

Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, who for the sake of the joy that was set before him endured the cross, disregarding its shame, and has taken his seat at the right hand of the throne of God. Hebrews 12:1-2

I have never fancied myself to be a runner. In fact, for as long as I can remember, I have hated, to use a strong word, running. About nine years ago, my daughter was just getting into running and with the encouragement of her mother she ran a 5K together with her mother. Heide then turned to me and asked if I would run a 5K with her. She tried desperately to train me. I humored her and tried for a week. It was a miserable week that ended with me pleading with my then 8-year-old daughter to let me not do that with her. I remember saying to her, "I'll walk 10 miles with you; I'll ride my bike 20 miles with you, please don't ask me to run 3 miles with you." She relented. But she also never gave up on her dream of running with me someday.

I'm not sure why last fall I made a bet with my now 16-year-old daughter to run a half marathon if she ran fast enough at a cross country meet. But I made that bet. And, she did her part running with a time that far surpassed an improved time that was anticipated for her that day. And now I am running. I ran my first official 5K last Thanksgiving. I ran that race with my daughter who finally gets to serve as my running coach. And now we are both preparing for our first half-marathon later in June in Muskegon, Michigan.

I have found running is not as painful as I thought it would be, now that I am training properly for it. I have found there are moments when running is kind of enjoyable. It clears the mind and on the long flat stretches it isn't nearly as painful. I am not fond of the hills, but you can only run where the road leads, so sometimes I have to run hills. And I have found that running with others, even if we are at different paces, is still enjoyable. I wasn't even grumbling as much as I thought I would as I went on my first 9-mile run out along Broadway, out east of town, past United High School, and to its dead end and back again toward town. Was I wrong about running all these years? Did something inside me suddenly change that today I can appreciate running differently than I could years ago? Well, perhaps something has changed. Perhaps I have found a new appreciation for running, perhaps I have learned I can persevere through running and not be miserable.

The author of Hebrews encourages us to run the race with perseverance. And he is not talking about a 5K or a half-marathon. He is using the metaphor to describe the life of faith. Faith can be like running, it can be hard work, it can have easy stretches, it can have hills and valleys, it is always easier with others, even if we are at different places in our faith journey.

At First Lutheran, we are running with perseverance. 151 years of running so far and we have more hills and valleys and flat stretches ahead of us. Sometimes all this running gets tiring. Sometimes all the running builds us up and comforts us, it even clears our heads. Sometimes we need to pull into that water break station and splash water over us and renew ourselves to get back out on the course. Sometimes we want to tell our coach she is crazy for asking us to do certain exercises before or after the run. (Poor Heide, has to put up with me, and I am not easily coached.) But in the end, we still follow what the coach says, we still exercise and stretch and prepare to keep on running.

This summer begins a bit of a flat stretch of the course for our church – most of our regular school year programming is done; we have a coffee hour, a potluck, and a big fun festival here in June, all the water break places where we pull in for refreshment and prepare ourselves for what is next. The race is not over, it is not on hiatus, it is just run a little differently over the summer months. But we are not alone. We are in this together. Join us, as we continue to run together the race that is set before us, with the faith and perseverance that Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of our faith, as our coach, encouraging us every step of the way.

CYCLE TO SYNOD

The Northern Illinois Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) and the Rockford Area Lutheran Ministries (RALM) are co-sponsoring "Cycle to Synod," a three-day bicycle ride across Illinois to raise funds and awareness for the ELCA World Hunger Ministry. "Cycle to Synod" will begin at St. Matthews Lutheran Church, Princeton, on Tuesday, June 11 at 10:00 AM with a kick-off Blessing and Prayer sponsored by the members of St. Matthews Lutheran Church. Approximately ten bicycle enthusiasts will undertake the three-day ride which will cover over 100 miles. On Friday, June 14, the cyclists will enter the Northern Illinois Synod Annual Assembly at Centennial Hall on the campus of Augustana Lutheran College in Rock Island to celebrate their ride and to announce the funds raised along the journey.

ELCA World Hunger has partners and companions in the United States and over 60 countries with ministries addressing: Water and Sanitation; Education and Training; Agriculture and Nutrition; Income and Savings; Health; Peace, Justice and Human Rights; Advocacy and Community Organizing. In 2017, ELCA World Hunger received over \$21.3 million in support of these ministries.

"Cycle to Synod" can be followed on social media using "#CycleToSynod". The ride will make overnight stops at Zion Lutheran Church, Kewanee; First Lutheran Church, Geneseo; and First Lutheran Church, Rock Island. The ride will make lunch stops at the Hennepin Canal State Park sponsored by First Lutheran Church, Prophetstown; Cambridge Lutheran Church, Cambridge; and Augustana Lutheran Church, Andover. At each of these stops, information regarding ELCA World Hunger will be shared through interactive Bible studies and promotional materials.

If you would like to make a donation to support ELCA World Hunger a check written to the Northern Illinois Synod, with "Cycle to Synod" written on the memo line may be given to Pastor Jamie ahead of when he leaves for the event.






