At the end of the off-ramp, turn right onto Route 43 and 27. for 1/2 mile and at the blinking light turn left on to Route 43. Follow 43 right to the 1st gate of the Fairgrounds.

GENERAL RULES & INFORMATION

Show Schedule

- Move-Out: All exhibitors must vacate the grounds by Sunday at 6:00 PM.
- Class Entries: Classes must be entered during the session prior to the scheduled class.
- Late entries during the same session will incur a \$15 per class fee.
- Scratches: Must be reported before the start of the session in which the class is scheduled.
- Championship Classes Entry: requires participation in the designated qualifying class.



Awards and Payouts

- Six ribbons will be awarded in each class unless otherwise noted.
- Payouts will be paid via vouchers applied to individual show bills.
- Vouchers will be distributed with ribbons.
- \$100 Classes: 1st: \$30, 2nd: \$25, 3rd: \$20, 4th: \$15, 5th: \$10, 6th \$5
- \$1500 Classes: 1st: \$750, 2nd: \$350, 3rd: \$200, 4th: \$100, 5th: \$50, 6th: \$50

Required Paperwork: The following documents are required and verified by the show office.

- Negative Coggins Test: for New Hampshire horses within the past 12 months.
- Negative Coggins Test: Out-of-state horses within the past 6 months.
- Current vaccination records for Rabies and Encephalitis within the past 12 months.
- Breed registration papers must be presented at check-in.
- Health Certificates are not mandatory, but exhibitors should follow state transport regulations.



Camping

- Camper spaces available first-come, first-serve basis.
- Weekend Rate: \$225
- NEFHC Members receive \$10 discount
- Early arrival fees do apply.



Fairgrounds & Dog Rules

- No smoking permitted in any of the barns.
- Dogs must be leashed or secured at all times and kept away from the show ring.
- Excessive barking or nuisance dogs will be removed.
- Dog owners must clean up after pets.
- Fire and emergency lanes must remain clear at all times.

Vehicles and Parking

- Only licensed drivers may operate motorized vehicles.
- Vehicles must be parked in designated areas.
- No parking in: Fire lanes or in front of the barns
- Unauthorized vehicles may be towed at the owner's expense.
- Horse trailers must be parked in designated areas.



Competition Rules

- Only authorized personnel are allowed in the ring.
- Exhibitors must receive permission before speaking with the judge.
- No lunging or long-lining in the show ring.
- Lunging must be done outside the arena.
- In any driving class removing a bridle before unhitching will result in elimination.

Show Management reserves the right to:

- Refuse or cancel any entry
- Remove any person or horse from the grounds
- Change officials without notice
- Split or cancel classes as necessary

Refund Policy and Requirements

- Veterinarian certificate or physician certificate
- Documentation must be submitted before the show begins
- No refunds will be issued for entry fees, stalls, or tack stalls without proper documentation.



Additional Show Rules

- Stallions are not permitted in Ladies or Junior Exhibitor classes unless breed rules allow.
- Holds will not be permitted except under extenuating circumstances with management approval.

TIMES TO BE ANNOUNCED

General Class Specifications:

To enter any championship class, you must have entered, shown, and been judged in the qualifying class. Divisions are rated NEHC and NHH&TA A except where noted.

ACADEMY DIVISION RULES

Riders in this division are students, who are currently taking riding lessons and are to be judged on their basic riding skills. The age of the rider must be listed on the entry blank. Headers for Lead Line riders must be at least 18 years of age. Horses that are used are to be lesson horses. Horses are not to be judged. Class splits will be made at the manager's discretion. There will be minimum holds allowed, please be prepared to enter the ring when the class is called. There will be a 2 minute gate call per class.

Rider Eligibility: A rider may not enter in any other division at the show. A rider who has shown in a regular division class or in a full riding suit at any show is prohibited from participating further in the Division, with the exception of the Show Rider Classes. Once a rider has competed at any level wearing a full suit, they are ineligible to compete in classes at any point thereafter. The rider can however compete in show rider classes in the season(s) following the season in which the rider showed wearing a full suit.

Horse Eligibility: Mounts must be lesson horses. A lesson horse is a horse or pony that is regularly used in a lesson program to teach a number of different riders in any given week. Braiding is optional. There are no shoeing restrictions. Protective boots are permissible. Horses may cross-enter from the regular horse show to classes, provided these horses are school horses as defined above. Mounts may be shown in a snaffle bridle (martingales allowed), Pelham, or full bridle. This division is open to all breeds of horses and ponies.

