Dear Friends and Family,

In the coming weeks, we expect to have announcements regarding our Strawberry Festival, the Prime Beef festival, other familiar summer events, and possible adjustments in worship as Illinois enters first what is being called the Bridge Phase, and then into what is called Phase 5. As we approach the end of the pandemic, the Bridge Phase and Phase 5 are designed to allow increased capacity limits, and eventually do away with mandates on capacity limits. These phases will slowly bring to an end the concept of social distancing as a mandated method for prevention of spreading the virus. Recognizing Graduates





Be glad in the LORD and rejoice, O righteous, and shout for joy, all you upright in heart.

Psalm 32:11

In our Bible study, we have been looking at the Book of Acts. We have been learning about how the early disciples began this movement that today we call Church. Back then, they had nothing to start with. They had no buildings, no system for a leadership structure, and no legal standing to avoid taxes or be protected under Roman law. Much of that we take for granted today. We have a wonderful edifice, in which we come to give praise to God and to learn about God's Word. We have a system of leadership, with a council, pastor, musicians, and bishops and so forth. We have legal standing within our state and nation.

So, how did these disciples begin this movement of church if they didn't have anything we take for granted today? Well, one of the first things they had was joy. They had the joy of being together and being in God's presence. This joy guided the way they greeted one another, lifted songs, fervently prayed for one another, and sought guidance from the Holy Spirit who would help shape the direction of this burgeoning Church movement.

What is our source of joy today? Do we gather with a sense of joy? Or do we gather with a sense of obligation and a feeling of self-righteousness or even indignation at those who don't join us? See, the lesson from Acts teaches us that we don't need a spectacular edifice in which to worship, we don't need organizational flow-charts delineating tasks, we don't need constitutional rights, none of that makes us church. The earliest disciples only had joy in each other's company, and joy in God's presence.

If your motivation for coming to church is any reason other than Joy, take some time to read through the book of Acts. Hear how joy motivated the early disciples as they shared their possessions and resources for all; listen to the joy of serving the community as needs rose quickly; feel the joy as they sang songs in prison, in public spaces, and in their homes. Then be ready to express your joy as you join your community of believers here.
