Hearing God's Word

Insights from Scripture

Standing up for our faith is simple. Be polite, hold doors for others, don't speak ill of someone else, forgive and go to church.

Or is standing up for our faith really that simple? We are called to stand up for those who are oppressed, for those who do not enjoy the same privilege we have, for those whose rights are constantly violated. This presents the challenge. How do we stand up for the oppressed? Is it enough to go to a march or rally? Is it enough to quietly vote for a candidate and never speak on it again? Do we have to accept 'them' into our community?

This week, our Bishop's message challenges us to think about what it means to stand up for our faith. It is not as simple as we would want it to be. How can we accept the Bishop's challenge to be in study together?

Remembering Jesus when we eat

During your Sunday meal, remember Jesus is with you by reading these verses, sharing your dinner prayer, then eat in the joy of the Lord's presence.

St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 11:23-26, "For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes."
