This Week In God's Word — Pentecost Sunday

Hearing God's Word

Take time as a family to open the Bible and read these stories together. Take turns reading. Do not be afraid of words, like names, that you are unfamiliar with. Say it like you mean it.

The First Reading Numbers 11:24-30

The Spirit falls onto the camp of Hebrews, and allows 70 men to prophesy, including 2 men who were not together with the rest.

The Psalm Psalm 104:24-34, 35b

The Second Reading Acts 2:1-21

As the Spirit enables the disciples to speak in many languages, Peter explains this is what it looks like when the Spirit enters the world.

The Gospel Matthew 10:5-15

Jesus sends the 12 disciples out to do ministry, with very little supplies and a great need to rely on the Spirit to provide along the way.

A time of blessing

When you have spent your time together, praying and listening to God's Word, take a moment to bless one another:

May the One who brought forth Jesus from the dead raise you to new life, fill you with hope, and turn your mourning into dancing.

Almighty God, Father, + Son, and Holy Spirit, bless you now and forever.

Family Check-In Time

Talk about the time a wind event scared you the most.

Talk about a time the wind was very soothing and provided great comfort.

Insights from Scripture

The connection between the wind and God's Spirit is most clearly visible on Pentecost Sunday. It has been seen in other stories throughout the Old Testament as well—such as creation, and even when the wind parted the sea for Moses and the Israelites to escape Egypt. But here on this Sunday the wind rushes through the room where the disciples are gathered and gifts them with an ability to proclaim the message of Jesus in ways everyone can clearly understand.

The Spirit of God is once again rushing into the world today. We may not be gathered together in the holy sanctuary to feel it's presence, but if anything is learned from the lesson in Numbers, we do not have to be in a specific place to receive the Spirit—we simply have to be where we are. The Spirit finds us. The Spirit gifts us. The Spirit calls us and empowers us to tell God's story so that everyone can hear it. How are you experiencing the Spirit of God blowing through your home today?

Remembering Jesus when we eat

On Sunday, when you gather as a family for a meal, it can be appropriate to remember Jesus as you eat. This is not a replacement of Holy Communion, but telling the story reminds us that Jesus is with the whole Church, even as we are not gathered at the altar in our sanctuary.

Read these verses, say your dinner prayer, then eat in the joy of the Lord's presence.

St. Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 11:23-26, "For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me.' In the same way he took the cup also, after supper, saying, 'This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.' For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes."
