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RULES & REGULATIONS

Judges and Exhibitors - Please read the following rules and act accordingly Exhibitor Entry Forms will be available on the website and at the Office. Exhibitor Fees: The fee for all exhibitors is \$10.00. When paid, a number designated ticket will be issued which will permit the card holder admission to the grounds and grandstand daytime and evenings during the 2024 Fair. Only people that have paid the Exhibitor Fee will be allowed to exhibit for prizes. Exhibitor Entry Forms: All entries must be made on printed forms which can be obtained from the Office or on our website. These are to be filled in and signed by the Exhibitor. Once the entry form is filled, no changes can be made. All entries for the Homecraft Division must be made by 12 noon on Friday, August 2, 2024. Other fair entries and exhibits must be submitted by 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, August 3, 2024.

Exhibitor Tags: All entries must have an exhibitor tag complete with exhibitor number and class category number. Entries must be listed on the above noted entry form.

Exhibit Displays: All exhibits for the Homecraft Division must be in place by 12 noon on Friday, August 2, 2024. All other fair exhibits must be in place by 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, August 3, 2024. The Officers of this Society will not undertake to receive, place or return any articles for exhibitors. All the exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor and unless the rule is observed no prizes will be awarded and if awarded, will not be paid. Proof of ownership for livestock must be provided if requested. The Board of Directors reserves the right to regulate all matters pertaining to the Fair and the arrangements of any allotment of space for exhibits in all departments.

Prize Money: Available for payout Monday, August 5, 2024 from noon till 5:00 p.m. at the Fair Office in the Curling Club building upstairs. Any person winning over \$10.00 in prize money shall have \$10.00 deducted from their exhibit fee for the ensuing year with the exception of class 23 and 24. All other prize monies greater than \$5.00 not picked up on Monday, August 5 will be paid by cheque by October 31, 2024 with an additional 10% administrative fee deducted. Any prize money less than \$5.00 not picked up on Monday August 5, 2024 shall be forfeited. All cheques to be cashed by December 15, 2024 or the exhibitor will forfeit their right to such a prize. If receipts are insufficient to meet the prize list in full, the prize money will be withheld/forfeited if a copy of valid liability insurance is not presented to the office.

Admission Passes: Children 10 and under admitted free. Daily passes to the grounds will be available during the Fair to non-exhibitors at a charge of \$10.00 per person for daily entrance or Weekend Passes at a charge of \$25.00 for one person.

Judging: Stock must be on hand at the hour named for judging and at the call of the judge. Anyone failing to be on hand when the call is made will be debarred from competition. In all classes in which there is only one competitor in any section, not more than two prizes will be given. It may be first, second, third or none, according to merit. The judge has the right to disqualify any entrant that, in their opinion, is not worthy of a prize. All protests, concerning livestock must be made before leaving the ring to the Director in charge. All other protests to be made in writing to the Secretary before leaving the grounds. All protests to be accompanied by \$10.00 to be returned if protest is sustained.

Safety: The Society will not be responsible for any article of any kind or nature that may be lost or destroyed or in any way injured. Neither will the Directors or the Society be responsible for accidents to animals, property or persons on the grounds. Any dogs brought into the grounds and Fair must be leashed and abide by Town of Greater Napanee Dog By-Laws. Exhibitors of animals, machinery in motion and other exhibits which might cause accidents shall guard their exhibits and protect the public. Exhibitors must have PROOF OF LIABILITY INSURANCE on hand. Please refer to the Lennox Agricultural Society Emergency Plan.

IF A MEMBER OF THE LENNOX AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY OR A JUDGE feels an animal is out of control or is a danger to other exhibitors, spectators, other animals or Fair Board property, the animal must be secured in a trailer immediately. Any exhibitor who does not follow this policy will be barred from showing at the Napanee Fair and will forfeit any prize money. They will also be held liable for any damage caused by their animal.

Livestock: Please read the livestock exhibitor code of Conduct on page 12. Proof of Liability Insurance is required for livestock entries. All horses must have a Valid Coggins test certificate. Halter horses may be shown in harness classes also. Otherwise horses can be shown in one class only, except for specials. Beef cattle must be brought in by 9:00 a.m. Sunday and must be exhibited until 4:00 p.m. Sunday. No bull will be allowed on the grounds unless properly secured by rope and chain or otherwise under the care of attendants. Exhibitor vehicles with livestock will be allowed no charge entry for the vehicle and one helper.

All livestock and animals which are to be exhibited or presented on the grounds must adhere to any and all provincial requirements including but not limited to proper identification by an approved ear tag which conforms to the Canadian Food Inspection Agency (CFIA) before it moves from the herd of origin... NO EXCEPTIONS!

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LIVESTOCK EXHIBITOR CODE OF CONDUCT

The Lennox Agricultural Society /Napanee Fair is committed to responsible animal care and treatment. This code of conduct outlines what is expected of livestock exhibitors in the handling and exhibiting of all animals involved with our Napanee Fair.

This code has been developed to meet the following objectives:

• To ensure the health and wellbeing of all animals at the Fair.

• To demonstrate an accurate and responsible animal care message to the public.

