# What to expect when attending worship

As the pandemic continues, there is a lot of concern about gathering in large groups. This is an appropriate concern. The virus is spread through breathing and touching. When we gather in groups, there is no avoiding breathing the same air or touching the same surfaces.

At First Lutheran, we are doing all we can to reduce the risk as much as possible. We require masks when you attend worship, we practice social distancing between family units as we sit in the pews. We ensure weekly cleaning of door handles and stair railings and other commonly touched surfaces.

Communion is distributed at stations each 6-feet apart, and the servers are wearing gloves and masks. We have refrained from speaking responsively and music is instrumental or provided through videos. Yet, worship still is participatory with hand gestures to match the spoken responses, our hearts are still joined in unified prayer, and the meditation of music lifts all our souls in serenity as God lifts us up on eagle's wings and holds us in divine hands.

If you have been uncertain about rejoining us for worship, I want to urge you to consider your health always first and foremost. Only return when you feel comfortable being in a group again. We have been averaging 20 to 30 people in our worship services since we resumed in July. Do not feel rushed. But know that while worship may look a bit different, it is the very same God who we worship; and, God doesn't care what form worship takes, God does care about God's people and the broken hearts the Risen Jesus is mending.

#### John 19:33

Our nation has experienced a lot of tension last week. The colors Red and Blue were thrown around, classifying whole states as if we are all one or the other of these colors. In the aftermath of this particular presidential election are ideologies that seem worlds apart, and yet are experienced as close as parent and child, brother and sister, neighbor to neighbor, life-long friend to life-long friend. Some experience this kind of week in American politics and want to respond by saying faith has nothing to do with this, they want faith to be a place to escape from the harsh realities that is our political landscape. Others deeply engage faith with politics, crying out how faith compels them to vote the way they do.

The truth is faith and politics do intersect. We cannot escape this reality. Jesus was crucified because faith in God intersected with the politics of his era. The religious leaders conspired with the Roman Empire out of fear of one whose faith threatened their political systems of power. Yes, our faith very much so intersects politics.. So what do we do today? How do we come to this intersection of faith and politics in our own day and age? We come to this intersection and ask ourselves "what is dying with Christ the Crucified?" and "what is rising with Christ the Risen Lord?" At the intersection of faith and politics, the earthly systems of power die, the worldly systems of privilege die, the cultural systems of discrimination die. At the intersection of faith and politics, the Kingdom of God rises up new lives, proclaims freedom and equality for all, and provides justice and mercy where before there was none.

This intersection is not about endorsing one political candidate over another. This intersection is not about choosing one color to define us for all times. This intersection is about the hard work of letting the Crucified Jesus take to death all that needs dying and bring to life all that needs resurrection. In the coming days and weeks, our American politics will continue to be messy. When we come to the intersection of faith and politics, we are choosing to engage that messy terrain with the confidence that Jesus, the Crucified and Risen One, is answering our prayer: Your kingdom come, on earth as in heaven.