Rider Attire: Helmets approved for horseback riding (not bicycle helmets) are mandatory for all exhibitors. Riders must wear appropriate boots.

Saddle Seat: Kentucky Jodhpurs, boots, shirt, and tie. Vest and gloves are optional. NO riding coats or derbies are allowed.

Hunt Seat: Hunter style jodhpurs, jodhpur boots or paddock boots, shirt and tie or choker, and helmets. Adults may wear breeches and boots. NO riding coats or derbies are allowed.

Western Seat: Western jeans or slim-fitting pants, long-sleeve shirt. Ties and chaps are optional. NO western hats are allowed.

American Saddlebred Division General Rules:

In order to compete, all horses must be registered with the *American Saddlebred Horse and Breeders Association* or the *Canadian American Saddlebred Horse Registry*. They must be entered in their fully registered names with registration numbers and under the names of the owner(s) of record with the ASHBA or the CASHR. A copy of the registration papers showing proof of ownership, or a copy of the registration papers with a Certificate of Eligibility to Show issued by the American Saddlebred Horse Association must be submitted.

To be shown at an animated walk or flat walk, trot, and canter.

To be shown at a flat walk, trot, extended trot and canter both ways of the ring. Special emphasis is on a true, flat walk. Entries must be asked during both ways of the ring to halt and stand quietly on the rail.

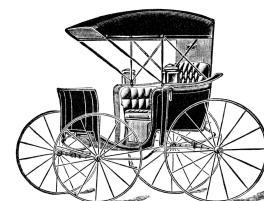

Entries are judged primarily on the performance and quality of each turnout.

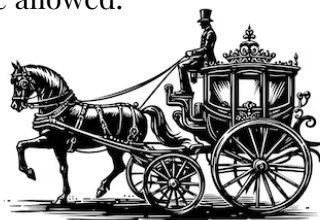
Horses are shown both ways of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot, and strong trot. They are required to stand quietly and rein back. Focus is on the condition, fit and appropriateness of harness and vehicle, spares and appointments, neatness and appropriateness of attire and overall impression as well as on performance, manners, and way of going.

**145. Open Carriage Turnout**

Not NEHC or NHHTA Rated

Concours d'Elegance Section:

A "Concours d'Elegance" is a French term meaning "competition of elegance," referring to events where prestigious vehicles, originally horse-drawn carriages, are displayed and judged, evolving into a tradition of showcasing the finest vintage and historic vehicles. The essence of the competition is the word "Elegance." The winner will be the turnout which, in the opinion of the judge, presents the most elegant effect. This will include vehicle, harness, appointments, horse(s), driver, passengers, grooms, etc., but above all, general impression is most important. Vehicle and harness may be inspected to ensure thoughtful restoration and careful maintenance. Attention will be paid to the personal appearance of the driver, grooms, and passengers as it contributes to the overall picture. Period costumes are definitely prohibited. Performance will not be judged unless it detracts from the elegance of the turnout. Singles or Pairs and Two or Four Wheel Carts are allowed.

89. Concours d'Elegance

Not NEHC or NHHTA Rated

Costume Division:

Open to all breeds, horses and ponies. To be shown at a walk and trot. Entries should display the horse and rider in an authentic costume within a time period of choice or in any creative costume of choice. Exhibitors should dress in a manner consistent with their turnout. No walkers are allowed. Flags, bards, and banners are permitted. Focus is on authenticity to period, creativity, suitability of costume to horse and rider, and manners.

**42. Open Costume**

Not NEHC or NHHTA Rated

Dressage Hack Section:

To enter the ring at a working walk. To be shown at a working walk, working trot, working canter, lengthened trot, and lengthened canter both ways of the arena. Free walk and working trot on long rein with horse stretching forward and down to be performed in at least one direction. A rein back may be asked for. Transitions into and out of the canter will be asked for through the working trot. Horses will be asked to reverse direction at the working trot. Trot work to be ridden sitting or rising at the judge's discretion.