• To maintain the integrity of all livestock competitions, displays and sales.

• Livestock and poultry must be transported to and from Fair in accordance with all humane transport regulations and standards.

• Loading and unloading must occur using proper equipment and procedures.

• All animals must be treated and handled in a responsible manner. The wellbeing of the animals shall take precedence over the demands of owners, sellers, buyers, organizers, sponsors and officials.

• All animals subject to visual inspection for skin borne disease. The care of all animals must be as consistent as possible with their normal schedules and standards. High stands of nutrition, health, sanitation, environment and safety must be met at all times. All handling, housing and veterinary treatment must ensure adequate animal care.

• Livestock should be prepared with proper training, fitting and grooming prior to the Fair. Excessive disciplining of animals at the Fair is unacceptable.

• Exhibitors are expected to provide adequate training for anyone handling their livestock. Untrained individuals, including fair personnel and visitors, should not be permitted to handle animals or equipment.

• Exhibitors should take every opportunity to enhance public awareness, education and appreciation of proper livestock management and handling practices.

There will be no tolerance of any mistreatment of animals. Any unacceptable exhibitor conduct will be subject to action including elimination from competition(s) and/or exhibit, at the discretion of the board.

Purebred means registered or eligible for registration as purebred in the Canadian Hand Book.
(b) For the purposes of Classifications a "Breeding Unit" is defined as follows: In each classification where the same or common interests are involved in more than one breeding operation such operations are considered as one Breeding Unit. In all cases, where there is any doubt that more than one breeding unit exists, the interpretation shall be that only one breeding unit exists. The responsibility of proof of separation of breeding units shall rest with the exhibitors(s).

(c) Each breeding unit is allowed 10 exhibits, excluding breeders herd.

(d) All entries must be owned by and registered in the name of the exhibitor. Note: Exception is breeders herd.

(e) Exhibitor to report to Barn Superintendent prior to unloading regarding stall locations.

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<u>Note:</u> **1.** Cattle must remain in barns until 4:00 p.m. Sunday, August 4, 2024. If show runs over 4pm you cannot leave until the cattle show is complete. Or forfeit any prize money.

HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK

EXHIBITED AT ALL SHOWS AND EXHIBITIONS

Section 78.25 of the Animal Disease and Protection Regulations:

No owner or person in charge of a bovine shall show a bovine over the age of six months of age except steers, sprayed heifers or official vaccinates under the age of eighteen months at a show or exhibition unless the bovine:

A. Comes from a brucellosis free region or brucellosis free herd and is accompanied by a certificate sighed by an inspector indicating:

1. The brucellosis free region or brucellosis free listed herd from which the animal came, and

2. In the case of a bovine from a brucellosis free region, that the bovine has proved negative to all tests for brucellosis required by these regulations for animals in a brucellosis free region; or

B. Comes from a herd of negative status in a region other than a brucellosis free region; or to a test for brucellosis conducted by an inspector or an accredited veterinarian within sixty days preceding the showing and is accompanied by a certificate signed by an inspector indicating the negative results of the brucellosis test, the date on which the test was conducted and the negative status of the herd from which the animal came.

In connection with the above regulations, please bear in mind that:

1. 4-H livestock are NOT exempt from these regulations.

2. The plate test is NOT to be used to establish eligibility for shows.

3. Livestock from Brucellosis Free listed herd will NOT lose their 'listed' status when attending a livestock show.

4. Health Certificates must be produced and verified for ALL show livestock.

2. Entry must be made solely by the person entering competition. (including pastry)

3. Number of butter tarts to be shown at local fair/exhibition to be determined by each individual fair/exhibition.

District Competition

1. A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown. Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and fair represented.

2. The size of the tarts must be full size tarts. (No mini or bite size tarts) and must not contain fruit or nuts (ie. No raisins, no pecans)

3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition.

Provincial Competition

1. A total of 6 tarts will be required to be shown. Tarts must be on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and district represented.

2. The size of the tarts must be full size tarts. (No mini or bite size tarts) and must not contain fruit or nuts (ie. No raisins, no pecans)

3. 1st and 2nd place entries will not be returned to exhibitor but will be placed for auction at the convention.

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Maple Syrup Competition

Pure Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A – Amber

Rules:

1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.

2. Entry must be made solely by the person or family entering competition. The entries at the fair level, district level and provincial level must be from the same batch.

District Competition

1. Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of one (1) curved Kent style glass bottle (D&G #505188 syrup bottle with handle), or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A – Amber, having a capacity of 250 ml.

2. Each agricultural society is entitled to send their best of show to the district competition. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning entries at each district competition.

Provincial Competition

1. Maple syrup exhibits shall consist of two (2) curved Kent style glass bottle (D&G #505188 syrup bottle with handle), or equivalent, of Maple Syrup, Canada Grade A – Amber, each having a capacity of 250 ml.

Entries must be labeled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identified. No other labels will be permitted.
 All maple syrup should have a flavour characteristic of its respective colour class and be from any objectionable odour or taste. It is best to sample from the same lot before submitting your entries to the OAAS.

3. Any maple syrup entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the completion.

4. Maple syrup will be judged using standards published by OAAS in Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs. An approved maple syrup colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.

