What a fantastic adventure our youth and chaperones experienced in New Orleans at the Created to Be National Youth Gathering. If you are on Facebook and have liked our page, you would have seen many pictures from that trip. I will recap the whole adventure and include just a few pictures on the next page.

One highlight of our trip included meeting Hezekiah Watkins, first arrested at the age of 13 during the Freedom Riders tour in Jackson, MS. He went on to be arrested a total of 190 times — all for advocating equal rights.

In New Orleans, we had nightly gatherings in a NBA arena with 16,000 plus people. We ate great food, helped with a middle school library renovation project, went on a swamp tour to see alligators and wild pigs and more, and generally experienced the fullness of New Orleans.

Psalm 139:14

So by now you know the National Youth Gathering was all about walking, eating, serving, and doing all things New Orleans. But where was the message about God in all of this? Well, the theme verse from Psalm 139:14 centered the whole gathering. These youth learned what it means that they were created by God. They were created to be brave, authentic, free, disruptive, and disciples.

Created to be brave means sometimes we confront what needs to be confronted, stand up to what needs to be stood up against. It means being brave enough to trust God that we are God's child in all circumstances.

Created to be authentic means we do not need to hide behind masks, that the real us is who God made us to be. We have been given a story to live from God our creator, not from anyone else.

Created to be free lets us know that God's love unbinds us from all that society and culture would shackle us with, and with this freedom we are set on a path to serve our neighbor as God intends.

Created to be disruptive means we have systems of injustice in our world that need to be confronted and we have a voice to say God is love and we will be led by God's love, through all things.

Created to be disciples means we would leave New Orleans, the 16,000 newest best friends, and head home, sometimes to places where we might feel alone—but we are not. We are called to live our faith outwardly and joyfully and when someone doesn't understand, we still live as disciples anyways.

These messages were reinforced by multiple speakers, amazing music, and a closing sermon by Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton. For more about how this week had an impact on our youth, you will get an opportunity to talk with Trace and hear his experience. He has stories to share of walking the streets, of cleaning up a middle school in dire need of help, of eating great foods (he told me I have been making beans wrong his entire life, after just two bites of a Cajun red rice and beans dish), and so much more. He will be more than happy to tell you all about it.
