
Living the Creed — Sunday, August 30, 2020



God said to Moses, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters."

Last September, our congregation held a Bible study using the book *Seeking Refuge: On the Shores of the Global Refugee Crisis.* This book is published by the agency World Relief, an organization that works with immigrants and refugees across the globe. This week, as God hears the cry of the Hebrew people and prepares them to become refugees, fleeing a place of oppression toward a place of safety, we will revisit this subject and see what work is being done and contemplate how God is calling us to continue to support their work today.

Read Exodus Chapter 1 and Chapter 2 What was the name of the Jewish Patriarch that brought his family into Egypt during a famine?	Today, over 70 million people around the world have been forced to leave their home. Each day, that number grows by over 44,000. These families are fleeing for their lives, praying for their safety and desperately seeking refuge.
How many years have passed since Joseph and his family entered Egypt?	Who is a refugee? In popular usage: a refugee is a person fleeing life-threatening conditions, such as fleeing violence, economic devastation or climate catastrophes.
What are the oppressive conditions the Hebrew people are living under?	As a legal definition: a refugee is a person who is outside their own country and will not or cannot return because of a "well-founded fear of being persecuted for reasons of race, religion, nationality, membership of a particular social group or political opinion."
	How might the popular definition apply to the He-

brew people fleeing Egypt? How about the legal definition?

The journey of today's refugee

- 1. The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees determines if a person qualifies as a refugee.
- 2. If the refugee is referred to another country for resettlement, say the US, there is a series of security checks run by local and national law enforcement and intelligence agencies
- 3. This includes in person interviews with a US Homeland Security officer
- 4. A conditional approval is awarded before medical screening happens, if medical screening doesn't happen within a set period of time, the individual begins again at step 2.
- 5. A refugee with conditional approval is assigned a sponsor agency, such as World Relief. This agency assists with resettlement.
- 6. While waiting resettlement, the sponsoring agency offers cultural orientation. The refugee is losing a home, and gaining a new home, and there are a lot of differences to learn about.
- 7. Before resettlement is granted, a final series of security clearances is conducted
- 8. Once admitted to the US, the refugee is greeted by the sponsoring agency and begins resettlement.
- 9. This process can take 18 months to 3 years.
