Dear Friends and Family,

The next phase of recovery from the pandemic is slowly coming. The CDC announced new guidelines that masks are now optional for those who are fully vaccinated. The State of Illinois will be adjusting its executive orders to match with this guidance, and while that isn't fully official yet, here at First Lutheran, we made the choice to begin this past weekend with optional masks for those who are fully vaccinated.

You are on your honor to wear a mask if you have not yet received the vaccine. It is your choice to still wear a mask, even if you have the vaccine. The mask is only one step of reducing the risk of spreading the virus. Staying socially distanced, getting the vaccine, increasing sanitation of surfaces and an emphasis on washing hands are other ways we reduce the risk of spreading the virus.

The Worship Assistant and I will continue to wear our masks during distribution of communion so that all may feel comfortable coming forward to receive the sacrament. We are doing extremely well as a community caring for each other, and providing best practices to maintain a healthy community. I know we will continue with these best practices until the pandemic is completely declared over.

Upcoming Summer Church Events

The Congregation Council met for its regular monthly meeting last Tuesday. We approved going forward with a Strawberry Festival in July; we approved having an outdoor worship/picnic event at Lake Warren in August. We approved the possibility of returning to the Prime Beef Festival with our food tent.

Planning for these events is now underway. A date will be announced later for the Strawberry Festival and Lake Warren Worship/Picnic. The Prime Beef Festival is officially scheduled for this September by the county, we will be seeking input from our planning team for this food tent to determine if we will go forward with it once more.

All plans are subject to the projected path of recovery from the pandemic, and that there are no set-backs in the path of recovery.

And when the LORD your God gives them over to you and you defeat them, then you must utterly destroy them. Make no covenant with them and show them no mercy.

Deuteronomy 7:3

There are some very difficult passages in the Bible. A passage like this one from the Old Testament when God is giving a command to Israel to wipe out whole nations and tribes of people that live where the Promised Land is. This is complicated because it goes against everything we believe about God today. God is a loving, forgiving God, who is God of all peoples, not just one tribe or nation. God is merciful, compassionate, and slow to anger. Yet this passage stands in harsh contrast.

We might dismiss it as, well, that is just the God before Jesus. That somehow God changed when Jesus was born. We might dismiss it as a spiritual message, not literally meaning destroying the people themselves but the sin God opposed that they lived with. (I just read an article that used that argument.) But is it so easily dismissed? Especially when violence in the modern nation of Israel has ramped up once more. Rockets pound the neighborhoods where Palestinians live. Men, women and children are being killed. It sure looks like ethnic cleansing. It sure has the feel of a modern people trying to finish a God given command from the Old Testament.

One Palestinian woman placed a message on social media that she was gathering her children into her bedroom, so that if a rocket hit their house and killed them, they would all die together, and not have part of the family survive with the pain of loss. This is heartbreaking. This is devastating. And while there is sacred text saying God once commanded this very type of thing, we must stop and ask ourselves—what are we doing to each other? Whether it is Israel versus Palestine, gang violence in major US cities, ethnic cleansing in Africa, and the list goes on.

When we come across these complicated passages of the Bible, we cannot simply dismiss them; neither can we simply follow them at face value. We must wrestle with the identity of God, the word of God, and the desires of God made known in Jesus Christ. And then we must advocate for peace, that none fear a rocket killing their entire family, that none fear walking down the street, that all may know and trust a secure world.
