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

Great Expectations

The famous opening line of <u>Great Expectations</u> certainly is apt for these days: "It was the best of times and the worst of times." We have been saturated with health information, warnings, advice, rising statistics about those infected and the daily death tolls. In a great irony, it is not some well-planned and magnanimous gesture that is bringing our planet together, but a tiny virus that is invisible to the eye. It is creating a common global experience that is seeking cooperation rather than competition, hopefully putting humanity and life above all else.

So how are you doing with this unique stay at home time – so unexpected? In the words of a teenager who used to be at Hope House (our SDS shelter for human trafficked survivors), she complained, "It is so boring! There's nothing to do." Maybe if I were 17, I would feel the same way – but most of us in the region are past the 50 mark and I hope are finding some of the "best" in this time.

While acknowledging the "worst" in this pandemic of sickness, death, job loss and Wall Street's fluctuations affecting the economy, we can go to the news to get filled in on these trends. The focus here will be on how this is indeed also "the best of times."

In our time-driven society, where there never seems to be enough of it, suddenly with all the cancellations, we have a blank calendar. So we have the gift of open time to do what the spirit moves us to do. I can get at something I have put off. It can be quality time, not time squeezed in between so many other things on my calendar. I can give it my full attention and do it in a satisfying way.

There is also the slower and more relaxing pace of just being, of more time to pray and read, of making connections with family and friends. Instead of getting a voice mail telling me to leave a message, I actually get the 'at home' person who can't go anywhere. So it can be a time of renewing, sustaining important relationships in my life.

As I am homebound and can just get necessary groceries, it causes me to sort out what are my real needs versus my wants. This is a big question for us more affluent Americans. (I know some of you may not feel affluent, but in the eyes of the rest of the world, we are affluent with more than enough at our fingertips.) Right now I am reading a book called, How Much Is Enough? by Arthur Simon. In a chapter called "The Poverty of Riches" he says, "We are human beings, not human having's. . . The critical question is no longer 'What do I want? or 'What can we afford to do?' but 'How can we use what God has given us to carry out God's will?"" This time of slow

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down and reflection gives us the chance to grapple with these questions.

There are wonderful good news stories about creative and generous responses people are making in the midst of all the limitations imposed on us. Health care workers are putting themselves at risk and working overtime. We are grateful for them and hold them in prayer. But closer to home, people are looking out for elderly neighbors and doing grocery shopping for them. Jan Bencken, seamstress that she is, is sewing face masks for health care workers. Our parish is being creative in offering on-line Masses and also a grocery shopping ministry for the older members of the parish. People are doing phone checks on those living alone who are vulnerable. We are looking out for each other in unprecedented ways. We are living the goodness and kindness of Jesus – loving one another.

It may take longer than the Easter date of April 12th – but we know it is coming. All of daily life is deeply embedded in resurrection life, so we pray that our world rises to be a more compassionate and loving people!

April Cancellation



From witnessing Jesus in both falling and getting up,


Walking forward in his commitment to be our Savior.

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Synopsis of the General Committee Meeting December 2019 by Ken Drake

The General Committee of the International Community of the Divine Savior (ICDS is the formal name of the Lay Salvatorians) met in Rome December 2nd to 10th, 2019. Included during this time was a meeting with the International Joint Leadership Group (IJLG) on December 6th and 7th. Prayer is an important component of discussions, so each day was started with Eucharist.

The topics discussed by the General Committee were:


- Welcome and general conversation regarding the units and their connection with the General Committee members
- Finances
- The ICDS Statutes: There has been a lot of work done by the General Committee on the Statutes over the past twelve months and the plan it to have the current draft ready to submit to the Dicastery for the Laity, Family, and Life by the end of February 2020. The General Committee worked more on the draft Statutes during this meeting.
- Communication: The General Committee acknowledged that while communication with the units and between the units has improved, there is still a great need for better communication.
- Motivational letters have been posted on the ICDS General Forum on the ICDS website (www.laysalvatorians.org/forum) and will continue to be posted in the future.
- Archives: The ICDS needs to have a central location for the archives of the ICDS and this need was presented at the IJLG meeting for consideration.
- Common Celebration Days: The General Committee decided to encourage each unit around the globe to celebrate on the same date the most important Salvatorian dates. A calendar of suggested dates will be published.
- Salvatorian Family: The General Committee discussed the need to work together with all three

- branches of the Salvatorian Family, especially in areas of joint projects.
- ICDS logo: The General Committee recognizes the need for a logo for the members of the ICDS that encompasses all Lay Salvatorians throughout the world.
- Justice, Peace, and the Integration of Creation (JPIC): The JPIC work group has begun by meeting on Skype and is seeking input from each unit about what they are presently engaged in regarding JPIC issues.
- An evaluation of the meeting format and topics was held and recommendations for future meeting were recorded.

Update: March 23rd, 2020:

After many, many, many hours working via Skype over the last year and a half, the General Committee (the elected Lay Salvatorian representatives from Austria, Belgium, Venezuela, Colombia, Australia, and the USA), with input from many Lay Salvatorians, completed the changes requested by the Dicastery and submitted the Statutes to the Dicastery for approval on March 6th, 2020. - Step 4: Make a note of your reflections and email them to S Sheila (snovaksds@gmail.com). This can be either phrases or sentences – whichever is easier for you.
- Step 5: Please do this by <u>Easter Monday, April</u>

 13th. That gives me a week to take everyone's feedback and create a prayer. The prayers are due on April 20th.
