You shall make this response before the Lord your God: "A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous.

Deuteronomy 26:5

God did a funny thing many centuries ago. God chose Abraham and Sarah. He revealed himself to a this 75-year-old couple and immediately sent them wandering to a new place. That's right. God chose immigrants to be the family through which he would reveal himself to the world. And the moving didn't stop. Abraham and Sarah left their home of Ur, traveled to the land of Canaan, which would one day be home to their children. But before Canaan would be Israel, Abraham and Sarah would have to flee Canaan and go to Egypt. Eventually, they returned to their new homeland. But again, the immigration did not stop.

Abraham's grandson Jacob would one day run away from Esau, fearing the wrath of Esau. Jacob's son Joseph, sold into slavery in Egypt, would one day welcome his brothers and father into Egypt as they immigrated there to save themselves from a famine. 400 years later, Moses would lead the great exodus as the descendants of Jacob, who only knew Egypt as home, would immigrate back to the land sworn by God to their ancestors.

Do you see a pattern developing here?

God could have chosen an empire that was stationary and fixed in place and unmovable through which to be revealed. But instead, God chose a family that was always on the move. Even after Abraham's many descendants settle and give their tribal name to the place we now know as Israel their moving was still not done. The Israelites would be sent into chaos as the Babylonians would take the Israelites into exile, then as Rome ruled over Judea there was a huge diaspora – a period when Israelites were scattered throughout the Roman Empire. Even the early Christians were immigrants as they followed Jesus' command to be witnesses from Jerusalem, throughout all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.

God chose immigrants to be revealed through. And certainly, there was a lot of time God's chosen people were settled into a place they called home. But in that place, God gave the command that they remember their immigrant history. Why should we remember our immigrant history? We remember the hospitality our ancestors received, or the lack of hospitality they received, and we know the hospitality God wants us to give to the next generation of immigrants.

The issue of immigration is not just a political hot-button topic that divides our nation into multiple camps of policy choices. The issue of immigration is at the heart of who God is in the world. God revealed himself to an immigrant family, God chose a nation of people were sometimes settled, sometimes refugee, sometimes immigrant through whom to bring salvation to the entire word. And today, God continues to walk with every refugee and immigrant, hoping his chosen people (the Church) will show a welcoming hospitality – the hospitality of someone who knows what it means to be an immigrant.

I hope you have already joined us for the Immigration and Faith Bible Study. If you haven't yet, there is still time. This is an important conversation and one we can approach with the fullness of faith and love in God, who reminds us always we are just immigrants, waiting for our ultimate homecoming in the eternal Kingdom that is to come.

## **OCTOBER VISION & PURPOSE**

What a joy it was to host the missionaries Rev. Mark Rich and Rev. Cynthia Holder Rich over the weekend of September 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup>. The council was inspired as we ate with them and heard some of the personal stories of their ministry teaching theology students in Tanzania. In worship, our members and visitors were treated to an amazing presentation that opened our eyes to a beautiful nation that seems worlds away.

The work the Richs do in Tanzania is work done on our behalf. Our financial support makes their work possible.

Now we have another way to support the work they do. We can purchase study Bibles to help the students who come to Makumira. Each Bible costs \$30 to purchase and ship to Tanzania. With October's Vision and Purpose Giving we are hoping to provide 4 Bibles. The specific Bible is published by Harper Collins. Pastor Jamie has a copy of this Bible if you would like to see what resources it will provide the students.

The students who come to Makumira are learning in their third language. They speak their home tribal language, Kiswahili which is the official language of Tanzania, and English as the language of higher education in Tanzania. These students are amazing to be able to study in three different languages. Our support of this project is one way we can tell these students how amazing we think they are, and how much we want them to have the best in preparing for ministry.

Throughout the month, you may give anything you would like to support the Vision and Purpose giving, which we will bless on October 27<sup>th</sup>. Let's reach our goal and exceed our goal as we support the work of the Richs and their students in Tanzania.
