


## Stories from the Alamo

I did not know that Dana. We were heading to Hong Kong from Viet Nam passing by Taiwan which was on our starboard side. I had the mid watch. We were getting an SOS flashed at us from a ship of some kind that had ran aground on a sand bar. It was signalling all passing ships hoping to get somebody to come pull them off the sandbar.

I had the mid watch. The Alamo was steaming along with other ships in close station keeping in a black out condition, no lights. I think we followed behind the New Orleans about 100 yards I would say. All of a sudden LTJG Rhoads sprang into action and had the boatswain's mate of the watch flip on all the lights and order all engines stop then back 2/3rds. We came very close to colliding with the stern of the LPD. Captain Shockert appeared on the bridge and heaped a lot of praise on Lt Rhoads for his quick action.


LTJG Rhoads actions were deserving of a promotion.
