Living the Creed

This week, we have a fun Living the Creed activity that will engage the whole family.

Download the PDF and create a resurrection garden scene using a large clay pot bottom and a small clay pot. Add some dirt, grass seed and pebbles and one large stone, and you have yourself an empty tomb.

Read through the Easter resurrection story as a family. Talk about how the different disciples might have felt, which one do you more closely identify with in the story?

Don't forget to greet everyone you meet on Easter Day with the words "Alleluia! Christ is risen!"

How many respond back with "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!"?

But the angel said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place they laid him."

Mark 16:6

"He is not here," the angel said to the women who came to the tomb on the first Easter morning. "He is not here," we will hear once again as we enter worship on this Easter morning. That's right. Jesus is not HERE. Jesus is not in his tomb. Nor, is Jesus in our sanctuary. Jesus is raised from the dead. Jesus is no longer confined to a space we have created. Whether it is the unused tomb carved into the rock, or the manmade structures where we gather to worship him. Jesus is not here.

And this is the Good News. Jesus is not here. Instead, as the angel continues telling the women, Jesus is going ahead of the disciples, to Galilee. Instead, Jesus is going ahead of us, to the neighborhoods where we live, to the workplaces and shops and markets we frequent. Jesus is going ahead of us to places where people need to be clothed. Jesus is going ahead of us to places where people need economic justice. Jesus is going ahead of us where people need racial justice. Jesus is going ahead of us where people need equality and dignity and value. Jesus is not here. Jesus is leading us forward and Jesus is leading us away from the tomb of death into the life of resurrection.

We will gather once more on Sunday morning to hear this Good News that Jesus is not here. We will worship the God who raised Christ to new life. We will receive the bread and wine, the body and blood of our Savior, whose death is the sacrifice that draws us into God forever. But then this message of the angel will echo in our ears ... Look, he is not here, he is going ahead of you, there you will see him, just as he told you.

Yes, when we follow where Jesus leads, we will see him. We will see him in the action of our feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, visiting the sick, lifting up the poor, freeing the oppressed, offering equality for those who equality has been denied. What are we waiting for? It's time to leave the empty tomb and go where Jesus is already waiting for us.
