"No, not seven times," Jesus replied, "but seventy times seven!"

Matthew 18:22

"Forgiveness Can you imagine?" This line is sung by the chorus in the musical *Hamilton* as the protagonist Alexeander and his wife Eliza reconcile after the scandal of his affair being made public and after the events of their oldest son dying in a duel were largely blamed, even if unfairly so, on Alexander. It was a long arduous road for the couple to discover this moment of reconciliation, and to begin their lives together in a new way.

The disciple Peter was trying desperately to understand Jesus' teaching on forgiveness, he wanted to know just how much effort we have to put into forgiving someone. If forgiveness could be quantified, Peter's logic dictates, then we have a clear and concise rule. Jesus' response, "seventy times seven" may have a mathematical answer, but really, who counts up to 490 offenses? Don't we usually lose track somewhere before we even get to 10 times? Jesus' response tells us forgiveness is not quantifiable.

Does Elizabeth get to say to Alexander, okay, I forgave you these two things, that's it, next time no more forgiveness for you? Jesus would say, "No, that is not how forgiveness works." For Jesus, forgiveness has no limit, the well of forgiveness is infinite. And sure, forgiveness does not necessary absolve consequence for our actiona, but it does remove the barriers we place in our hearts, separating ourselves from one who has offended us. Once that barrier is removed because of forgiveness, we can find the new way to live together.

How does it look in your life to live out an immeasurable amount of forgiveness? What does it mean to lose count of how many times we have forgiven someone, and so we start over at the beginning and forgive again? This is our faith journey. It doesn't have easy answers. It only has Jesus leading the way, the very Jesus who forgives us so many times, we have lost count.

In peace, Pastor Jamie
