Then Pilate entered the headquarters again, summoned Jesus, and asked him, "Are you the King of the Jews?"

John 19:33

One more week of the Liturgical Year, before we begin anew with the start of Advent on November 29th. Yes, November 22nd is the final Sunday of one liturgical year, and then we start all over with a new liturgical year. The final Sunday of each Liturgical year is called Christ the King Sunday. This is a Sunday when we acknowledge that we are in God's creative movement that leads to an ultimate moment with Christ as King of all God's creation.

The language of Christ the King Sunday sometimes fools us into thinking that Christ is not yet the King, that this is a designation that we are waiting to happen in the future. But Christ the King Sunday really recognizes that reality that Christ is King today. We are not waiting for a final moment. Christ's death and resurrection were the coronation moments for Jesus, and Christ has been King ever since that moment.

Another aspect of Christ the King Sunday where language trips us up is the very word of King. We often think of Kings in military terms. Kings are conquerors, kings dispense judgement and decree how life is to be lived by all who live unwillingly under their reign. Jesus as King is so very different, it can take volumes of written words to define. But let's start with this word: Servant. Jesus as King is a Servant. Jesus as King is one who feeds the hungry, instead of relying on the hungry to feed him. Jesus as King clothes the naked, instead of prancing around in the finest clothes of the realm. Jesus as King dispenses mercy on those who have been judged, instead of piling further judgement on an already guilty soul.

As we approach the end of this liturgical year, and celebrate Christ the King, one final way to reconsider this day is to see it not as the end, but the beginning. We celebrate the birth of Jesus, we celebrate the ministry of Jesus, we remember the death and resurrection of Jesus, because Jesus is King. This is not our end. This is our beginning. May this new beginning carry us with great peace and confidence in our faith as we enter this new year.