76. Open Dressage Hack

Dressage Suitability Section:

To be eligible, horses may not have shown in recognized dressage competitions/tests at second level or above. Horses to enter at a working walk. To be shown at a working trot, working canter, working walk, and lengthened trot and trot on a loose rein. Free walk and working walk on a long rein. Trot work to be ridden rising.

119. Open Dressage Suitability

Show Hack Section:

Horses are required to demonstrate 10 distinct gaits including the collected, normal, and extended versions of the walk, trot, and canter, plus a controlled hand gallop. Judges look for a highly obedient horse that maintains a rounded frame and crisp, immediate transitions between these gaits. The performance must showcase the horse's versatility and athletic brilliance while remaining light and steady on the bit. Unlike a standard pleasure class, the emphasis is on the horse's ability to show a clear and dramatic difference in stride length and collection throughout the rail work

EQUITATION - HUNT SEAT PLEASURE

Hunt Seat Pleasure Equitation Section:

All riders in this division must wear hard hats with harnesses. Cannot cross enter into Hunter Seat Equitation for the entire show year and open to all Junior Exhibitors. Riders to be judged on the flat with emphasis on position, hands, seat, and the rider's horsemanship to execute a pleasure ride.

NEHC Hunt Seat Pleasure Equitation Medal Section:

All contestants are to show at the walk, trot, and canter both ways of the ring. To fill a class, three (3) competitors must show and be judged with proper appointments. At least the top three contestants are then required to perform test A or B.

Walk Trot Hunt/Western Equitation 10 and Under Section:

Open to riders 10 years of age and under. No child entered may compete in any other class requiring entries to canter or lope. Rider must not have ever been judged in a class at a show that required a canter. No tests will be called. It is recommended that a class having 12 entries or more be divided.

NEHC Saddleseat Medal Section:

Open to Junior Members of the New England Horsemen's Council who have not reached their 18th birthday. All contestants are to show at the walk, trot, and canter both ways of the ring. At least the top three contestants are required to perform test A or B.

Walk Trot Saddle Seat Equitation Section:

Open to riders 10 years of age and under. No child entered may compete in any other class requiring entries to canter or lope. Riders will be asked to show at walk and trot both ways of the ring.

Friesian Division Section:

All Friesian classes will accept only purebred KFPS, FPZV, FHH, FBH, FSH Friesians or certified registered Friesians. Each animal must show proof of registry.

Friesian Costume Section:

To be shown at a walk and trot. Excessive speed is to be penalized. Exhibitors may be asked to halt and stand quietly on the rail. Exhibitors may show individually or in groups up to 5. Exhibitors should dress in a manner consistent with their turnout. No walkers are allowed. Focus is on creativity, suitability of costume to horse and rider, and manners.

41. \$100 Friesian Costume

Not NHHTA or NEHC rated

Friesian In Hand Division Section:

Horse classes will be judged at 60% on movement and 40% on conformation. No more than 2 handlers per horse shall be allowed in the ring. One whip per handler is allowed. Per KFPS horses are requested to **not shave**; nose, whiskers, and ears and can not be penalized for them.

Friesian Pleasure Section:

Entries in Friesian Country English Pleasure Saddle Seat or Country Pleasure Driving are **prohibited** from competing in the following sections Friesian English Pleasure Saddle Seat, Park, Fine Harness and Show Pleasure Driving at the same competition.

Cross entries are permitted, however, between Friesian English Pleasure Saddle Seat, Park, Fine Harness and Show Pleasure Driving.

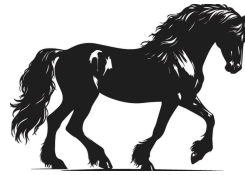

Friesian Pleasure Driving Section:

To be shown at a walk, normal trot, and extended trot both ways of the ring. Horses are to stand quietly and back readily. Headers are required. Classes are to be judged on manners, performance, type, quality, and conformation. Single, pairs, or four in hand may be shown

Driving Vehicles:

Horses must be shown to a traditional Meadowbrook Cart or a two wheeled vehicle suitable to the horse such as traditional American show carts or road carts. Antiques, or reproduction carriages, are not allowed. One or two people per vehicle, as appropriate, is allowed. A whip in-hand suitable for the vehicle is required. A knowledgeable adult driver **must** accompany junior drivers under fourteen years of age.



