Holy Trinity Sunday Activities

Genesis 1 offers us a creation story. Create an art montage that reflects the seven days of creation.

Psalm 8 paints a picture of creation in the form of prayer. How might we give God thanks for creation, and ponder the deep meaning that God chooses to have a relationship with us?

2 Corinthians is the scripture that we use to begin every worship service. Create a door hanger that offers this greeting to everyone who enters your home.

Matthew 28 gives us the Great Commission. It ends with a remembrance that Jesus remains with us always. Create reminders for in your home that Jesus is with you even to this day. Place these near where you spend your time: your bedroom, your family room, your kitchen table.

Insights from Scripture

The stories we hear today all tell us that God is active in Creation, God calls creation good, God remains in creation through Jesus Christ.

As we watch the world around us fall apart to riots and clashes between police and protestors, it might be tempting to think God has abandoned the world. But we must resist that temptation. God is still extremely active in the world. God sees that all creation is good, God blesses all people with the same charge to take care of the world.

How does this assurance that God is still in the world impact your feelings about being involved with those seeking justice, not just for one man, but for all who are created in God's own image?

Remembering Jesus when we eat

During your Sunday meal, remember Jesus is with you by reading these verses, sharing your dinner prayer, then eat in the joy of the Lord's presence.

St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 11:23-26, "For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes."
