Dear Friends and Family,

The council would like to express its gratitude to the estate of Bill Root. After Bill's passing, we received a bequest from his estate. This bequest has been designated for a building project that had not been started yet. The building and grounds committee evaluated several projects and recommended to the council this bequest be used to replace the flooring in the fellowship hall in the basement.

The council has approved this project. The building and grounds committee has selected a local flooring company to complete this project soon. If you see workers in the basement, you will know an upgraded to our flooring is happening.

Again, thank you to Pat Root and Becky (Root) Kometer for agreeing to this opportunity and for continuing Bill's legacy through a beautification project at church.

Congregation Meetings to be rescheduled

We did not have quorum to hold a congregation meeting on Sunday, Oct 18. So the council will reschedule to a later time.

The council is proposing changing how we disperse the interest income from our endowment funds. Our current practice is to disperse twenty-five percent (25%) to each of these four categories: benevolence, building maintenance, general fund and reinvestment. In the past, each of these four allocations is approximately \$4,000.

The proposed change will maintain the same allocation to benevolence and building maintenance, and increase the general fund portion to fifty percent (50%) by eliminating the reinvestment allocation.

This means the general fund will receive approximately \$8,000 instead of the previous approximation of \$4,000. The Finance Committee and the Endowment committee have supported this change as it will reduce the deficit in our budget planning.

Christian Education and Youth — Youth Happens at First

For everyone has sinned; we all fall short of God's glorious standard.

Romans 3:21

In October, we celebrate the Reformation. As Martin Luther studied scripture, he was seeking a relationship with God. As he grew up, the Church had taught that God was an angry God, and that God sought vengeance on all who sinned, and that one could not be in a relationship with God unless one had confessed all sins and made atonement for each of those sins. This is partly where the archaic (and unbiblical) notion of purgatory came from, a place where, before one could enter heaven, all remaining earthly sins had to be purged away.

Luther poured over scripture seeking why God would be this way. And as Luther studied, Luther dutifully went to his confessor, sometimes for hours each day, and Luther would participate in all the rituals associated with atoning for sins: praying the rosary, the Lord's Prayer, participating in sacraments, and even self-flagellation. But Luther was not finding any evidence in scripture that God was vengeful or angry. Luther only found a God who was loving and had open arms to receive those whom God called beloved children.

Luther in particular studied St. Paul's letter to the Romans where St. Paul spells out the justification for how God can be so loving. For everyone has sinned, Paul said. Therefore the only way a righteous and just God can deal with everyone who has sinned is to love them all the same. All sin is forgiven. All are loved by God. This key passage in scripture helped Luther discover his long-sought-for relationship with God: a relationship based on love and forgiveness.

Now if God sees all as sinners, and therefore God sees all as forgiven, Luther reasoned this changes everything. This changes how we see one another, this changes how we welcome others into God's presence with us, this changes our focus on confession—from needing to earn our way to God—to giving thanks for what God has done. This changes our fear of God from outright dread to an awe that relieves our weary souls. The legacy of the Reformation is still with us, still changing our perspective of God, still opening us to the relationship God wants with us—a relationship based on love and forgiveness.