Driving Attire:

Drivers should dress according to the present day style. Dress for the driver should conform to the type of turnout. Dutch attire is permissible, if suitable to the vehicle. Informal saddle seat suit with matching tie, gloves, and derby is appropriate for men and women. A suit, tie, sport coat, and slacks are acceptable for men. 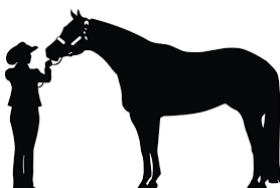

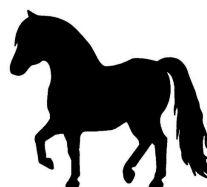

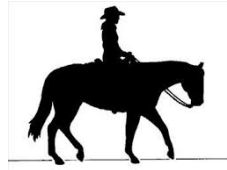

DRESSAGE DIVISION

General Guidelines:

Dressage schooling shows are conducted according to the USEF Rules for Dressage Competitions, with exceptions as noted here. A current copy of the USEF Rulebook where the most recent rule changes are highlighted in red is available on the USEF website.

A simple snaffle, regular cavesson, flash, figure-eight or drop noseband are required. A noseband is required for dressage competitions unless prior approval to ride without one has been obtained. Twisted wire bits are not permitted. Bandages, boots, blinders, martingales, draw reins, side reins, running reins, or artificial devices are not permitted.

Riders may have a reader (except in final and championship classes); however, it is the rider's responsibility to know the test. Movements may be read only once. All FEI tests, including FEI Jr. tests, must be ridden from memory. Use of voice while riding your test is not permitted. Committing three course errors, leaving the arena during the test, or marked lameness results in elimination.

Horses may not be entered in classes differing by more than one level at any one show. The number of classes entered must comply with the USEF rule limiting the total number of classes in which a horse may be ridden per day. Currently horses competing at 4th level and below may enter a maximum of 3 classes per day. A rider must enter the arena within 45 seconds of the judge's signal (usually a bell or a whistle).

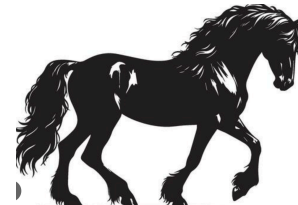

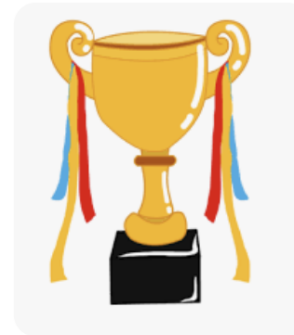

Carriage Pleasure Driving Section

A Pleasure Driving class in which entries are judged primarily on the suitability of the horse to provide a pleasant drive. To be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. To stand quietly, both on the rail and while lined up, and to rein back. Focus is on performance, manners and way of going of the horse as well as on the condition and fit of harness and vehicle, and neatness of attire.

Gentlemen Carriage Pleasure Driving Section

Entries are judged primarily on the suitability of the turnout for a gentleman with emphasis on manners. To be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot and strong trot. May show a degree of boldness but not excessive speed. Must rein back without resistance and must stand quietly at any location in the arena. To be judged 50% on manners, performance and suitability of the turnout for a gentleman, 25% on skill of the driver and 25% on overall impression.

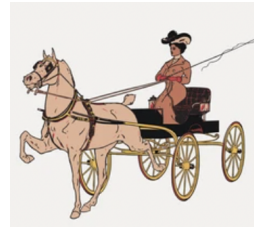


Ladies Carriage Pleasure Driving Section

Entries are judged primarily on the suitability of the turnout for a lady with emphasis on manners. To be shown both ways of the arena at a walk, slow trot, working trot, and strong trot. Must rein back without resistance and must stand quietly at any location in the arena. To be judged

50% on manners, performance, elegance, and suitability of the turnout for a lady, 25% on the skill of the driver, and 25% on overall impression..

Carriage Dog Section

Judged primarily on suitability of the dog to serve as a companion (maximum one dog per vehicle). To be judged both ways in the arena at a walk, slow trot and working trot.

- a. The dog must be standing, lying down or seated on the vehicle.
- b. The dog must be under control at all times. The dog must not be led on the ground from the vehicle or be restrained by being tied to the vehicle, driver or passenger.
- c. The driver should not hold the dog, and the dog should not interfere with the driver in any way.
- d. The dog may be of any breed or mix.

