By spring, I was enrolled in a clinical trial. By summer, I was recovering. Before the dark rings on my finger nails faded, before the sores in my mouth healed, before my energy returned, a nurse psychologist approached me with an idea: the first breast cancer support group for women of color in South Florida. I got started.

In October 1995, a few survivors— Shirley Blades, Cathee Connor, and Mary Thompson, along with their supporters, attended the first meeting of SISTAAH (Survivors Involving Supporters to Take Action to Advance Health) Talk!, Women of Color Breast Cancer Support Group. And the rest, as they say, is history.

Understanding breast cancer figures like incidence (the number of cases diagnosed), mortality (the number of deaths), and recurrence (the number of cases returning after treatment), is important for survivors.


For women in the US, breast cancer is the most common cancer and the second leading cause of cancer death.

In 2017, it's estimated that among women in the US, there will be:

- 252,710 new cases of invasive breast cancer
- 40,610 breast cancer deaths

Incidence rates are lower and death rates are higher for black women as compared to whites. Black women are more often diagnosed with breast cancer at younger ages and with more aggressive and advanced tumors.

The year 1990 was an exciting time. With the advent of the New Year, I gave birth to twins. My pregnancy was a surprise, and although I elected not to know the sex of my babies, I secretly prayed for healthy baby boys.

God answered my prayer.

Fast forward to 1991 and I was experiencing the joy of their first birthday party. One month later, in the shower, I discovered a lump in my left breast. I remember thinking, "What could it be?" After a trip to the doctor and a series of screenings, my perfect life was interrupted by the words, "You have breast cancer."

I humbly accepted the call to unapologetically serve, with full confidence, in the perfect will of my Father in Heaven. For the same anointing that was upon Christ while He walked this earth, is now upon my life. Answering God's call has prepared me to serve breast cancer survivors and their supporters.

The VOICE Study


With funding from the National Institute of Minority Health & Health Disparities, we surveyed 240 South Florida African American breast cancer survivors to learn about their lifestyle needs and experiences.

The outcome of the VOICE study was a partnership with survivors to develop three (3) lifestyle interventions:

- 1. Mobile Cancer Prevention App (mCPA)
- 2. Community Approach to Cooking Healthy (CoACH)
- 3. Physical Activity Intervention Developed (PAID) to Prevent Breast Cancer

Our Search



mCPA

Through funding from the **Medical College of Georgia Foundation**, we initiated development of a smart phone app to promote cancer prevention.

SISTAAH Talk! Coaches, led by Mary Whitehead (nutrition) and Cathee Connor (physical activity), taped cooking demonstrations and exercise sessions.

Our photographer and videographer, Deloris Johnson, captured us having tons of fun as we shared our successes and challenges with healthy eating and physical activity. These 8 mini videos will be featured on the SISTAAH Talk! app.

Last year, we conducted focus group discussions and semistructured interviews to learn first-hand what survivors wanted in their lifestyle programs. Here is what SISTAAH Talk! told us (and how we responded):

- Survivors should facilitate the intervention (we trained Coaches to lead the way).
- Use KISS-the keep it simple, sweetheart principal nothing too complicated (we worked with survivors to develop session content).
- Make the sessions "show me" (hands-on) not "tell me" (lectures) (we listened).

PAID

We used the socio-ecological framework to developed a multi-component, facilitated 24-week intervention focused on reducing barriers to exercise that promote benefits ('pay off') of meeting physical activity guidelines.

COACH


If it takes a *village* to raise a child, then it takes a *community* to change the eating habits of a survivor. To make changes in her diet, an **individual**, must *want* to change. To change how she eats, she will also need support from someone close to her, a personal **relationship** (like a relative, co-worker, classmate, or church member). She needs **community** help (like a support group) to overcome barriers to change. And, she needs **societal** buy-in—from her church, neighborhood association, or civic organization—to make changes to her eating habits last. We are using a **socio-ecological framework** (individual, relationship, community, societal) in the CoACH intervention.
