growth trickles down
- Time resolves injustice

My research demonstrates that:

- Unrepaired economic harm compounds over time
- It produces long-term instability, displacement, and conflict
- That instability later necessitates:
 - Military intervention
 - Emergency humanitarian aid
 - Border enforcement
 - Crisis diplomacy

Fix: My work shifts policy from reaction to repair.

2. Converting Moral Claims into Economic Instruments

USGLC members understand budgets, metrics, and accountability—not slogans.

My research:

- Translates historical and systemic harm into:
 - Research-backed claims
 - Quantifiable economic loss
 - Structured financial receivables
- Treats injustice as a balance-sheet problem, not a rhetorical one

Fix: Policymakers gain the ability to measure, audit, and manage instability rather than endlessly funding its symptoms.

3. Aligning Domestic Justice with Global Stability

This alignment is central to USGLC's mission.

My research shows that:

- Domestic underinvestment (housing, labor, education, capital access)
 - weakens national resilience
- Weakened resilience
 - reduces diplomatic leverage
 - increases national security risk

Fix: Economic repair at home becomes:

- A foreign policy asset
- A national security strategy
- A credibility signal to allies and adversaries

4. Reducing Long-Term Defense and Aid Costs

USGLC prioritizes cost efficiency and sustainability.

My framework:

- Reduces future reliance on:
 - Military deployments
 - Emergency humanitarian aid
 - Crisis stabilization packages
- By addressing root economic drivers early, rather than perpetually managing fallout

Fix: Fewer crises lead to lower defense strain and a stronger global posture.

5. Providing a Governance Model, Not Just a Theory

Most candidates articulate what should happen.

My research demonstrates:

- How claims are documented
- How accountability is tracked

- How funds are governed
- How transparency is maintained

Fix: Policymakers receive a replicable governance model that can be applied domestically and internationally.

My research demonstrates that unresolved economic harm is one of the primary drivers of instability, and it provides a framework for converting that harm into accountable, preventative economic policy—strengthening U.S. leadership rather than weakening it.
