A time of blessing

When you have spent your time together, praying and listening to God's Word, take a moment to bless one another:

Insights from Scripture

Jesus' words about being welcomed, and sharing a cup of water with those who are thirsty can too easily be summed up in a quaint message about improving our hospitality. And sure, we may need to think about how we welcome in others, how we tend to the needs of the needy. But Jesus is warning his apostles that as they head out, there may be some who welcome them just like the prophets of old. And the prophets of old were welcomed kindly if they had a polite message, and they were not so kindly welcomed if they had a message that challenged the status quo.

What is this message from Jesus that we have? Is it just as series of polite messages? Or is it a message that challenges the status quo? Are we brave enough to face the unkind welcome, if it is truly a challenge of the status quo?

Remembering Jesus when we eat

During your Sunday meal, remember Jesus is with you by reading these verses, sharing your dinner prayer, then eat in the joy of the Lord's presence.

St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 11:23-26, "For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes."