To be judged 60% on the suitability of the dog to serve as a companion, 30% on the performance, manners and way of going of the horse(s), and 10% on the overall impression of the turnout, including the dog.

Entries with a dog clearly not under control may be eliminated.

Cones Section

The Cones Competition is to test the fitness, obedience and suppleness of the horses and the skill and competence of the athletes. Competitors must navigate a timed course of numbered pairs of cones, each topped with a balanced ball, within a specific "clearance" that becomes narrower as the level of competition increases. Success in this phase requires the horse to remain supple and responsive to

subtle aids while maintaining a brisk pace, as penalty points are awarded for both knocking down a ball and exceeding the allowed time. It is a high-stakes finale that demands a perfect balance of speed and accuracy, serving as a true testament to the partnership and "fitness for purpose" of the driving team.

Fifteen sets of cones to be run consecutively in numerical order. The winner will be determined by fastest time through the course. Timing begins when passing through the start and is stopped when the rear axle passes through the finish line. Penalties will be assessed for knocking down a ball in seconds, and off course will be alerted by a signal from the course judge. No maximum time will be established for the course.

Derby Section:

A Derby is a hybrid of marathon and cones driving, designed to test the speed, agility, and "handiness" of the driving team. Competitors navigate a course that blends traditional numbered cone pairs with expansive, marathon-style obstacles (such as lettered gates and natural or artificial barriers) in a continuous, timed run. Precision is just as vital as pace, as penalty seconds are added to the driver's time for each ball displaced or gate missed.

A driving derby competition consists of one round over a course consisting of pairs of cones and marathon-type obstacles. A round is run as a tied competition with penalties converted to seconds. Total time determines placings and the lowest time wins.

Safety: All athletes and groom (s) must wear securely fitted and fastened protective headgear which meets ASTM/SEI standards for equestrian use and body protector.

Fault and Out Section

A timed course of numbered obstacles to be driven at the trot. After passing through the Start markers, the driver proceeds through each consecutively numbered obstacle, in order, until the allowed time expires (suggested time, 90 seconds to two minutes), or until an obstacle is dislodged or a disobedience occurs.

If all the obstacles are driven cleanly before the allowed time expires, the driver will begin the course again, starting with obstacle #1, without having to pass through the Start markers. Passing through the Start markers more than once is not considered “off course” and is not penalized.

Two points will be scored for each obstacle cleared before the allowed time expires, a disobedience occurs or an obstacle is dislodged. When the allowed time expires, a disobedience occurs or an obstacle is dislodged, a signal will be given. The driver then proceeds through the next consecutively numbered obstacle. The time will be taken when the rear axle clears this obstacle. If that obstacle is cleared, one point is scored. If it is dislodged, no points for that dislodged obstacle are scored, but the time is still taken. The score of a driver who fails to drive the next consecutively numbered obstacle after the whistle is blown counts, up to the point where the signal is given, but the competitor must be placed after those with an equal score and time. Placings will be determined by the greatest number of points.

Your Route/My Route Section

To be driven over a course of 10 numbered obstacles.

Your route: After passing through the start markers, the driver drives through all 10 obstacles in the correct sequence and direction.

My route: After completing the #10 obstacle, the competitor will continue, without passing through the Start/Finish markers by driving all obstacles a second time in any sequence and in either direction.

Time will be taken when passing through the Finish markers in either direction. Entries may be stopped by a signal from the judge after completing the #10 obstacle to allow dislodged/disturbed obstacles to be rebuilt.

Course faults are assessed as penalty seconds and are added to the driver's elapsed time. Placings are determined on a low total time basis. Ties for first may be decided by a drive-off.

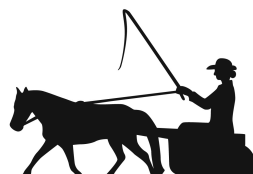
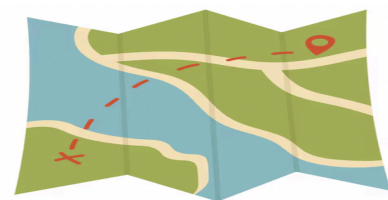

Driven Dressage Section:

Driven Dressage is the ultimate test of a horse's training, suppleness, and obedience, serving as the foundation for all combined driving disciplines. Much like its ridden counterpart, this section evaluates the harmonious partnership between horse and driver as they execute a prescribed sequence of movements within a marked arena. Judges look for a horse that moves with a relaxed rhythm, maintains a consistent contact with the bit, and responds with "willing utility" to the driver's subtle aids. From the precision of the transitions to the accuracy of the figures, Driven Dressage rewards the horse that demonstrates both athletic development and a calm, attentive temperament.

