Synod Assembly

This year, the annual Northern Illinois Synod Assembly is held Friday, June 14 to Saturday, June 15. We are excited to be sending three delegates—Gary and Judy Sanberg and Trace Gallagher, who attends as our youth representative.

Throughout the event we will hear updates on a variety of synod ministries, we will have elections for synod council and committees, and we will vote on resolutions that impact our life together.

For instance, Pastor Jamie has already been elected by our conference to attend the tri-annual Churchwide assembly that will be held in July 2025 in Phoenix. Trace Gallagher has been nominated to serve our synod council as a youth representative.

Reports to the synod include a video presentation prepared by Pastor Jamie highlighting a hunger related ministry here in our synod. And Pastor Jamie also authored a world hunger related resolution the assembly will vote on.

All the exciting news from assembly will be shared after it happens, with our representatives sharing their experiences during worship on Sunday, June 16.

Ordinary Time May 26 to November 24

The Book of Ephesians is a letter in the New Testament. Traditionally believed to be written by the Apostle Paul, the letter is an emphasis on matters essential to the faith. Written to the town of Ephesus, an ancient city that is now in ruins, but lies in the modern country of Turkey, Paul emphasized grace as the central unifying element of faith. Once we recognize God's gift of grace, we are led into a faithful life according to that grace.

Throughout June and into July, we will be taking a deep dive into Ephesians with a brief sermon series on this important letter. For those who want more on the background of Paul, the city of Ephesus, the purpose of the letter, and the implications of the opening poem Paul begins the letter with, check out our worship video from June 2nd, it is the sermon video that I prepared for the Sunday I was gone on vacation. Join us the rest of these Sundays to learn more about what Paul was writing about to Ephesus, and why this letter was included in our library of sacred texts — the Bible.

For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God — not the result of works, so that no one may boast.

Ephesians 2:8

Perhaps the most Lutheran verse of them all—Ephesians 2:8, memorized by Confirmation students since the beginning of confirmation. This verse sums up the whole of how we, as Lutheran Christians, understand our relationship with God. It is not because we "chose" Jesus, or "chose" faith, or "chose" anything. God acted in our lives, God called to us, God named us as Beloved Children, God said the ways of sin and death would have no sway over us.

One of the biggest myths of Christianity in our popular culture is that we have to "choose" Jesus to be saved. Paul stops that thinking right here. It is not the result of our works ... and choosing is a work of ours. We don't get to say, "I am saved because I believe the right way" nor do we get to say "You are not saved because you have not accepted Jesus as your Lord and Savior." Both of those lines of thinking are not accurate according to Paul, right here in his letter to the Ephesians.

God has saved us. God has saved our neighbor. God has saved the refugee. God saved the immigrant. God saved the person who believes differently than you. God saved the person who has even rejected worshipping with the church, even after hearing the Good News. This is the fullness of God's grace — it is God's to give, and God gives so freely that the entire population of the entire world gets to experience this grace.

So, when we are walking through the stores, or along busy streets, or watching the news and seeing people who are doing things we don't otherwise approve of—our first thought is to know that those people I walk alongside of, those people I see doing things on TV—they are all saved by God, just as I am. Not because of anything they have done, but because of what God has done. Imagine, if you will, how you will see the world and its entire population differently when you realize that every person you meet has been saved by God—that every person you meet has an angel of God going before them crying out, "This is a beloved child of God." Imagine if you started by treating yourself that way, and extending that to all others. Yeah, that would mean we would see the conflict with immigrants differently, that would mean we would see the struggles of those trapped by poverty differently, that would mean we would see the struggles of the oppressed differently. Yeah. Imagine a world which begins with you seeing all others as God sees you and all others, as saved Beloved Children of God.
