CALLAO SUPPLY COMPANY

Multi-Generational Businesses

One of the unique qualities of Callao, "Hometown of the Northern Neck," is that we boast many multigenerational businesses as a mainstay of the community. One such business is Callao Supply Company, which was established in 1938 by Edwin and Helen Deitz.

Callao Supply Company, located at 409 Northumberland Highway, was operated by Edwin and Helen Deitz between 1938 and 1968. The Deitz family moved to Callao from Wicomico Church in the 1940's. Helen was expecting twins when they opened Callao Supply Company as a hardware store. They already had two boys. This young couple with a growing family had a vision of success and ventured into the hardware business.

The section of the store where the cash register is presently located was the original section of the hardware store. The current office of Callao Supply was the original law office for T.A. Williams. There was even a beauty shop in that section behind Mr. Williams' office. They started with just the center section of the current location and built the adjacent areas in order to expand and keep up with the growing demand for their products. Besides

hardware, Callao Supply sold lumber, plywood, windows and doors. Mr. Deitz ran a Millwork shop behind the store producing custom millwork orders. Many of the windows and doors that were sold were custom built in this millwork shop. In the 1940's, Mr. Deitz also operated a sawmill. During the war they cut a great deal of lumber. There was so much demand during the war they even took lumber to Baltimore to be sold. Due to high demand, they would cut it green and plane it green the next day to keep up. They were so busy, at one time Mr. Deitz employed about 70 men working between the hardware store, the sawmill and the crews he had building houses. Some of the men helped out on the two farms that he also owned. The current Pritchard and Fallin building was originally built and operated by Mrs. Deitz. The Deitz family also built and operated the motel and Mr. Deitz and his father built the old Gardy's Mill, which was a five story building beside the current firehouse.

The next Deitz generation to operate Callao Supply Company was Phillip H. Deitz starting in 1968. He stopped building houses to take over Callao Supply. He was responsible for building several warehouses. The back section of the store used to be a warehouse. In the 1980's the wall to the back section was knocked out and turned into a

showroom. There was once a porch where the paint room is now.

Phillip H. Deitz's son, Phillip E. Deitz, took over the business in 2002. Phillip E. Deitz started working in the family business at the age of 13 and currently operates the business with his wife, Lisa. Their son, Jason, and daughter, Leslie, also work in the family business. Their grandchildren are often there to entertain the customers with their cute antics.

After suffering a devastating fire in 2006 which burned down the main warehouse (housing windows, doors, and millwork) Phillip and his family demonstrated resilience and a strong faith, while they spent many years rebuilding. Today, amidst the uptick in the housing business in recent years, the housing and construction market has greatly improved. This has kept the crew Callao Supply Company very busy. currently carries hardware, building materials, animal feed, lawn and garden supplies, Valspar paint, Cabot stain and more. One of the unique attractions in Callao Supply includes an antique scale (over 100 years old) which gets calibrated yearly by state inspectors. The accuracy is incredible. The crew will weigh your hardware and your seeds with precision. If you want to experience the old fashioned service of a small business, check out Callao Supply and all that a multi-generational business has to offer.

Cralle Insurance Agency, Inc.

Cralle Insurance Agency, Inc. is another multigenerational business located in Callao, with an additional branch office in Montross, Virginia. The business was established in 1948 by Lewis Broaddus Cralle, Sr. The original location was on route 360, in the heart of Callao.

Lewis B. Cralle Sr. ran the business in Callao until his passing in 1965. His son, Lewis B. Cralle, Jr. was away attending Gordon Military College and all set for a career in the military when he learned of his father's passing. He was summoned home to run the family business and help to look out for his mother, since he was an only child. Lewis B. Cralle Jr. was only in his twenties when this happened, but with some help from his uncle (by marriage) James Suthard, he was able to keep the business going and eventually expanded.