Training Driven Dressage Section:

The Training Level is designed to demonstrate the foundation of a horse's education, focusing on the basic principles of rhythm, relaxation, and freedom of movement. At this level, the horse should show a willing and calm attitude while maintaining a consistent, forward-moving working trot and a clear, natural walk. The tests emphasize large, flowing figures such as 20-meter circles and smooth, progressive transitions that allow the horse to maintain its balance. Drivers are encouraged to showcase a steady, supportive contact, proving that the horse is attentive to the aids and prepared for the more structured requirements of higher-level work.

Limit: Open to exhibitors or horses who have not won 6 blue ribbons—at NEHC or USEF-rated shows in the driven dressage division.

Junior: Open to junior exhibitors.

Preliminary Driven Dressage Section:

This division marks a significant step forward in the horse's athletic development, requiring a higher degree of balance, mental focus, and "willing utility." The tests introduce more technical challenges, including smaller 15-meter circles, more precise

transitions at specific markers, and mandatory sections of one-handed driving. Judges look for a more sophisticated partnership where the horse remains supple and "on the bit" while executing more demanding patterns with accuracy and ease.

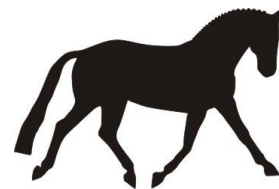

Judges look for "throughness" and a refined invisible connection between the driver's hand and the horse's mouth, especially during the demanding one-handed sequences and technical lateral work. By offering a "Test of Choice" format, this section provides a premier platform for Advanced combinations to demonstrate their mastery of the most complex figures in the international rulebook, emphasizing the elegance and power of the single horse at the highest stage of the sport.

Friesian Driving Z Test Section:

Represents the advanced "Zwaar" (Heavy/Difficult) level of Dutch traditional driving, designed to showcase the power, collection, and high-stepping elegance unique to the Friesian breed. Following KFPS and IFCE standards, this test requires a horse with significant self-carriage and "impulsion from behind." Competitors must demonstrate clear differentiation between the collected, working, and extended trot, with an emphasis on the brilliance of the front-end action and the stability of the frame. Precision is paramount, as the test features sophisticated lateral work, smaller circles, and transitions that must be executed with absolute harmony between horse and driver. This class is the ultimate showcase of the modern Friesian as a premier performance driving horse.

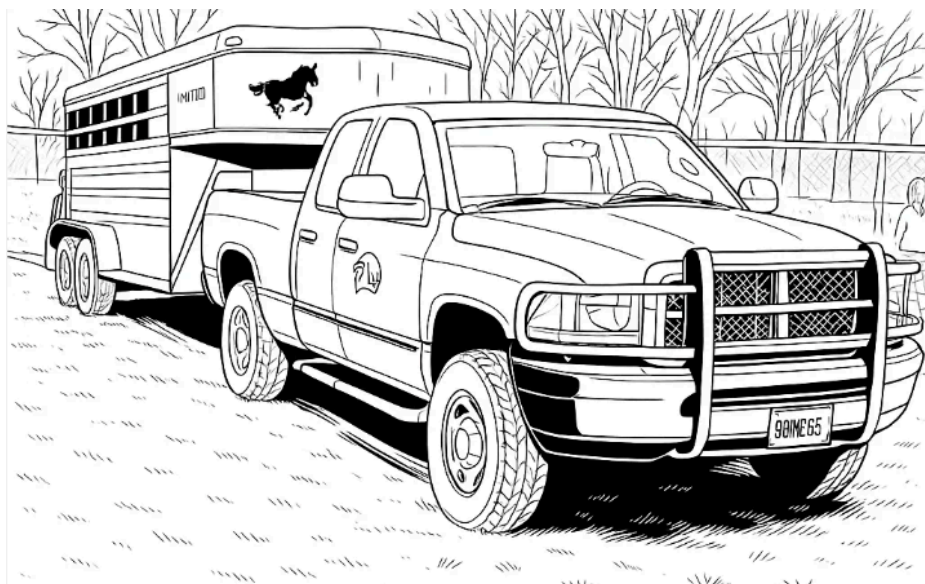

GENERAL RULES:

Horses will be shown in a western stock saddle. Silver equipment will not be counted over clean, working equipment. Horses of all ages may be shown in a snaffle, bosal, or curb bit.