5. 1st and 2nd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention. Other entries will be returned.

Hand Quilted and Machine Quilted Competition

Rules:

1. Please review the General Competition Rules document.

2. The quilt must solely be made and Hand Quilted OR Machine Quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) fair to be eligible for this competition.

3. Quilts to be measured on the perimeter. Total perimeter measurement to be a minimum of 324 inches. Note the quilt can be square, rectangular etc. All 4 sides must be measured to determine the perimeter measurement.

4. The quilting must be through all 3 layers (top, batting and back) and not be mounted on a frame. The quilt may have a sleeve attached to the back for the purpose of hanging the quilt.

5. The winning OAAS Hand Quilt and Machine Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future OAAS fair, district and/or provincial competitions.

6. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to give credit to the original designer of the quilt pattern based on copyright rules.

7. MACHINE QUILTS ONLY: The use of domestic, mid arm and/or long arm equipment is permitted on hand or computer guided machine quilt entries.

District Competition

1. Each local fair is entitled to send their best of show of all eligible hand quilts and machine quilts to district competition.

2. If the fair's best of show hand quilt or machine quilt has won more than one fair, the exhibitor must consider their own agricultural society as the one from which the quilt will be sent to district meeting, otherwise it should be sent from the agricultural society nearest his/her home address. The other fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, may enter their second best of show hand quilt or machine quilt into the district competition.

3. An exhibitor who wins more than one best of show title with different hand quilts or machine quilts at different fairs is entitled to enter each winning quilt in the district competition.

4. If an exhibitor is exhibiting in more than one district, they are entitled to enter different winning quilts at different district competitions but cannot enter the same quilt at more than one district competition.

5. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning hand quilts and machine quilts at each district competition.

6. A photo of the top three placed hand quilts and machine quilts at the district competition must accompany the "OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form"

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Provincial Competition

7. All quilts entered in the hand quilted completion must only be hand quilted. All quilts entered in the machine quilted competition must only be machine quilted.

8. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE and rosette will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

9. A \$100.00 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded. The exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.

3. Number of cookies to be shown at local fair/exhibition to be determined by each individual fair/exhibition.

District Competition

1. District entry must consist of 6 cookies displayed on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and fair represented.

2. Plain chocolate chip cookies, with no nuts, must be no larger than 2.5" (6.25 cm) and no smaller than 2" (5cm).

3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition.

Provincial Competition

4. The entry for the district must consist of 6 cookies displayed on a clean, sturdy plate (no paper plates) inside of a clear plastic bag with the exhibitor's name, mailing address and district represented.

5. Plain Chocolate Chip Cookies, with no nuts are to be no larger than 2.5" (6.5 cm) and no smaller than 2" (5cm).

Exhibitors of honey must be registered beekeepers and the exhibits shown by them must be pure honey from floral sources in their apiaries.

Entry must be made solely by the person or family entering the competition. The entries at the fair level, district level and provincial level must be from the same batch.

District Competition

1. Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of one (1) clear glass container, having a capacity of 500 grams (375 ml).

2. Each agricultural society is entitled to send their best of show to the district competition.

3. If the exhibitor has won at more than one fair, the one closest to the exhibitor's home address is the agricultural society from which the entry will be sent to the district competition. The other agricultural societies may send their second place winner into the district competition. An exhibitor may only enter into one district competition. 4. The OAAS will award a ribbon to exhibitors of winning entries at each district competition.

Provincial Competition

1. Liquid Honey exhibits shall consist of two clear glass containers, each having a capacity of 500 grams (375 ml).

2. Entries must be labelled on the BOTTOM of the containers only with a supplied entry number or identifier. No other labels will be permitted.

3. Any honey entry containing any form of foreign material will be disqualified from the competition.

4. Honey will be judged using the standards printed in the OAAS Agriculture & Horticulture Judging Standards for Ontario Fairs. An approved colorimeter will be used to assess the colour.

5. 1st and 2nd place entries will be placed up for auction at the convention.



LENNOX AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY EMERGENCY PLAN

PURPOSE: to protect the community and surrounding areas of pending situation

STAGES:

Assessment

- •DO NOT PANIC.
- •Assess the hazards and risks; determine if the situation is an emergency.
- •When in doubt, treat as an emergency.
- •Begin first aid if qualified.

Notifications

- •STAY CALM.
- •Call 911.
- •Send a bystander if cell phone not available.
- •Notify other members of the situation so they can be prepared.

Secure Area

- Evacuate all humans and animals if necessary.
- •Keep crowd safe distance back from area.
- •Do not let the crowd block emergency vehicle access.
- •DON'T BE A HERO.

•Do not allow anyone in emergency area including yourself except qualified emergency personnel.

Co-operation

•Tell paramedics, fireman or OPP any details they wish to know.

•Have first fair member that responded to emergency report his/her finding to authorities.

•Help the emergency personnel when asked to do so i.e.: crowd control.

*DO NOT INTERVENE WITH EMERGENCY PERSONNNEL PROCEDURE *SAFETY IS EVERYONE'S CONCERN *PREVENTON IS A GREAT SAFETY TOOL