Around 1987, Lewis B. Cralle Jr. purchased the Northern Neck Insurance book of business (NNINS Agency Code #3) from Mr. Herbert Bronner, who was retiring. He also later purchased June Parker's Agency which had NNINS Agency Code #2. His son, Chris Cralle, followed in his father and grandfather's footsteps when he joined the business after graduating college in 1989.

According to Chris Cralle: "During my youth, I watched how my family loved serving the locals and the community with their insurance needs. If someone suffered a loss due to bad weather or fire, my dad was on site to help them through the process of rebuilding." After joining the business in 1989, Chris said he continued the family tradition with the desire to do just as they had done for many years before him, which was to serve our community. Chris became president of the



company when his dad passed in 1998. Today, Chris, his mom, Betty F. Cralle, and sister, Susan C. Saunders, co-own the family agency.

As president, Chris has continued to nurture and grow the family legacy. In 2020, Cralle Insurance Agency, Inc. purchased the book of business from People's Insurance in Montross and opened a second location at 17318 Kings Highway, Montross, Virginia. Chris says, "Now I am so pleased that my son, Christopher Lewis Cralle, has chosen the path that his greatgrandfather, grandfather, and I chose and has joined our agency."

The first Cralle came to Northumberland County in 1680 and purchased the land where Chris lives today in 1711. Cralle Insurance Agency, Inc. continues to serve the community they love with their deep roots in the community, excellent agents on staff, and now the fourth generation carrying on in the family business.



Pine Woods Farm, a homestead near Callao, located at 1313 Fruit Plain Road, Callao Virginia, continues to offer fresh chickens. and whole pigs for your BBQ pit (100-200 pound pigs). Beginning the second week of March (on Saturdays) they will reopen with cheese, butter, honey, cottage cheese and sour cream.

The owner, Joseph Hosteller, has been hard at work this winter

his homestead. with ln addition to the area where he manages the poultry operation, he has added a large chicken habitat nearby to make it convenient for the Mr. Hosteller processing. said since they did very well with turkeys last fall, he plans to offer them again this year. He hopes to get 200 this time. You can't get much fresher!

Mr. Hosteller said his community is still planning to open a cheese house on Calvary Church Road. He said thev are working diligently to get the permits approved by the Department of Environmental Quality. Once the permits are







approved, they will begin working on the buildings.

Woodland Acres Greenhouse, owned and operated by Ben Esh and his family, is located at 1415 Fruit Plain Road, Callao Virginia. On Saturdays, they currently operate their bake stand at this location.

Mr. Esh and his family have also been extremely busy this

winter expanding their homestead. Along with building their new home, they have added a second, new larger greenhouse and already have a multitude of hanging baskets and planters started. In addition to the hanging baskets and planters, they had tomato plants started which they planted in the newly erected hoop house, hoping to have early tomatoes. Mr. Esh had his team of horses out recently tilling the land and is about to plant onions. Fresh tomatoes and onions sound delicious!

This spring, they will have a variety of plants including herbs, annuals, possibly perennials, and hopefully vegetables this summer. Starting with the first Saturday in April, the Esh family will reopen their roadside stand nearby on route 202 near the old Hyacinth Post Office next to Henderson Church. They will operate at this location most Saturday mornings. Mr. Esh hopes to install a more durable covered structure for the stand to help in case there is inclement weather. Get ready for those fresh doughnuts, baked goods, and some colorful and beautiful plants.



W.C. Lowery, Inc.

In this issue we have been featuring some of the "multigenerational" businesses that comprise a foundational part of the Callao Business District. W.C. Lowery, Inc. is one such business, with its origin going back to 1956. The founder, Warren C. Lowery, Sr. (otherwise known as "Pop" to his family) started the business with a dump truck and a shovel. operated out of his house, with his wife, Kathleen Lowery, doing the books. Mr. Lowery Sr. added two trucks (seven yard mixers) for the redi-mix business and progressed to septic installation in the 1960's. The current crew recently came across one of the early invoices, and it was for installation of a new septic system for \$600! Oh, how times have changed!

