

Sweet Potato Pill Snacks By Lesley Wilson



When it comes to giving pills, I have one dog who eats almost anything – including pills – and another who turns her nose up at almost everything. Enter the sweet potato. I microwave the potato using the "potato" setting, let it cool, remove the skin, and then cut it into dice.
