It had to have been a chaotic time for the disciples. To receive the gift of peace in the midst of chaos must have been just what they needed. How do we receive the same gift of peace in the midst of our own chaos? Join us as we hear Jesus speak to us a word of peace.

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Living the Creed

Throughout the Easter season, the first readings come from the Book of Acts. This is the first book of the New Testament after the four Gospels. Written by the same author as Luke's Gospel, the book follows the stories of Peter and Paul and a few of the other earliest followers of Jesus.

Our Living the Creed series over the next six weeks will help us discover the rich history of the earliest days of Ekklesia (the Greek word that translates as Church).

Jesus said, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

John 20:21

One of our many Easter blessings is the gift of peace that Jesus brings to us in the midst of chaos. Chaos is experienced in many different ways. For those disciples, they just witnessed the death of their beloved teacher. They felt the pressure of the chief priests and leaders within their nation seeking them out. They were afraid of the Romans looking for any who might have followed Jesus, in case any of the followers took up the mantel of revolt. They didn't know what to do, who to trust, or even where to go. And in the midst of this chaos, Jesus entered with a word of peace.

What does chaos look like in our own time? We have an on-going pandemic that is slowly ending. We have economic struggles these disciples could never have imagined. We have burdens of kids in school and college. We have farms with fields that need prepping for planting and equipment that just doesn't want to cooperate. Technology is constantly changing and giving us headaches, and then someone always asks just when we are at our wits end, "So what's for dinner?"

In the midst of our own chaos, Jesus speaks a word of peace. This peace is a settled mind, a confidence that we have the ability to get through the day, the week, the pandemic year. This peace is a trust in our God who offers forgiveness. This peace assures us that we will overcome the chaos.

And not only does Jesus give us peace, Jesus sends us just as he was sent. Jesus is saying, here is a gift of peace, don't keep it to yourself. And this is just one of the many Easter blessings. We have received peace so that we can share peace. What a blessing. We have been given peace in the midst of our chaos so that we can go to our neighbor and offer them peace. Sharing peace has many different expressions. Sometimes it is offering a meal to a neighbor in need. Sometimes it is just being there and listening. Sometimes it is offering a ride. Sometimes it is by asking a simple question, "how can I help you best?"

This Easter season, may we be refreshed in the joy of bringing Jesus' peace to others, the peace that surpasses all understanding.
