Dear Friends and Family,

Monday is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. This is a day we remember the man, naturally, and all he stood for. But we also remember the movement of civil rights. It is absolutely a part of our national heritage that we have not always treated one another equally. American history is full of demonstrable privilege and oppression based solely on race, gender, and sexual orientation. And it is not just history, it is today as well. We are seeing in American cities major atrocities committed by federal agents who are grabbing people based solely on their skin color or accent. And what is worse is that we cover up all these tragedies with lines that say America is the 'land of the free' and 'liberty and justice for all'. We claim these expressions of the American identity are even grounded in Christian values. But here we are, a nation once again in the midst of racism and classism, where discrimination against someone based on skin color, language-spoken, gender, sexuality, and more are just seen as normal and okay again.

This Martin Luther King, Jr. Day is a day for us to dive into our American history and to be honest with how the past is shaping today. It is a day for us to ask the question—If Jesus were here today, what would he say to all of this overt racism taking place in our nation? It is a day to ask ourselves if our faith in Jesus, the Son of God, who died on the cross for all, not just a few, if this faith really shapes our lives, how are we going to respond to the injustices being spread across our nation today? It is hard to wrestle with these heavy topics in just a few paragraphs, or even in a day on our calendar, but if we don't start wrestling with these things here, ignoring these issues will only encourage them to become worse.

### **Scout Sunday and Pancake Supper**

On Tuesday, February 17th, from 5 PM to 6:30 PM the Troop will host a pancake supper fundraiser. The funds raised will support scouts attending summer camp. Summer camp can cost up to \$425 to attend for a week. So all fundraising really does help the scouts offset that cost.



## Sunday School

We will begin at 9:45. Sunday school students will join worship in time to share communion with their families.

## Revised Congregation Constitution

We have adopted our revised constitution and will ratify it with the second vote on January 25th.

Key changes include:

- reducing the membership of the church council to 7 members, 6 elected from the congregation and the pastor.
- Eliminating term limits for those serving council and committees
- Eliminating the second annual meeting in May
- Including the Day Care By-Laws
- Incorporating the church
- And other revisions as required by the ELCA model constitution which don't typically affect our day to day ministry

Thank you to the whole council, but especially to Chip Algren, who spent a lot of time preparing this document for our congregation.

## The Pathways Discernment Team

Over the last couple of years, the council has discussed with the congregation the possibility that in the future, we may have to do ministry differently here at First Lutheran. We aren't sure what it will look like, and so we have begun a process to help us figure this out.

The council appointed a Pathways Discernment Team and joined a cohort of other congregations across the Northern Illinois Synod who are also trying to figure out next steps. You may remember we had a visit from Pastor Mark Juliet last year. He came and shared during a sermon the purpose of discernment, how this helps a congregation listen to each other and to God, and to discover what will be the best pathway forward. This is kind of where this initiative gets its name—pathway, we want to be on the right pathway forward.

The Pathways Discernment Team was appointed by council last summer. The members are Chip Algren, Pam Best, Ben and Jenny Sanberg, Mark and Ellen Shrader, and Ray Golden (though Ray has since stepped back from this team due to other commitments). Each month the Pathways Discernment Team meets by zoom with the cohort. There are 5 total churches in our cohort, including from New Windsor and Aledo in our same conference.

The Pathways Discernment Team has been learning tools and has been given resources to talk about congregation history, listen to the needs of the present, and in upcoming sessions, will begin exploring what the future holds for us.

The Pathways Discernment Initiative from the Northern Illinois Synod is about helping congregations discover if partnering with another ministry is the right pathway, or if the right pathway has something to do with changing staff structure, or if the right pathway leads to a form of holy closure. The council and the Pathways Discernment Team here are not considering that third pathway at all. We are exploring the other two pathways. We do not yet know what it will look like, if we will partner with another ministry or if we need to learn new ways of being First Lutheran without partnering with another congregation. On Sunday, February 1st, Pastor Mark Juliet will be back visiting our congregation and meeting with the Pathways Discernment Team and the Council. On Sunday, February 22nd, we will have a congregation forum after church to share insights the Team and Council are working on for wider congregation input. Next week, this column will say more about that.

#### Liturgical Arts Workshop Recap

At our Jan 14 Liturgical Arts Workshop, we accomplished two of our three goals. We discussed our banners and paraments and the way we display them. And we learned about how the candles and communionware are cared for. Thank you to Chip Algren for taking care of the candles and communionware each week. If you would like to learn more and learn how you can help with our sacristy needs, like filling candles and preparing communion cup trays, please speak more with Chip.

For our banners and paraments, the question came up about how the banners are displayed, and how the stands we use are perhaps not the most stable. The function well enough to not be an issue, but are wobbly enough to raise a question. No solutions were yet presented, just questions raised about why these particular banners. We did discuss the frequency of changing banners and paraments and how the church season dictates what colors are being displayed and how we may have forgotten over time the importance of the colors and the symbols on these banners and paraments. Over the coming weeks, more will be shared about what the colors and symbols mean.

#### Annual Meeting on January 25th

Following the worship service on January 25th, we will have our regular annual meeting. We will take the ratification vote for our revised constitution which was adopted on January 4th. We will elect our new council members, which will be a total of 6 elected members from the congregation. We will also adopt our 2026 annual budget.

We look forward to celebrating 2025 and preparing ourselves for ministry 2026 at our annual meeting.

[Andrew] first found his brother Simon and said to him, “We have found the Messiah” (which is translated Anointed.)

— John 1:41

There is a lot of excitement in this opening sequence of stories introducing Jesus in John’s Gospel. John the Baptist is out in the streets telling everyone who will listen that he baptized the Messiah at the river. Then Jesus happens to walk by, and John just points at him — there he is! That’s the one I have been telling you all about! Go follow him!

And so John’s own disciples do just that, they go after Jesus. One of them is Andrew, who runs to get his brother Simon (as in Simon Peter). Andrew will later in the Gospel bring to Jesus a boy who has a few loaves of bread and some fish so that Jesus could use that food to feed the multitude. And later still, Andrew brings a group of people identified as “the Greeks” to meet Jesus, because even those outside of Israel are curious about Jesus. This excitement of finding Jesus, seeing Jesus, and wanting others to find Jesus is the beginning of John’s Gospel. And it is an excitement we are called to follow today.

So, in our modern day language we talk about “seeing” Jesus when we come to worship, in the symbols of baptism and communion, in the community being together, and most clearly in the cross. We talk about “meeting” Jesus in water, bread, wine, Word proclaimed, peace shared, prayers lifted up, the hungry fed, the oppressed released from their chains. And we are called to have the same excitement today as Andrew in the opening stories of John’s Gospel. We should be first running to tell someone we know ... for Andrew it was his brother, but for us it might be a relative, it might be a neighbor, it might be a co-worker. We are called to go and say what Andrew said, “We have found the Messiah”. Andrew would find someone who had something to contribute to the cause, and he brought him to Jesus. We, too, are called to identify those who have gifts that can benefit our ministry, and bring them to offer those gifts to Jesus. And when others ask us about our faith, we are not called to have all the answers, but we are called to have the invitation ready — “Oh, my faith, why do I believe? Well, come and see the Messiah for yourself.” Bring them with you to “see” Jesus in the community that shows you Jesus. Bring others to “meet” Jesus in the water, the bread, the wine, the Word proclaimed, the peace shared, the prayers lifted up, the hungry fed, the oppressed released from their chains. The excitement of this opening sequence of stories in John’s Gospel is the excitement we are called to bring to our being congregation today.