After Gardy's Mill burned in the 1970's, the Lowery family purchased that property and built their original plant (up the hill behind where their current location is now). Warren's younger son, Dennis Lowery, began working in the family business in 1974. He worked mostly with pumping, concrete, and added the portable toilet rental operation. Warren Lowery, Jr. started in the 1980's and focused on septic installation.

Dennis' children. (the third generation) also work in the family Dennis' son, Carter, business.

joined the family business in 2007. His daughter, Meghan Lowery, has worked in the business since 2010. Even Meghan's daughter, Callie (shown below) has been known to help the business by recording radio ads. They are grooming her early to come aboard...

Warren C. Lowery, Sr. built a solid reputation in the community and the generations that have followed work hard to carry on the family tradition. They want the community to know they offer quality septic systems, pumping services, and reliable portable toilets. It is not unusual for W.C. Lowery, Inc. to rent out 500 portable toilets per month, especially to construction sites and weekend rentals. They have added the specialty portable toilets on trailers, that are ADA compliant and are used mostly for special events. These are often reserved a year in advance,

so call or email them early if you have a special event or wedding in need of this service. (Note: Portable toilets "selfcontained units where human waste is stored temporarily in a holding tank and removed by some very dedicated people.")

Today, W. C. Lowery, Inc. has 3 mixers, 4 portable toilet trailers, and 2 pumpers. They average pumping about 81,000 gallons of human waste per month. They have installed septic systems from Aylett to Middle Peninsula and, of course, most places in between. They say: "Leave the dirty work of sewage and portable restrooms to W.C. Lowery, Inc., a quality septic services company in Callao, Virginia." They have been in business since the 1950's and hope to carry on for generations to come.
















Brunswick Stew Fundraiser for Callao Park

Stew Master, Tom Giannasi, generously sponsored CHCA's first fundraiser to kick off efforts to build a Community Park in Callao, Virginia. The event was held Saturday, March 5, 2022 at the Callao Supermarket parking lot. By all accounts, it was a smashing success!

Tom Giannasi started cooking stew in 2002 using his Grand Mother Hester's recipe. She had passed it down to his mother, Marion Hester Giannasi. The first pot of stew that he cooked was to raise funds for the Boy Scouts, where he served as an Assistant Scout Master for Troop 715 Richmond, Virginia. Since then, he has also helped, Boy Scout Troops 250 (Callao) and 777 (Richmond), Knights of Columbus Council 395, Council 11172, Council 5476, James Madison University Catholic Campus Ministry, St Bridget's Catholic Church, and Boys to Men Club at St Michael's Catholic Church raise funds for their various charitable projects. In addition to stew, he is known for his spaghetti sauce and cooks a spaghetti dinner for the St. Bridget youth group mission trip each year. Tom is also the chef for Knights of Columbus 395 and has organized a number of events to raise funds for various charities. As of 2022 Tom has help these organizations raise over \$300,000 in funds to support various charities Richmond and the Commonwealth Virginia. His goal is to raise \$500,000 for charity before hanging up his chef coat.

Tom Giannasi brought a team of helpful volunteers to assist him with preparing the Brunswick stew: Tony Shearin; Chuck Dunnington;

Billy Putze; and Tom Martin (who also donated cases of bottled iced tea to help with the cause). These gentleman have local ties to the area and enjoy helping out worthy causes. They did an excellent job and the stew was delicious.

Along with Tom Gianasi, Mr. Shearin, Mr. Dunnington, Mr. Putze, Mr. Martin, and all of the Callao Hometown Community Association Board Members, other volunteers included Judy Taylor, Alice Burgess, Jim Michel, and Dusti Dunn. CHCA greatly appreciates everyone's efforts to make it a success. (Board members include: Lisa Deitz, Bobby Burgess, Reuben Thrift, Debbie Newsome, Dee David and Jeanette Cralle). We also wish to thank Dan Corder, one of our most ardent supporters, for allowing CHCA to hold the event at the Callao Supermarket parking lot. President of CHCA, Lisa Deitz, reports that the response from the community has been outstanding.
