It is time to engage the Bible once more. And we are going to take a look this Spring at the book of Revelation. We will gather on the four Wednesdays of May at 10 AM in Pastor's study for this quick study.

The book of Revelation is often mired in mystery and has been used and abused for a variety of ill-gotten means. So what is the history of this book so shrouded in mystery? What does it offer to us? What are the myths surrounding it?

Join us beginning Wednesday, May 7th at 10 AM for the start of this wonderful Bible study.

And ... pay attention to the readings throughout the season of Easter. We will be reading from Revelation and sharing some insights about what Easter joy is found in this text throughout all of the season of Easter.

Synod Assembly Delegates

Every year our congregation participates in the Northern Illinois Synod Assembly. We are able to send 2 delegates. The Assembly is an opportunity to learn more about our shared ministry with congregations across northern Illinois, to discuss resolutions that impact our ministry together, and to pass a synod budget. The assembly is a 2 day event held at Augustana College in Rock Island. This year the assembly takes place on Friday, June 13 and Saturday, June 14.

Monmouth Roseville High School Pops Concert

At the Pops Concert, the music department will recognize it's state championship. This year, the department is giving First Lutheran the same medal the students receive, to demonstrate their gratitude for our congregation providing practice space throughout February. Pastor Jamie will be receiving the medal on behalf of the congregation. All are welcome to come for the concert.

Pathways Program

The congregation council has agreed to begin a new synod program called Pathways. This program will help our congregation develop a stronger identity and will lead us to discern our future direction.

The council will be identifying a small group of members to become the Pathways team. This team will meet monthly with a cohort of other congregation teams using Zoom for these meetings. A Pathways coach, Pastor Mark Juliot, will lead these cohort meetings. The team will explore our congregation history as well as name present realities and then use that to help the council discern appropriate direction for our future.

Pastor Mark Juliot, who also serves another congregation here in the Northern Illinois Synod, will also be with our congregation on Sunday, May 18th. He will preach that Sunday and will lead a Pathways introductory session with our council and the members of this new team.

It feels like we go through these steps every few years. And that is true, we do. But every few years our context changes, and who we are called to be and who we are called to serve changes, too. Instead of letting these changes happen haphazardly, this process is an intentional time for us to discern our congregation mission identity. This will help us as we also discern if it is the right time to partner with another congregation for stronger ministry goals, whether that is for sharing ministry costs of a pastor or for sharing in mission events that maybe alone we cannot do but with a partner, we are more able to achieve.

Throughout this process, the Pathways Team will have interactions with the whole congregation, sharing what is being learned, openly asking questions to help with the discernment, and pointing to what the Spirit is leading our congregation into next.

May Celebrations

Sunday, May 11th, we will recognize mothers and all women of the congregation as we celebrate Mother's Day.

Easter Season April 20 to June 1

Throughout this year's Sundays of Easter, we will have readings that come from the book of Revelation. Revelation is a book that is often kept at arms length. It is either seen as too mysterious from all the weird imagery the author uses or it is falsely used as some roadmap to the future.

While our May Bible study will unpack more of these myths and help us to see more clearly what this book is about, here is a very short recap to get us started for this season:

Revelation was written during an intense time for Christians. The early days were filled with religious and political persecutions and just the struggle of letting people hear the Good News. The author wrote this book using a writing technique familiar to his readers, the technique called Apocalyptic Literature. This means the author used coded yet familiar at the time language to describe the current reality, while proclaiming a hope and vision for what will come if only they endure. Think of this as the Star Trek of the ancient days—sci fi television using futuristic aliens and technology to describe our current reality in ways we can understand. Join us in our study and in worship, to hear and learn more.

Space: the final frontier. These are the voyages of the starship Enterprise. It's five-year mission to explore strange new worlds; to seek out new life and new civilizations; to boldly go where no man has gone before!

Opening Monologue, Star Trek: The Original Series, as narrated by William Shatner as "Captain James Kirk"

Science Fiction has a long history of telling fantastical stories that explore our current reality. This is accomplished through metaphor and by setting stories into futuristic settings. Perhaps the earliest science fiction was written by Mary Shelley who wrote *Frankenstein*. This fantastical story explored a lot of issues of what it means to be a person, to control our environment, and to become God-like, all while set in a place where people could actually dig up corpses and bring them back to life, a reality that has never actually been experienced. Star Trek: The Original Series came out in 1966 and ran for three seasons. Many of the episodes dealt with modern issues such as race relationships, but instead of setting those stories in the current day where tensions were high, the show was set in the future and on other planets. Take for example the episode "Let This Be Your Last Battlefield", which aired in the third season. The Enterprise visited a war-torn planet where there are two survivors, each is half black and half white, vertically down the middle. The only difference is which side is white and which side is black. The hatred between the two peoples has led to these two men remaining, and they are still determined to kill the other. The episode was aired in a time when racial tensions in America were very high, and we needed a way to explore what could happen if we let hatred for one another continue. Though set in the future this was rather thinly veiled for the point it was trying to make, as in the end only one man survived, but for what victory? He was now alone on a planet that is uninhabitable, and he would die lonely. Anyone who watched the show in 1969 understood the message loud and clear, even if it was told through fantastical settings and futuristic characters. Throughout the season of Easter we will hear lessons from the book of Revelation. This book is very much like science fiction for its day. This is also why we will do a study on this book in May. It is filled with images that, much like a Star Trek episode first airing in 1969, the 1st and 2nd century readers of Revelation would have seen through the thinly veiled message. But today, we are a bit distant from that era. The clear message has been twisted into a variety of misunderstandings. So let us gather, travel back in time to some late 1st Century AD Sci-Fi, peel back the curtain, and discover the hope in Christ the author of Revelation talked about through very fantastical settings and futuristic characters.