Open Division riders must ride one-handed if using a curb bit. Riders in other divisions may ride two-handed in all legal bits. Split reins or romal reins will be used with all curb bits. When a bit is used, the mouth piece must be at least 5/16" and not more than 3/4" in diameter measured one inch from the cheek and must be smooth, no twisted wire mouth-pieces. Nothing may protrude below the mouthpiece such as prongs. Curb straps are required for curb bits and curb chains or straps must be at least 1/2" in width and lie flat against the horse's chin. No wire curbs are permitted, regardless of the amount of padding or tape.

Prohibited Equipment: tie downs, cavessons, gag bits, twisted-wire mouth pieces, mechanical hackamores, bitless bridles, sidepulls, and running martingales are prohibited. . A judge may prohibit the use of any equipment deemed to be inhumane. Judges may inspect bits and equipment at any time. Protective leg gear is acceptable in all performance (speed) classes.

Other guidelines: 1. No hoof polish 2. No braided or banded manes or tail extensions 3. Trimming inside ears is discouraged 4. Trimming bridle path is allowed as is trimming of fetlocks or long facial hair 5. Equipment with silver should not count over a good working outfit. Excessive silver on halter, bridles and saddles is discouraged.

Attire: Riders under 18 shall wear a ATSM helmet and will not be penalized nor will adults who choose to wear a helmet. Western hats, long sleeved shirts, jeans and western boots. Western boots will include typical cowboy boots or lace-up ropers. All other footwear is prohibited. The use of spurs and chaps/chinks is optional but desirable . Clothing should be neat and clean. No bling on shirts or saddle pads.

Class Rules

Ranch Horse in Hand:

To be shown in a halter. Silver show halters are discouraged. Classes will be divided in to Mares all ages and Geldings/Stallions all ages. All entries will be judged at a walk, trot, and extended trot. Entries will line up at the judge's discretion. To be judged 60% on correctness, balance, way of moving, and conformation suitable for a working ranch type horse and 40% on manners & disposition. Show committees may ask for these classes to be combined depending on entries

Ranch Horse Pleasure The Ranch Horse Pleasure class measures the ability of the horse to be a pleasure to ride while being used as a means of conveyance from one ranch task to another while riding with a group of horses or individually. The horse should be well-broke, relaxed, quiet, soft, and cadenced at all gaits. The horse should be ridden on a relatively loose rein with light contact and without requiring undue restraint. The horse should be responsive to the rider and make timely transitions in a smooth and correct manner. The horse should be soft in the bridle and yield to contact. The ideal stock horse should have a natural, level headed carriage at each gait.

Ranch Riding The purpose of the Ranch Riding class is to measure the ability of the horse to be a pleasure to ride while being used as a means of conveyance from performing one ranch task to another. This class consists of exhibitors completing a pattern individually. The horse should reflect the versatility, attitude, and movement of a working ranch horse riding outside the confines of an arena. The horse should be well-trained, relaxed, quiet, soft, and cadenced at all gaits. The ideal ranch horse will travel with forward movement and demonstrate an obvious lengthening of stride at extended gaits. The horse can be ridden with light contact or on a relatively loose rein without requiring undue restraint, but not shown on a full drape of reins. The overall manners and responsiveness of the ranch riding horse to make timely transitions in a smooth and correct manner, as well as the quality of the movement are of primary considerations. The ideal ranch riding horse should have a natural head carriage at each gait.

Ranch Trail The Ranch Trail class, as the name implies, tests the horse's ability to cope with situations encountered in everyday riding. The horse is ridden through a pattern of obstacles which should nearly approximate those found during the course of everyday work. The horse/rider team is judged on the correctness, efficiency, and pattern accuracy with which the obstacles are negotiated and the attitude and mannerisms exhibited by the horse. Judging emphasis is on identifying the well-broke, responsive, well-mannered horse which can correctly navigate and negotiate the course.

