Dear Friends and Family,

We have a great reason to celebrate. So I am placing this right here at the beginning. In March, our Vision and Purpose giving was designated for ELCA World Hunger. As I have announced, our synod has a giving challenge to receive \$100,000 by October 16th to receive a \$100,000 matching donation to ELCA World Hunger. And also, as I announced, we have a member who announced a willingness to match what was donated to ELCA World Hunger through our March Vision and Purpose Giving. And, as has been tradition, our Endowment Fund begins each month with \$100 and matches the first given \$150.

Are you ready to celebrate what our congregation accomplished?

In March, donations from members for ELCA World Hunger totaled \$1,159!

Our anonymous donor within the congregation chose to not just match but round up to an even \$1,200!

So, with the \$250 from Endowment, this means First Lutheran Church is sending \$2,609 to ELCA World Hunger through the Northern Illinois Synod Giving Challenge!

Wow. And Thank You to all your generosity in March. This is a wonderful gift. I have shared our congregation story with contacts I have in the national ELCA offices who work on raising funds for ELCA World Hunger, and our congregation's story will be used to inspire other congregations, not just in our synod but beyond. This generosity is a sign that God is indeed gathering us to live out our faith with Compassion, Grace, Gratitude, and Joy — and though it is not in our mission statement, we have definitely lived our faith with Generosity! March 5th through April 18th

Palm Sunday is a day steeped in tradition. We enter worship with the reading of the Processional Gospel, the story of Jesus entering Jerusalem riding a donkey with people along the way lining the road with cloaks and palm leaves. This is the entrance of a king, and it is a direct counter entrance to Herod who entered on a war horse, with full military escort, grandeur, and opulence. But we do not stay on this day of celebration, we transition to the story of the Passion — that is the death and resurrection of Jesus. The entrance to Jerusalem only is a prelude to the main event, the central moment of our faith, when we say Jesus, an itinerant preacher and Son of God, was executed by the Romans in collusion with the religious authorities. But this execution is not the end of the story. It is only the human tragedy that is necessary for the rest of the story, the story of Easter and Jesus' resurrection.

Join us on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday, for the full story, for opportunities to reflect on all the ways God so loved the world.

Almighty God, you sent your Son Jesus Christ to reconcile the world to yourself. We praise and bless you for those whom you have sent in the power of the Spirit to preach the gospel to all nations. ³⁴ The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the native-born among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God.

Leviticus 19:34

We are spending a lot of time thinking about and talking about our nation’s immigration policies, and the current administration’s move to deport as many immigrants and refugees as it can in as short of time as it can. And this is definitely a political issue. And this is definitely something we understand through the lens of our political identities and the political parties we associate with. But what I try to focus on here, with spending the time I do in these reflections, is remind us that we are people of faith. We are called to shed political identities and to pick up scripture to be our guiding principles. And scripture reminds us again and again how we are to treat immigrants and refugees: with love and respect and as if they were every bit the native born as you and I are.

So, it may be true, we are unable to stop the current administration’s policies. It may be true that we have feelings about why immigrants or refugees have come to our nation to begin with. It may be true that we wish this wasn’t a big deal. But these neighbors of ours are having their rights violated without due process and the programs they legally came to the US are ending without just cause. These neighbors of ours are having their rights violated when they are being sent back to nations of origin where war, poverty, and injustice are a daily threat. And these policies go against not only long standing national practice, but against our very scriptures.

This week, our congregation will host a prayer service. And this may feel political, but again, this is scriptural. It does not matter how we voted in an election or how we agree or disagree with national political actions; scripture calls us to care for our neighbors, to have mercy for them, and so we gather to pray. We gather to lament that this is our world now, that these neighbors are being so unfairly treated. We pray for their safety for travels and for their uncertain futures. We pray that our nation once again returns to its ways of welcoming the immigrant and refugee, a beacon of light on a hill, shining for all to see, offering a place of hope and newness.

Even if there is no legal recourse today for us to keep our immigrant and refugee neighbors from being deported, we have been called by God to pray for and to place these neighbors in God’s safe-keeping. Peace, Pastor Jamie
