Get Ready for the Westie Spring Fling!

The next Westie walk is at the waterfront in Edmonds on May 18th. Our recent Westie walk in Issaquah was so popular, we are hosting another one at Lake Sammamish State Park on June 7th. We meet lots of new Westies at these events, and it's great to trade stories with fellow Westie lovers.

Preparations are already underway for the Pacific Northwest Scottish Highland Games in Enumclaw July 26-27. Celtic Kennel organizers have invited us to participate, and we're starting to seek volunteer handlers to bring their Westies to our Celtic Kennel 'meet the breed' booth. Our goal is to

educate the public about our breed, its temperament, and responsible pet ownership.

As Westie owners, we know that our dogs can be willful, independent, full of bluster, and ready to give chase. While Westies are known for being friendly and happy dogs, there are times when unwanted aggression may show. Recently, the Board of Directors updated our Standing Rules to instruct us humans on how to take control of our pets should a dangerous situation develop at a club event.

Simply put, remove the pet from the environment. Dogs in biting/fighting mode are stressed. While behaviors can be challenging to modify, "Reactive Rover" classes are offered by some of the area dog training facilities.

Here are the recently established rules:

Aggressive Dog Behavior at our Events

1. Any Westie/dog who is attending our sponsored club event and displays aggressive behavior by either lunging/biting at humans or starting fights with other dogs, will be removed from our functions and/or dog walks. If they want to attend in the future their dog must be muzzled.

2. A formal notification from the Board of Directors will be sent to the owner informing them of the rules of attending our functions if they have a reactive dog that is causing damage to people or other dogs.

We do recognize that dogs have *playful* aggression versus aggression that leads to injury. Learning to read your dog's body language may help you to see signs of fight behavior. In a class I took a couple years ago, I received the <u>T-E-M-P chart</u>. The position of the Tail, Ears & Eyes, Mouth and Posture tell a lot about a dog's emotions and intentions.

Thank you for being responsible dog owners.






Product Recommendation

Slippery Elm Bark Powder



Someone recommended this product when I was breeding. You aren't supposed to give strong prescribed medicine to dogs who are nursing, so Slippery Elm Bark was recommended to me, though I hadn't heard of it before.

It's a natural powder, and it comes in a big jar, maybe you can share it. Anyway, it works like a charm. You just put 1/4 scoop (enclosed in the jar) on the food once a day and .. wowie zowie... it is amazing.

According to the website:


<u>Slippery Elm Bark</u> powder is a prebiotic mucilage that coats and soothes the digestive tract and is loaded with the SCFA (short-chain fatty acid, "Butyrate") that is known to fight

SID (small intestinal dysbiosis). Sometimes adding Slippery Elm with a little water to a meal is sufficient enough to get SID under good control, alleviating the need for a course of antibiotics. Although this is not always guaranteed to work, it is well worth trying.

About \$15.49 for 4 ounces or 350 doses for a dog up to 25 pounds.