The trail course will include no less than six obstacles. Care must be exercised to avoid setting up any obstacles that may be hazardous to the horse or rider.

Ranch Round Up Ranch Round Up is a timed event. This class proves the agility, versatility, and the quickness of a ranch horse when called upon. Exhibitors will perform a specific pattern designed by

ECRRA. The pattern must be run correctly, the fastest time wins. • Knocking down of each obstacle will incur a 5 second penalty added to the time. • Performing the pattern incorrectly will result in a no time and will not place. • For walk/trot Ranch Round Up, loping more than 3 strides in a pattern will result in a no time and will not place.

Judging Guidelines Gaits for Ranch Riding and Ranch Pleasure – In all gaits, movement of the ranch riding horse should simulate a horse needing to cover long distances, softly and quietly, like that of a working ranch horse. The following terminology shall apply:

1. Walk – the walk is a natural, flat-footed, four-beat gait. The gait is rhythmic and ground covering. As in all gaits, the horse should display a level, or slightly above level topline with a bright, attentive expression.
2. Extended walk – the extended walk is an obvious lengthening of the stride with forward motion while maintaining a four-beat walk.
3. Trot – the trot is a natural two-beat gait demonstrating more forward motion than the western jog.
4. Extended trot – the extended trot is an obvious lengthening of the stride with a definite increase in pace. The horse should be moving in a manner as if it were covering a large area on a ranch with an above level top line.
5. Lope – the lope is a three-beat gait. The lope should be relaxed and smooth with a natural, forward moving stride.
6. Extended lope – the extended lope is not a run or a race, but should be an obvious lengthening of the stride, demonstrating a forward, working speed. The horse should display an above level top line with a bright, attentive expression.

The overall cadence and performance of the gaits should be as those described above, with an emphasis on forward movement, free-flowing, and ground-covering for all gaits. Transitions should be performed where designated, with smoothness and responsiveness. Posting at the trot is acceptable. Touching or holding the saddle horn is acceptable.

Division and Class Eligibility

Open Division: Open to any rider regardless of age, status, or prior winnings. Exhibitors in the Open Division must ride one-handed in curb bits.

Exhibitors may ride two-handed if showing in a snaffle bit or bosal for horses of any age.

Non Pro Division: The Non Pro division is intended for non-professional exhibitors. The exhibitor has not received payment directly or indirectly for riding, training, assisting in training or showing horses at any time in the last 5 years. The rider has not received payment directly or indirectly for instructing another person or conducting a seminar in riding, training, or showing a horse at any time in the last 5

years. There is no age requirement for this division. Premium money won is not considered remuneration.

Novice Division: The Novice rider division is reserved for individuals with limited riding and showing experience who wish to learn more about showing in ECRRA at a beginner's pace. The rider must meet all Non Pro eligibility requirements listed above, plus the rider has not won any champion titles at any show or cumulative first place yearend awards in ECSHA, ECRRA, SVRA, ASHA, or any State 4-H finals. Exhibitors have not earned more than 10 points in any breed or national association (AQHA, APHA, etc.) or any money in a national organization (NCHA, NRCHA, NRHA, RHAA, etc.) in any western performance discipline (western pleasure, working cow horse, reining, cutting, trail, etc.). There is no age requirement for this division. Stallions are prohibited in this division

Youth Division: Exhibitors in the Youth Division must be aged 8-18 as of the start of the ECRRA show year (resets at KILE ECRRA Championship Show each year) of the current year. Stallions are prohibited in this division.

Primetime Division: Exhibitors in the Primetime Division must be 50 years of age or older as of the start of the ECRRA show year.

Green Horse classes: Members and nonmembers are eligible to show in the Green Horse classes based on meeting eligibility criteria. Green horses are eligible for recognition of the top 5 point earning Green horses in the year. For a horse to be eligible, the horse must be in its first two years of showing. Horses in Green classes have not earned more than 10 ranch points in any breed or national association (AQHA, APHA, etc.). Green horses have not won an ECRRA division champion, reserve, or Top 30 designation.

Saddle Type Horse: The saddle type horse is intended for Friesians, Morgans, Saddlebreds, Gypsies like typed horses for professionals and non-professional exhibitors. There is no age requirement for this division. Stock horses Quarter Horse, Paints, Pinto like type horses cant not enter this division.
